The Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Parks Department is only responsible for snow removal on Ranch-owned property. The first priority for snow removal by the Parks Department is clearing snow from Ranch buildings for access and safety. Crews will be dispatched to shovel, apply sand and ice melt, and to plow snow to maintain safe access to all Ranch-owned/operated facilities while the facilities are open. Snow removal activities may cease after all facilities are closed for the day and resume prior to the next business day's scheduled opening. Second priority will be given to designated sidewalks and paved trails for snowfalls greater than three inches.

Thank you to so many of you who have provided your input on our survey questions about the future of trash/ recycling at Ken-Caryl. We received almost 700 responses and several comments. Some people are interested in the totes. Others preferred for the service to remain status quo as they do not want to handle the larger totes or do not think they have room for them. At the Board meeting last week the Board decided to provide a hybrid system. Trash and recycling will be serviced each week, and homeowners will have the option of using either the totes or continuing just as you are doing now using your own containers (either small trash cans or bags). Please watch for more

details in future issues of Life at Ken-Caryl. Residents were also asked if they would be interested in a composting service. About 21 percent of respondents indicated they would be willing to pay extra for composting. We will offer this option, but it will only move forward if at least 500 residents sign up through Waste Connections. We will announce details and sign-up procedures for this service option soon.

The Board also asked for your thoughts about the future of our neighborhood signs. Again we received several responses, and they were mixed. Some do not think there is a need for the neighborhood signs; others think they are important. Some felt that the Master Association should continue maintaining and as necessary replace the signs; others were willing and felt it was appropriate for the neighborhoods to be responsible for their own signs. The Board would like to thank everyone for their comments. The comments didn't give clear direction on how to proceed, so the Board would like to survey the residents about the different options. Stay tuned for details about the survey.

Metro District Board

The following is a summary of items from the Oct. 27 regular meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board:

- The Board conducted the Public Hearing on the Proposed 2016 Budget.
- The Board received an update on the construction of the Veterans Monument at Community Park. The dedication ceremony is set for Nov. 7 at noon.
 The Board discussed the
- Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) with Foothills Park and Recreation District regarding the Ridge Rec Center and the Peak Community & Wellness Center. The Board decided to keep the IGA in place for 2016 for the Ridge. However, the Peak will no longer be part of the IGA once the renovations for the Community Center are completed and the renovated fitness area is opened.
- The Board approved a grant application through Jefferson County Open Space for a 2016 Local Park and Recreation Grant.
- The Board approved the Great Outdoors Colorado grant application that will be submitted for an outdoor environmental education area at Dakota Lodge Park.
- The Board reviewed a regular monthly report of expenditures for the bond projects.
- The Board approved a lease/purchase proposal with Wells Fargo Equipment Financing for new fitness equipment at the Community Center following the renovation of the facility.
- The Board approved an engagement letter for 2015 Audit Services with Schilling & Company.
- The Board discussed plans for the Open House for Heirloom Park scheduled for Wednesday, Nov. 11 from 4:30-6:30 p.m. at the Ranch House.

Master Association Board

The following is a summary of items from the Oct. 27 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- The Board discussed the drainage issue behind 93 North Ranch Road.
- The Board discussed the status of the revegetation of the cheatgrass treatment areas west of the Massey Draw trailhead. The Open Space Committee reviewed these areas and recommended staff continue with the current plan as it has been successful. The Board agreed.
- The Board discussed 2016 Waste Connections trash and recycling service options. After reviewing resident survey results, the Board agreed to offer two options. Most respondents favored weekly recycling service so that will be provided in either case. Residents will be

Bond & Improvement Projects

Bond Improvement Projects Status Update

The last update provided in Life at Ken-Caryl referenced the next milestone in the project as being the issuance of permits by the Jefferson County Building Department. This process can be fairly lengthy, and includes reviews and comments by many entities within Jefferson County.



One step in that process was attending a Planning Commission Hearing on Oct. 14. The project team was in attendance for any questions regarding the improvements. The projects were approved without any public comment or questions from the Planning Commission – a small victory in the process! The building department released the building permit to Adolfson & Peterson for the interior renovation work at the Ranch House.

During the plan review process, our licensed and certified general abatement contractor, CRS/COCA, removed the asbestos-containing materials from the Ranch House Area 1 (Map Room, A/V Room, Adult Lounge and Lobby). Abatement activities needed to occur in advance of demolition activities performed by Adolfson & Peterson, which began on Monday, Oct. 26. The work areas were professionally contained during these activities, eliminating exposure to Ranch House staff. The environmental engineer, CTL Thompson, then performed pre and post-abatement inspections and air sampling as needed. With clearances from CTL Thompson and the Ranch House building permit, Adolfson & Peterson received the green light to proceed with Area 1 demolition and construction activities.

