Be sure to remove any non-coniferous items such as metallic materials and tinsel before bringing your trees because many materials can damage the chipping equipment. The mulch will be applied at the base of trees and shrubs in parks and greenbelts.

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
Thank You

Covenant Clips

The Master Association rules cover many things, from parking to fence building and even include newconstruction guidelines. The rules for Home Improvements and Covenants are developed by the Architectural Committee then submitted to the Board of Directors for consideration. The Board can then vote to adopt the new rule or rules. Rules change for various reasons. One example is a rule for satellite dishes that was implemented when the technology required a largescale installation. The rule is no longer appropriate, and the rules and guidelines need to reflect current equipment needs and restrictions. It becomes necessary for the Association to review the rules and make sure they're right for the community, enforceable with the resources available, and remain grounded in the Master Declaration.

In 2019 the Master Association Architectural Committee will be reviewing our rules. Among other things, the Committee will be looking at clarity, effectiveness, enforceability, and, of course, legality, throughout our current rules document. As we look at rules throughout the year, in addition to utilizing the Master Declaration, by-laws, supplemental documents, and resident feedback, we will be employing a guide shared by the Community Associations Institute, which provides a checklist of basic questions to ask that will help us deliver rules and guidelines that are most effective for our community. We'll be asking: Does the rule make sense? Is this the least restrictive way to approach the issue? Is the rule still needed?

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Does it address a current problem? Is it acceptable to residents? Is compliance relatively easy? Is compliance possible? Does the rule create new problems? Is the rule getting the results we want? Is the rule enforceable? Is the rule legal?

After much discussion, the Committee is close to presenting its recommendations for Parking Rules. Soon the Committee will review the fencing guidelines. The intent behind these internal reviews is to proactively highlight opportunities for efficiency and to set a reasonable expectation for more consistent regulation of improvements and enforcement of covenants.

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

Preparing for Winter in the Open Space

A change in the weather during warmer months can be a minor inconvenience, while being caught off guard in the winter has the potential for severe consequences. Checking the forecast before going out can better prepare you for these conditions. Always let someone know where you will be going, and your estimated time of arrival back home.

Hiking, biking, snowshoeing, or skiing up steep foothill trails can be exhausting and cause you to work up a sweat even in frigid conditions. Dressing in layers can prevent overheating and allow you to better adapt to changing conditions.

The heat produced from exertion can be deceiving; if an extended stop is necessary due to an emergency or from exhaustion, the body can quickly become chilled and can lead to medical emergencies like hypothermia. Avoid wearing cotton clothing. Cotton takes a long time to dry and could lead to continual cooling of your core temperature. Synthetic or wool base layers wick moisture away from your body, dry quickly, and have the ability to

thermo-regulate even when wet. An extra layer like a windshell can trap extra heat while sedentary, block the wind, and can be easily packed away while on the move. The fine balance of exertion and your body's attempt to maintain a certain core temperature can burn a lot of calories. Bring plenty of water and high-energy food on your winter outings. As we all know, the sun sets early in the winter months, so if you leave in the afternoon for your outing, give yourself plenty of time to return before dark.

Winter essentials:

- Dress in layers. Lightweight, thermoregulating base layers made of wool or synthetic fibers. Include a hat and gloves.
- Wind and water resistant shell.
- Plenty of high calorie food and water.
- Survival kit with a fire starter, space blanket, whistle, compass, first aid supplies, and a source of light to navigate if you find yourself out in the dark.
- Don't count on a cell phone for help.
 You could be out of service or your battery could run out.

Be aware of trail closures for muddy conditions:

Lower Cougar, Colorow, and the Bluebird Trail may be closed periodically throughout the season due to muddy conditions. Information can be found at https://ken-carylranch.org/open-space/trails/ or https://www.facebook.com/kencarylranch.

