Residents now have the option of continuing to use their own trash and recycling containers (either trash cans or bags) or of using 96-gallon totes provided at no charge by Waste Connections. For those residents who have ordered their totes, Waste Connections has informed

us that they plan to start delivery of the new totes the second week of February with completion by the end of the month. The totes have wheels and are 42 inches tall, the top measures 30x34 inches, and the bottom is 24x24 inches.

In the email or phone message, say that you want to sign up for totes and provide your name, address, email address and phone number. You can request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.

As we approach the end of January of 2016, the bond construction projects on Ken-Caryl Ranch are in full swing!
Construction is currently underway on phase one of the Ranch House, the Community Center and Dakota Lodge. At this time, it is anticipated that the phase one construction on all three buildings will reach completion in early March with the next phases beginning.

It's hard to believe but the majority of the construction both to the buildings and the sites themselves is scheduled to be completed by the time this summer arrives. In addition, the Boards and staff of both the Metropolitan District and Master Association are planning park and playground improvements at Territory, Saddlewood, Heirloom and Dakota Lodge parks.

All of the above projects are being paid for through a \$7.9 million sale of tax-exempt bonds back in September of 2014. Going back even further, voters of the Metropolitan District in May of 2014 authorized the issuance of these bonds. It has taken nearly two years of planning to get where we are today. Once again, I would like to thank the residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch for their patience and understanding as we all negotiate through the construction period to make improvements to our parks and facilities. By this summer, we will see the fruits of our labors!

As of the beginning of January, current Metropolitan District employee Melissa Daruna was promoted to the position of Recreation Director with the District with the responsibility of overseeing all of the recreation activities on Ken-Caryl Ranch. Melissa has been with the District for over six years and, most recently, was responsible for the management and oversight of the youth programs, aquatics and special events programs. I would like to congratulate Melissa on her promotion and new responsibilities and know she will excel in this position. The position of Recreation Director on Ken-Caryl Ranch has been vacant for the past few years with existing staff picking up the additional duties as has been necessary. Melissa will now be able to bring all recreation activities into one focal point. which I believe will provide even more benefits to residents.

As we head into the end of winter and beginning of spring, watch Life at Ken-Caryl and our website at www.ken-carylranch.org for all bond construction updates as well as recreational program offerings for this coming spring and summer.

Now that holiday celebrations have tapered off, I'd like to extend kudos to Waste Connections for keeping up with the onslaught of extra containers full of wrappings, table scraps, food and drink recyclables along with stacks of empty gift cartons.

Overflowing containers are irresistible to scavenging birds and wild as well as domestic mammals, who create an unsightly mess in the street with what was a beautiful meal five days ago. This is my appeal to consider changes in your routine to avoid this problem. If you are pressed for time in the mornings, how about setting the heavy recycling container out the night before, leaving the odoriferous trash to be placed at the curb as you leave the house on trash day?

Another solution might be to call the Ranch House at 303-979-1876 or email Waste Connections at kencarylco@ wasteconnections.com to receive a new large trash and/or recycling tote free of charge. Please provide your name, address, email and phone number as part of your

request. If you have ample storage for the larger containers, the attached lids and the capability of the truck to perform the heavy lifting are pretty attractive features. I strongly discourage storing any containers with food waste outside of the garage, as that is tantamount to an engraved dinner invitation for our four-legged and feathered friends.

Willy-nilly storage of trash cans and bins is one of the most frequent recurring violations, so I would be remiss not to include our trash rule as a gentle reminder. "Trash/Recycling items may be placed out after 7 p.m. on the evening before pick-up day. The items must be taken in prior to 7 p.m. on the day of pick-up. Refuse, garbage and trash shall be kept at all times in a covered noiseless container and any such container shall be kept within an enclosed structure or appropriately screened from view."

Please keep in mind that rules are periodically updated and amended. Ken-Caryl Ranch documents are available at the Ranch House and on our website at www.ken-carylranch.org. Don't hesitate to call me at 303-979-1876, ext. 113, or email ritas@kcranch.org if I can be of assistance.

