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Planning for the Future



Thank you to all of you who responded to our most recent Community Survey. We received a fantastic 41 percent response rate. Now that the data is in, the Community Planning Committee will be meeting with our survey company to review the results late in October. Then on Nov. 7 it will be presented to the Boards at the Joint Study Session at 6 p.m. at the Ranch House.

We are still working with the Board and various committees to prepare the 2018 Budget. The survey data will help the Board make some decisions. If you have any suggestions for changes for next

year, please explain in a message to me at chrisp@kcranch.org or plan to attend a Board meeting in November to express your interest.

The Board has approved two projects that are scheduled to help maintain our assets. An electrician will be replacing the electrical service in the pump room at the Bradford Pool. The current system is more than 30 years old and has deteriorated due to the chemicals that are used to sanitize the pool. The new system will be more resistant to the chemicals and will reduce the chances of a mid-season pool shut down. In addition, the boiler that heats the Ranch House will be moved from the pool chemical room into the basement of the Ranch House. This is being done in part to get out in front of the Ranch House Pool replacement project that is in the planning stages at this time.







Watch Out for Wildlife This Fall

Fall is the time when wildlife start preparing for winter and is breeding season for deer and elk. Increased activity in the fall can lead to conflicts with wildlife. By adhering to a few guidelines, Ken-Caryl residents can avoid potentially dangerous situations.

- DEER are entering the breeding season, and male deer will be searching for mates and can be very aggressive. Never approach male deer and give them plenty of room to escape if encountered.
- **VEHICLE COLLISIONS** with deer increase in the fall as the days get shorter. Please slow down and be aware of major deer crossing areas like the intersection of Valley Parkway and Club Drive and the blind corners on Ken-Caryl Ave. as you enter or leave the Valley.
- HOLIDAY LIGHTS that are strung on trees and shrubs can get caught in deer antlers and may hinder movement or feeding. If possible restrict holiday lights at your home.



BEARS are preparing for hibernation and they will need to consume up to 20,000 thousand calories a day. Residents should remove all attractants like birdfeeders and remember to store trash indoors until the morning of pick up. 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

Family Flu Clinic at the Community Center

The Colorado Flu Shot Company is offering the four-strain (Quadrivalent), preservative-free flu vaccine for ages 6 months to adult at the Community Center, 1 Club Drive, on Sundays, Oct. 22 and 29 from 1-4 p.m. The vaccine is \$40, payable with cash, check, MasterCard or Visa.

The Quadrivalent has two strains of Influenza A and two strains of Influenza B. This provides better coverage, especially for children.

Children are most at risk for secondary infections and complications from the flu (pneumonia, bronchitis, strep throat, ear infections, etc.). The flu virus results in more childhood hospitalizations than any other vaccine-preventable disease.

Other individuals at higher risk include anyone with asthma, heart disease, kidney disease, a compromised immune system, newborns and pregnant women. School-age children/students are also the most common source of spreading the virus. The virus can live on surfaces such as desks, keyboards, door handles and telephones for three days. Annually, 36,000 deaths occur in the United States from influenza. The protection from the influenza vaccine lasts approximately one year.

Parental consent is required for individuals under 18 years. Vaccinations will be provided by a Pediatric RN.

The Colorado Flu Shot Company also provides other vaccinations, including those for international travel (yellow fever, typhoid, meningococcal, polio). A travel appointment is necessary. Metropolitan District 2016 Audit Provides Good News, Bad News

As a quasi-governmental agency, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District is required to have annual financial statements audited by an independent Certified Public Accountant (CPA) qualified in governmental accounting practices. Shilling and Company, Inc. of Highlands Ranch has provided audit services to KCRMD for the past several years.

Auditing of the KCRMD 2016 financial statements is now complete (and available for review on the Ken-Caryl Ranch website at www.ken-carylranch.org under Administration, then Budgets & Reports). In his review with the KCRMD Board and District Manager, Neil Shilling, principal of Shilling and Company, Inc., offered a very frank assessment. The good news: KCRMD successfully passed the audit. The bad news: getting there was considerably more difficult than it should have been.

In a letter to the Board, Neil laid out his concerns regarding "deficiencies in the District's internal control," meaning that record keeping had lagged and accuracy had suffered. This necessitated a dedicated effort during the summer to bring records to a state that the audit could be completed. Along the way, numerous bookkeeping errors were found and corrected, with a typical error being an entry posted to the wrong fund in the ledger.

Neil was quick to emphasize that he had found no evidence of suspicion of fraud or malfeasance. He observed that the issues he identified may have been the result of personnel focusing on management and oversight of capital projects funded by the bond measure, as well as the disruption caused by extensive construction at the Ranch House. But in discussions with District Manager Melissa Daruna and the Board, Neil made clear his opinion that the root cause of the problem was KCRMD attempting to make-do with a part-time Finance Director. In Neil's opinion, KCRMD, with an annual budget of over \$5 million and significant capital projects in work, has simply reached a state where a full-time Finance Director is necessary.