Construction activities on the Dakota Lodge and Community Center will commence once the Jefferson County Building Department provides building and site permits. We anticipate that to occur very soon.

Watch Out for Wildlife in Fall

Fall is the time when wildlife start preparing for winter and is breeding season for deer and elk. Increased activity in the fall can lead to conflicts with wildlife. By adhering to a few guidelines, Ken-Caryl residents can avoid potentially dangerous situations.

- · BEARS are preparing for hibernation, and they will need to consume up to 20,000 calories a day. Residents should remove all attractants like birdfeeders and remember to store trash indoors until the morning of pickup.
- DEER are entering the breeding season and male deer will be searching for mates and can be very aggressive. Never approach male deer and give them plenty of room to escape if encountered.
- VEHICLE COLLISIONS with deer increase in the fall as the days

gets shorter. Please slow down and be aware of major deer crossing areas like the intersection of Valley Parkway and Club Drive and the blind corners on Ken-Caryl Ave. as you enter or leave the Valley.

- NETS Soccer, volleyball or badminton nets are a hazard to deer and elk due to entanglement and can cause serious injury. Please take them down on a daily basis when not in use.
- HOLIDAY LIGHTS that are strung on trees and shrubs can get caught in deer antlers and may hinder movement or feeding. If possible, restrict holiday lights at your home.

at 12 noon. All events will be free and open to the public.



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
League of Women Voters to Discuss Process of Amending the U.S. Constitution

The U.S. Constitution is difficult to amend. In fact, in the more than 220 years since the first 10 amendments known as the Bill of Rights were ratified in 1791, the constitution has been amended only 17 times. History tells us that the framers of the constitution deliberately made it difficult to alter in order to prevent tyranny of the majority; to protect the rights of the minority from oppression.

The League of Women Voters of Jefferson County will be participating in a U.S. League of Women Voters national study of the process of amending the U.S. Constitution. The League believes it is right and permissible to amend the constitution when circumstances demand it. The League itself was born from a decades-long effort to pass the 19th Amendment. The League will be exploring the shared values and beliefs of members regarding circumstances that might allow or compel it to endorse either a constitutional amendment or an Article 5 Convention, and members will answer consensus questions during its six unit meetings Nov. 10-12.

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

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
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Nov. 12 Ken-Caryl Art Guild Meeting to Feature Littleton Artist Susan Hill

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board has created committees to help the Board and staff to manage the affairs of the Master Association. Applications are currently being accepted for committee appointments.

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

Feeding Deer a Big Problem

Note: The following article is probably familiar to regular readers of this paper. Each year, especially in the fall and winter, the Rangers receive calls from residents reporting that a neighbor or friend is feeding deer. People feed deer because they think the animals are unable to survive on their own in harsh winter conditions or because they like to see the animals around their property.

Regardless of the reason, feeding deer does much more harm than aood. Colorado Parks and Wildlife is also verv concerned about this problem because it hastens the spread of diseases like Chronic Wasting Disease. In the past few years new laws have been passed that prohibit placing salt licks on your property to attract deer or to be more careful in putting out feed for wild birds that may also attract deer or bears. The Rangers hope the problem can be resolved through educating residents about the negative effects of feeding deer since even the people who cause the problem do seem genuinely concerned for the deer. Law enforcement would be used as a last resort.

It is not uncommon to see deer in proximity to houses in the Valley of Ken-Caryl Ranch. It also may appear that our deer are concentrated into smaller areas. Deer will concentrate in certain areas for many reasons. Past experience has indicated that this phenomenon occurs, in many cases, when individuals begin feeding them. By feeding the deer, people are breaking the law, and it can actually harm deer and cause other problems. For example:

 Ken-Caryl Ranch is in prime deer habitat. Feeding will not prevent deer from damaging your ornamental plants. It usually results in greater damage to plants as well as those of your neighbors. For information about the use of non-preferred ornamental species, barriers and repellents, you may contact the Ranger staff.

- Deer have a complex digestive system that is not adapted to large amounts of grain, bird seed, bread or many types of hay. Feeding is often unhealthy for deer. Addiction to artificial feeds often results in deer that are in poor condition causing lesions and ulcers in the stomach and esophagus, causing them to be euthanized. Concentrating deer by feeding can also increase stress and hasten the spread of diseases.
- Deer are the primary prey of mountain lions. Concentrating deer by feeding can attract mountain lions well within private property. It may become necessary to kill these lions for public safety. Feeding also concentrates deer in areas where they are more likely to be chased by dogs or hit by cars.

Mammals are very intelligent, and they quickly learn to associate people with food. As a homeowner you can help. If you know of any person feeding deer, please call the Ranger staff at 303-979-1876, ext. 170. We would like to have the opportunity to discuss this problem with any individuals engaged in this activity and stop this behavior for the benefit of our deer population and the community at large that enjoy seeing these animals acting more wild.