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Community Center Phasing Modifications


The Community Center drawing on this page reflects a revised approach to the phasing of the main floor of the Community Center. Adolfson & Peterson Construction proposed this revised phasing in order to minimize the operational impact to the summer youth programs and to return the resident fitness facilities back to the community.



As part of Phase 1, a LULA (Limited Use/Limited Application) elevator will be added to the building. The LULA is a code requirement for accessibility to all building levels. Phase 1 also includes the lower level fitness area, which is estimated to be complete at the end of February.

When Phase 1 is complete, Adolfson & Peterson will begin work on the upper/main floor of the Community Center. The sequence of work on the main floor has been flipped to where renovations on the multi-purpose and youth program rooms (Phase 2) will begin in advance of the reception and staff office areas (Phase 3). Similar to the change in the Dakota Lodge sequence, this revision will ensure the spaces are ready for the summer months when youth camps are in full swing.

With the building renovations and the new fitness equipment, the Community Center will be a very attractive amenity for the residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch. If you have any questions regarding the bond improvement projects, please email bondprojects@kcranch.org.

The following is a summary of items from the Jan. 19 business meeting of the KCR Master Association Board:

Winter Trail Use

Winter can be a great time to get out and enjoy the trails, but it is also a time when responsible trail use is essential. Every year open space trails are damaged due to improper trail use especially when trails are muddy. Trail users must also be diligent about having pets on a leash in the winter months due to the increased impact to wildlife at this time of the year.

As a result of Colorado's Front Range weather, snow usually doesn't stick around for very long but the mud does. Muddy trail conditions usually exist longer in the winter months, which increase the impacts of trail users. Trail surfaces that are saturated from either rain or snow melt, lose compaction and their ability to withstand trail traffic. This process is accelerated when high impact trail use is continued through these time periods. Please make note of the following tips to reduce your use of the trails in the winter months:

· Become familiar with the trail system and pay attention to the trails and trail segments that dry out first. Service roads like the Manor House Trail, Hogback Trail and Cathy Johnson Trail can absorb more damage and usually dry out faster than single-track trails. Trails on south-facing slopes tend to be drier and more stable. Avoid higher elevation trails like Upper Bradford (over Tin Cup) and trails in softer soils like the Lyons Hogback Trail.

- Avoid high snow-melt times. Trails are generally more solid in the early morning hours. Trails tend to be sloppier in the afternoon.
- If you leave tracks, turn back: If you're leaving tracks, then the trail is too wet. Please turn around and come back when conditions are drier. Horses are particularly damaging to wet trails.
- Wait 48: It's a good rule of thumb to wait 48 hours after any significant rainfall or after snow has melted.
- If you find yourself in mud unexpectedly, just go through it. Do not go off-trail to avoid the mud. This widens the trail, kills plants and increases erosion.
- Dogs should be leashed and under the owner's control at all times. Unleashed dogs invoke a "flight response" in wildlife, which severely depletes their limited reserves. Coyotes and other predatory animals can be more aggressive toward domestic dogs during winter months when food sources are low.

One last note: Lower Cougar Trail, located south of Massey Draw and west of Eagles Pointe and Manor Ridge, is not open to equestrian use until sometime this spring or summer. Construction on this trail was completed in early November 2015 and the trail tread has not had enough time to consolidate well enough to handle horse traffic.

Let's remember our trails are a wonderful resource, so let's all work to keep them safe and enjoyable. See you on the trails.

Residents will receive a postcard in the mail in mid-February with instructions on how to vote electronically. The election closes March 1 at 5 p.m., and the winner will be announced soon after.

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
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MA Board **Considering Change** to Trails Management

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board of Directors is considering changing the way the open space trails are managed. A proposal regarding trails management was written by residents Dan Mullins and Jeff Lyslo. Dan is a member of the Master Association Board, but he did not draft the proposal on behalf of the Board.