Pets should be leashed and under the owner's control at all times:

Even though it is hard to keep your pet leashed while using poles or when you decide to go to the local sledding area, open space use rule No. 4 regarding leash regulations still applies. Coyotes and other predators may be more likely to approach pets that are loose and away from their owners when their normal food supplies are scarce. A dog off leash may be inclined to chase deer and other wildlife. Wildlife can use up scarce energy reserves trying to flee from a loose pet. Harassment of wildlife is also a fineable offence under Colorado state law and can lead to an expensive citation. Other trail users will appreciate an under-control pet while they are navigating snowy terrain.




Local Schools Earn Academic Awards

Foothills/KCR Ridge Rec Center Agreement Discontinued in 2019

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board has made the decision to discontinue the Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Foothills Park & Recreation District that previously allowed residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch to use the Foothills Ridge Recreation Center at Foothills resident rates.

Residents of KCR will still be able to use Foothills facilities as they are all open to the public but will now pay non-resident fees for Foothills facilities. Since 2014, the Metro District has been supplementing the differential between the resident and non-resident rates. The decision to discontinue the IGA and supplemental funding was made in light of the District's financial situation and the failure of Mill Levy Ballot Issue 6G in November. Discontinuing the IGA with Foothills will save Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District approximately \$7,000 per year.

The Ridge Recreation Center, which is located at 6613 South Ward St. just north of the boundary of KCR, is owned and operated by Foothills, a local park and recreation provider. Residents of KCR do not pay property taxes to help support the facilities owned and managed by Foothills.

One Master Association Board seat will be on the ballot for the Board election in March 2019, and the application process is now open for those individuals who are interested in running.

The MA Board meets in the evening on the first and third Tuesdays of each month. Board members also are expected to attend other meetings on an as-needed basis. Serving three-year staggered terms, a portion of the Board is elected each year.

KCR Volunteer Patroller Program - Open Registration

Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers started the Volunteer Patroller Program in 2012 with three volunteers. It has since grown to 26 volunteers in 2018 with over 400 hours volunteered on the trails! Registration for the 2019 Volunteer Patroller Program is currently open and runs through Feb. 28.

The Volunteer Patrollers serve as an extension of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association's Park Ranger Staff. Volunteer Patrollers provide rules education, trail use guidelines, and open space information. Volunteer Patrollers strive to achieve and maintain a positive relationship with different user groups and present a professional image. To be accepted into the program, you must be a Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association member in good standing and submit a signed application and letter of commitment. A short phone interview and a two to three-hour training in the month of March will complete the process. A date and time of the training will be determined by number of applications received.

Basic requirements are to perform at least two trail patrols per month either hiking or biking mainly from May through September, but one can also patrol outside of these months, too. Must be 25 years of age or older, attend trainings, and be willing to make routine contacts checking residency and providing basic rules education.

Patrollers will receive all related training and will be supplied with an open space patrol vest, volunteer ID, first aid kit, and a packet with brochures, patrol log, and quick reference sheet. 

Ken-Caryl Ranch House Becoming a **Local Arts Center**

Most Ken-Caryl residents know the Ranch House as the place for tennis, special events, and all kinds of kids' activities. But they might not be aware that the Ranch House is also becoming a center for ongoing fine-art classes and workshops.

Award-winning artist Chuck Danford's intermediate/advanced watercolor class has been running for 10 years on Monday and Wednesday mornings, with many of the same students continuing to learn and grow year after year. Some of his long-time students have gotten so good that their paintings have been submitted and accepted into local watercolor competitions...and have even won awards.

We asked Chuck the secret of his class' ongoing success. "I truly enjoy sharing my experience and love of painting with every person in each class," he said. "The Ranch House is an outstanding facility—the setup of the space and the lighting make it perfect for students. I feel very fortunate to have created a following of wonderful artists, both residents and non-residents, with much of the credit going to the excellent KCR Recreation Center staff."

This past September, an ongoing acrylic landscape class, taught by fine artist Leslie Miller, was added to the roster on Thursday mornings. Some of Leslie's students have just picked up a brush for the first time in their lives.

"It's fantastic watching people learn to mix colors, master brush strokes, and realize that they can make art," Leslie said. "Most beginners believe they have no talent, but you really can't know that until you try. Having ongoing six-week sessions allows students to slowly master the necessary skills, find their own style, and allow their talent to emerge."