"There comes a point at which costcutting becomes counter-productive by causing more problems than it solves. In Neil's opinion we had reached and passed that point," said Board Vice President Bob Generoli.

Additionally, Neil noted that KCRMD's recreation registration software appears to have problems interfacing with the accounting software, and that the accounting software itself may not be "fully compatible with government fund accounting," necessitating additional effort to meet governmental accounting requirements.

In response to the issues identified by Neil, the District Manager requested

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approval from the Board to hire a full-time Finance Director with CPA credentials. The Board approved and the search for candidates began in late summer. Candace

Stange was selected for the position.

Candace, a Ken-Caryl resident and CPA, brings more than 15 years of professional experience to KCRMD. In previous jobs, Candace has managed the accounting and treasury of multiple funds within one organization, created and implemented new accounting processes and reports, prepared and managed annual budgets and provided financial forecasting. As KCRMD's new Finance Director, her first priority will be to review 2017 accounting records to ensure that they are now current and accurate, and thus form a solid basis for the 2018 budget which is currently being developed. Additionally, Candace will conduct a review of KCRMD's accounting software needs and capabilities.

"As unpleasant as it was to hear, the Board is grateful to Neil Shilling for being forthright concerning our accounting issues. We look forward to Candace joining us and making sure the 2017 audit goes smoothly," said Director Generoli.

WOW Carwash to Host Haunted Tunnel Event Oct. 27-31, 4-7 p.m.



The Drug Take-Back Day provides an opportunity for the public to surrender expired, unwanted or unused pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medications for destruction. These drugs are a potential source of supply for illegal use and an unacceptable risk to public health and safety.

The next Drug Take-Back Day is Saturday, Oct. 28 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. The Sheriff's Office will accommodate collections at three sites in the County:


- Dakota Ridge High School (13399 W. Coal Mine Ave., Littleton)
- Sheriff's Office Headquarters (200 Jefferson County Parkway, Golden)
- · Conifer High School (10441 Co. Rd. 73,

This one-day effort is intended to bring national focus to the issue of increasing pharmaceutical controlled substance abuse.

- The program is anonymous.
- Prescription and over-the-counter solid dosage medications (tablets and capsules) are accepted.
- · Intravenous solutions, injectables, needles and oxygen containers will not be accepted.
- Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not a part of this initiative
- The prescriptions should be removed from the original containers and placed in a plastic bag prior to drop off. A MedReturn Drug Collection Unit is available at the Jefferson Center for Mental Health south entrance on the second floor (9485 West Colfax Ave.) Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. At this location, unwanted, unused and expired household medications, including prescriptions and over-the-

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

Political Signage Policy

The laws regarding political signs are part of Section 106.5 of CCIOA (Colorado Common Interest Ownership Act) which defines a political sign as "a sign that carries a message intended to influence the outcome of an election, including supporting or opposing the election of a candidate, the recall of a public official or the passage of a ballot issue."

- Professionally made signs will be allowed on private property only (including property owned by the Master Association) with approval of the private property owner no more than 45 days prior to the day of the election and must be removed within one week after the election. Neither attended nor unattended signage is allowed on property owned or maintained by the Master Association without the approval of the Master Association Board of Directors.
- The term "attended signage" is meant to include handheld signs or signs in close proximity to a person promoting a candidate or issue. "Unattended signage" is meant to be signage which is not attended signage and includes, for example, signage placed on or in vehicles, fixtures or equipment etc.
- Per Jefferson County Zoning Resolution Section 11 D.8,
 Political signs shall not exceed 6 square feet in area and shall
 not be placed unattended on public rights of way. However,
 attended signs on public rights of way are allowed.
- Political signs shall not exceed 54" in height from the ground.
- Political signs may not be attached to fences.
- Political signs on any owner's property are limited to one per office or ballot issue.
- Political signs may not be attached to utility boxes, light poles, traffic signals or trees.
- Since sidewalks are for pedestrians, permitted signs on private or public property should be placed on grass areas next to the sidewalk.
- Political signs posted in violation of these guidelines may be removed by the Master Association without further notice.
- These political signage guidelines are intended to address political signs only. All other signs will continue to be regulated by the Association's Declaration of Covenants, Conditions, and Restrictions and the Rules and Regulations documents.

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

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



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Wildfires in Northern California - Lessons for Ken-Caryl

As wildfires rage across northern California, destroying homes and lives, the fires leave behind a curious checkerboard of destruction. One neighborhood was reduced to ashes and twisted metal. But houses nearby suffered little more than scorched grass and singed trees. Many of the homes that survived had little flammable brush in the area immediately around them. But others had dry grass and shrubs within feet of the walls. Often, those are the ones that unfortunately were lost to the fire.