The proposal suggests not hiring a fulltime staff member to replace Cory Mensen, who resigned as Trails Specialist in the fall of 2015. Instead, trail construction and maintenance would be performed by Trail Club volunteers and external contractors. Dan and Jeff feel the proposal would allow for more maintenance than could be accomplished using a trail specialist and seasonal crew, for the same dollars.

In a memo to the Master Association Board, Dan states:

"I believe there is a real synergy that will be created by contracting trail maintenance and construction activities, thus reducing the continuous heavy labor that the trail club puts into trail construction, and instead redirecting the trail club volunteer efforts to assist with annual maintenance. We have targeted the trail club volunteers to be responsible for vegetation management along trails that staff doesn't mow, and responsible for monthly trail inspection reports."

The Open Space Committee reviewed the proposal at their Jan. 13 meeting. The proposal was discussed with all committee members in attendance and an audience made up of sponsors of the new proposal, trail volunteers, KCR Trail Club members and officers, Board members and other

community members. The following motion was passed with five members of the Open Space Committee in favor and one member opposed:

"Recognizing that there are many operational details yet to be worked out, I move that we recommend the 'Mullins' option for approval, limiting it in 2016 to trail construction (already-approved trails) and trail maintenance; and with the modification that staff will have the lead on biology but will work very closely with the Volunteer Coordinators (Mullins and Lyslo) on trail design and alignment."

The Open Space Committee felt that if this proposal is adopted by the Master Association Board, that it's important that community leaders assess the success of this program a year from now and every year thereafter should it continue.

The Master Association Board discussed the proposal at the Jan. 19 Board meeting. Staff was directed to work with Dan and Jeff on the specifics of the plan and present them to the Board at their Feb. 9 meeting. New Open Space ID Bracelets for 2016; Blue Bracelets No Longer Valid

Most trails on Ken-Caryl Ranch are private and on open space land owned and managed by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association. Park Rangers are directed to contact trail users on the private trails to determine residency. If you wear an Open Space ID Bracelet, the Park Rangers will not need to stop you as long as you are obeying all of the posted rules. The blue ID Bracelets are no longer valid. To obtain a new green ID Bracelet, go to the Recreation Office at the Ranch House at 7676 South Continental Divide Road or the Community Center at 1 Club Drive. Bracelets are issued two per household and now can be temporarily transferred to house guests! You will need to sign a simple registration form and provide proof of residency.



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




Homewood Suites Collecting New Socks for the Homeless



Coyote SMART

It was a cool spring morning, and I was leading a hike on the Manor House Trail. There were six of us, ages 4 to adult. We were heading just west of the Manor House when all of a sudden we spotted a coyote in the prairie dog town in search of some breakfast. The coyote stopped and looked at us for a brief second, then went on with hunting. We stopped and admired for a couple minutes, but then continued on our way. This was such a memorable, magical moment to see this coyote surviving and minding its business, while we minded ours at a respectful distance.

Shortly after this experience, I thought to myself, what if the coyote was near a den? What if there would have been pups nearby? What if the coyote would have approached us? What if someone behind us on the trail had their dog off leash? With all of these thoughts racing through my head, I realized that it was a teachable moment.

We stopped and talked about what we just saw and how fortunate we were to be a part of such an awesome encounter! Then I raised the questions I was thinking to see if the trekkers knew what to do if the coyote would have approached us and been agitated or aggressive. Most of the adults answered with... yell, look big, throw rocks and don't run...all great

answers when hazing a coyote that is approaching or aggressive.

I added that it is important to know what the difference is between hazing and harassing. According to Colorado Parks and Wildlife, hazing is meant to change the behavior of habituated coyotes to establish or maintain a healthy wariness of humans. Hazing techniques are necessary when a coyote is approaching a person, whereas it could be considered harassing when a person approaches a coyote too close and does similar actions. Remember to always keep a respectful distance to wildlife, never feed wildlife, and always keep your dog on a leash. I ended the teachable moment by sharing the

Colorado Parks and Wildlife acronym S.M.A.R.T. to help the hikers remember what to do when approached by wildlife:

Make yourself look big! Announce firmly, "Leave me alone!"