This coming Feb. 8, the Ranch House is pleased to present Introduction to Pastels. This one-day workshop is designed to gauge interest for a potential weekly pastel class. Also taught by Leslie, she claims pastel is "her first love" and that there's a misconception that it is hard to learn. She is prepared to boldly debunk this assumption in the upcoming workshop.

The one thing all the classes have in common is that no sketching is required. Both instructors prepare a sketch in advance for the students to use, eliminating a common problem for people who would like to learn how to paint but can't sketch to save their lives. Students can also work on their own projects as well, with feedback from their teachers.


Introduction to Pastel Painting


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Take Steps to Lower Risk of Wildfire Damage

The 2018 wildfire season has seen the loss of thousands of homes and hundreds of lives. You can reduce the risks to your home and family by preparing for wildfire, as all of Ken-Caryl lies within the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). You can't fight back a wildfire that is encroaching on your home. However, you can take steps to protect it and evacuate when necessary. Learn how you can help protect your home and family from a wildfire. Keep you and your family safe and know how and when to evacuate.

Before a Wildfire

Secure your property for a wildfire. One of the first steps you can take to defend against a wildfire is limiting the fuel sources around your home or business.

Within 30 Feet From Your Home

- Clear combustible materials such as dried leaves and pine needles.
- Cut down any tree limbs that are 15 feet or closer to the ground. This will help prevent the fire from spreading into your property's tree line.
- Remove any vines or vegetation that are on the side of your house or business.
- Place any flammable lawn furniture in storage when not in use.
- Opt for non-flammable decor, such as gravel as opposed to wood chips. **Preparing Your Home**

Prepare your home or business for a wildfire. If possible, use Class A roofing material. This includes tile, slate, or asphalt. You can also use Class B pressure-treated shingles or shakes. Make sure that you have smoke alarms near every bedroom

or office and in each zone of your house or business. Test smoke alarms monthly and change their batteries annually.

Outside your home, make sure you have enough garden hose available to reach any part of your property. Designate water sources and make sure that the fire

department can access them if they need to. Firefighters will use any available water supply to refill their trucks while working at vour house.

Create an emergency escape plan and practice it with your family. Discuss this evacuation route with everyone in your family and your employees. Ensure family members who live nearby know the route and have means of transportation. Also, stay informed by signing up for emergency text or alert messages from Jefferson County Code Red. Finally, don't forget to create and load your 72-hour emergency evacuation kit.

During a Wildfire

Prepare to evacuate. Listen to emergency channels, monitor social media from official channels, and know the status of the fire. Put emergency supplies and must-have items in the car so you can evacuate quickly. Evacuate immediately if told to do so or if you feel threatened and need additional time to safely evacuate. If you have time, there are steps you can take to help protect your property when you evacuate. These steps include:

 Moving furniture to the center of rooms and taking down drapes and curtains

to prevent combustion.

- Closing all windows and doors to prevent drafts and reduce heat.
- Shutting off natural gas from its source.
- Turning on all lights in your property so that firefighters can more easily see it through smoke.

Evacuate Safely

Remain calm while evacuating. If you're driving, roll up your windows and close the air vents. The smoke from the fire can get into your car, irritate your eyes, and cause breathing problems. Also, turn your headlights on and keep your doors unlocked. In the event that something

happens to you while driving, locked doors can slow your rescue.

After a Wildfire

Return only when it is safe. Do not go back to your property until officials declare it safe to do so. Watch out for ash pits and hot spots. Even after a fire is extinguished, small fires can flare up without warning. Check your house and surrounding property for hot spots and extinguish them immediately. Also, be on the lookout for ash pits. These are holes filled with hot ashes left by burned trees. Mark ash pits to help prevent others from falling into them and injuring themselves.

Document the Damage

Take photos and video and make a written list documenting your damaged property. Contact your insurance company immediately to report the damage.

Wildfires are some of the most destructive forces of nature. There isn't much that can be done to deter a wildfire's path. Fortunately, there are ways to help mitigate property damage and keep your family, friends, and neighbors safe. By following the information in this article, you can help increase your chances of prevailing through a wildfire.