The difference between a surviving house and a charred husk could come down to details as small as screens over attic vents, trimmed trees, or pine needles in the gutters. Scientists have gained a whole new understanding of factors that can help a home survive a wildfire. And it turns out that saving a house has less to do with stopping a forest fire cold or creating a nonflammable moonscape for a hundred feet in every direction. It's more about lots of minor modifications and regular maintenance.

As wildfires grow bigger and more intense—the product of drought, disease, climate change, and buildup of flammable



material from decades of extinguishing nearly all fires—and annual federal spending on firefighting surpasses \$1 billion, the new science of fireproofing has some experts asking if federal, state and local agencies should be steering more money toward making homes and communities fire resistant.

The tiny embers, or firebrands, as they are known among firefighters are often the culprits. Blown far from a wildfire by the wind, these bits of burning debris can wreak havoc if they collect in flammable spots around a house: a gutter filled with pine needles, an unscreened vent leading into an attic, or a trash can left open against a wall.

That's different from an older belief—one often still widely held by the public—that a wildfire's dramatic, towering flames march through a neighborhood, incinerating buildings in their path. But firebrands can shower a house that's situated a quarter mile or more from a wildfire.

Wildfire home fire losses differ from typical residential fire losses. Residential fires usually involve one structure with a totally destroyed homes. Particularly during severe WUI, multiple homes can ignite in a very short time. The usual result is that a home either survives or is totally destroyed; only a few structures incur partial damage.

The WUI fire commonly originates in wildland fuels. During dry, windy conditions in areas with continuous fine fuels, a wildland fire can spread rapidly, outpacing the initial attack of firefighters. If residences arc nearby, a wildland fire can expose numerous homes to firebrands. A rapidly spreading wildland fire coupled with highly ignitable homes can cause many homes to burn simultaneously. This wildfire involving many homes can overwhelm fire protection capabilities. Severe WUI fires can destroy whole neighborhoods in a few hours. Whether a home survives depends initially on whether it ignites; if ignitions with continued burning occur, survival then depends on effective fire suppression. Home survival begins with attention to the factors that influence ignition.

Each year more Americans move into WUI: zones, including Ken-Caryl Ranch and Valley, where human habitation meets forests or grasslands. Many wildfires start in such places; under the right conditions, flames or embers can easily spread to nearby homes. Fortunately, there are ways to make a house in those zones less vulnerable to fire, from the choice of building materials to the landscaping decisions:

- metal sheets provide better protection than wood.
- 2. Seal Off Openings Put metal screens over vents and other openings to block embers
- 3. Prune Branches Flames can jump from branches hanging over the roof of the
- 4. Mow the Lawn Keep grass short and well-watered to hinder the spread of flames.
- 5. Pick Up Debris Remove leaf litter and pine needles from gutters and remove dead limbs from around the house.
- 6. Lighten Landscaping Spacing out trees and shrubs makes it harder for flames to travel and easier for firefighters to work. The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee urges you to take steps toward improving fire safety in your home. More information is available at firewise.org.






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

Alexander Mueller Joins Regiment of Midshipmen at U.S. **Merchant Marine** Academy

Alexander Gunther Mueller, son of Gunther and Sue Anne Mueller of Ken-Caryl Ranch, was recently sworn in as a Midshipman in the United States Naval Reserve at the United States Merchant Marine Academy (USMMA) at Kings Point, N.Y. He was nominated by Congressman Ken Buck of Colorado's 4th Congressional District.

The United States Merchant Marine Academy is a federal service academy that educates and graduates licensed Merchant Marine officers. In addition to the rigorous academic and physical requirements for admission, applicants must be nominated by their Congressman or Senator.

It is one of five federal service academies, which include the Military Academy at West Point, the Naval Academy at Annapolis, the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs and the U.S. Coast Guard Academy in New London, Connecticut.

All USMMA graduates earn both a Bachelor of Science degree and a Merchant Marine Officer license, and incur an obligation to serve the country as an active or reserve officer in the U.S. Armed Forces.

The U.S. Flag Merchant Marine – manned by U.S. merchant mariners – is essential for securing the country's commerce in peacetime and delivering warfighters, weapons and military supplies in times of conflict. The majority of "Kings Pointers" will serve as Navy reservists in the Strategic Sealift Officer Program while working aboard U.S. flag vessels; others will serve on active duty in our nation's armed forces.

As part of his fouryear education, Alexander will spend one year training as a cadet aboard ocean-going vessels. USMMA is the only federal academy where students train on

commercial vessels traveling around the globe.



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