Retreat!

Tell an adult!



Improvements and Expanded Hours Planned for Columbine Library

Jefferson County Public Library (JCPL) announced that its 2016 budget has been approved by the Library Board of Trustees and Jefferson County Board of Commissioners. The budget includes several improvements to the Columbine Library.

The budget request submitted by the Library Board of Trustees included the following:

- A mill levy of 4.121 mills, up from 3.425 mills in 2015.
- Total revenues of \$34,453,776, which reflects an \$8 million increase made possible by an increase in the voterapproved mill levy passed in November.
- Total expenditures of \$32,396,129 to support initiatives to restore hours, purchase more books and materials, update technology, begin to catch up on
- capital maintenance projects, stabilize finances, and plan for expansion of services in underserved areas.
- A \$2,057,647 contribution to the Library's fund balance in anticipation of increasing capital and other costs in 2017 and beyond as the Library undertakes plans to refurbish buildings and expand services in underserved areas.

"It will take us time to restore open hours," said Pam Nissler, executive director, JCPL. "We will be hiring and training additional staff in the first quarter of 2016 so we can expand open hours in April. Other initiatives will be implemented as quickly as possible so residents can begin to see an immediate return on their investment," Nissler added.

Beginning April 4, service hours at JCPL's larger libraries (Arvada, Belmar, Columbine, Evergreen, Golden, Lakewood and Standley Lake) will expand from 51 hours a week to 65 hours a week. That means open hours from 9 a.m. to 8 p.m. Monday through Thursday, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Friday and Saturday, and from noon to 5.p.m. on Sunday.

Other initiatives include the following:

- Restoring investment in books and materials. JCPL expects to invest \$5.9 million in books and materials, an increase of approximately \$2 million when compared to 2015, with increased investment beginning in the first quarter. This should make a noticeable difference in the availability of high-demand materials.
- Increasing investment in updated technology. The Library plans to update more than 100 public access computers as quickly as possible, expand bandwidth and wireless access points at all 10 libraries and update critical infrastructure.
- Addressing delayed capital maintenance projects. The Library plans to invest \$1 million in several projects, including removing dead trees and fixing sidewalks at the Columbine Library, refurbishment of the Columbine Library, and the expansion of services to the southern part of the county.


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
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

Dear Editor:

You asked for feedback about communications in the current issue of LKC, and mine is that you do an awesome job!! Thank you for your wonderful communications skills that have definitely made a difference for Ken-Caryl by keeping the community informed in a variety of ways, including e-News and Facebook. The continuous updates about the bond projects and construction status have been stellar.

My only suggestion about communications relates to information about major decisions being provided to the community on a timely basis. Getting this information to you, the Communications Director, is the responsibility of staff, Board members and Committee Chairs. One idea would be to publish key policy points from the minutes of the committees on a prompt basis so that everyone can know what is happening behind the scenes. Often these recommendations feed directly into Board decisions and are very important.

An example is the proposal that was presented to the Open Space Committee on Jan. 13, which had been referred by

the Master Association Board after having been presented to them at some point in December. However, the December MA Board summary in LKC does not mention this proposal or instruction. As presented at the Open Space meeting, a KCRMA Board member wants to individually, along with another volunteer, run the trail building operation of Open Space, rather than have it be managed by the salaried long-term Open Space Manager. The proposal, if accepted, would completely ignore all of the current policies regarding Open Space management. The community should be aware of developments like this.

This is a request to all responsible parties, when you have knowledge of an important proposal and decision on the table, to immediately think about providing information to the community as a whole so that the decision can be made in the most informed manner possible. The Community Plan just adopted by both Boards in December includes a Guiding Principle of transparency, so it is particularly ironic for this to happen immediately following the adoption.
