'Thank You' from the MD Board of Directors

On Dec. 1, the Ken Caryl Metropolitan District Board of Directors unanimously approved the District's 2021 Budget – the unceremonious Zoom meeting culmination of an extensive, thorough process under unprecedented circumstances that brought out the best in our staff and in the community.

What happened this year to bring that budget to the table was pretty remarkable and you deserve to hear the whole story.

The District – charged with managing community programming, maintenance of our parks, sidewalks, pools, community property and 900 acres of open space as well as managing all the fee-based programs for our facilities – derives 59 percent of its budget from property taxes, 31 percent from community fees and 10 percent from other sources.

COVID-19 shut-downs and dial-downs this year decimated almost all of our fee-based programs and drilled a massive hole in 2020 fee-revenues for the last nine months – forcing our staff to shuffle and redefine how everything in the District was accomplished in 2020.

Led by District Manager Traci Wieland – who began her job here just over a year ago – our staff rose to the challenge this spring by not only examining every line in the budget, but by scrutinizing how we do everything at every level. Every employee took part in finding and implementing new efficiencies that helped re-shape 2020 operations. Many took on new job responsibilities and helped find new ways to cut costs and do things.

Tough decisions were made, but were executed as part of an organized process. And that remarkable process not only kept the District operating in 2020, but also proved to be an important part of the re-examination of how the District's budget was built for 2021.

"This was not just numbers into systems," Traci told us. "This started with people on the ground getting better and faster, making suggestions and finding efficiencies, who reported up the chain to directors who were involved in what went into the budget."

Traci also recommended to the Board this summer that the 2021 budget process moving forward be based on a "cost-recovery pyramid" – standard procedure for most parks districts on how to rank operations from lawn maintenance, which is completely subsidized without fees, to programs like personal training, which is completely subsidized by user fees.

Take a look at the 2021 budget on the district's website and you'll see a full description of how "cost recovery" works. You'll see a document that is not just a spreadsheet, but sets up the Metro District in what truly is "year one" of a new blueprint on how the district can move forward to meet the community's expectations: fiscal responsibility while delivering on programs and services.

You'll also see how the Metro District and the Master Association are working together in new ways to identify areas where the two jointly benefit and how the community's needs can be funded moving forward. That level of cooperation is a key to keeping Ken-Caryl a desirable community in the future.

Challenges do lie ahead – we're not out of the COVID-era yet, and we do have long-term capital projects to consider – but the Metro District staff, led by Traci and Finance Director Lauren Feeney, have put us in a great position to properly analyze our position and make the decisions together as a community to meet these challenges.

Thank you to everyone who helped us emerge from 2020 with a better view moving forward.

MD Board Meeting Summary

The Metropolitan District Board met on Tuesday, Dec. 1 for its regular board meeting. The following is a summary of that meeting:

- · The public hearing was continued and subsequently closed on the 2021 proposed budget. District Manager Wieland presented updates on the recent COVID restrictions, which impacted the 2021 budget by approximately \$90,000. District Manager Wieland also provided property tax modeling for years 2022 to 2025 showing an estimated 10 percent increase in valuation years with a 1 percent increase in nonvaluation years. The effect produces higher than anticipated property tax revenues; however, funding for ongoing infrastructure and capital projects is not consistent or sustainable. Additional work and conversation is necessary to develop policy direction. A resolution was passed for the 2021 budget and 2021 fee schedule.
- Staff presented an updated Employee Handbook that will go into effect Jan. 1, 2021. A motion was passed later in the agenda approving the revised document.
- The Board approved a letter of engagement with Schilling & Associates for the 2020 audit process.
- Staff presented an option for a new payroll provider. Currently, the District is using two different providers to accomplish timekeeping and payroll processes. Paylocity provides the components necessary for District options and has offered three months free and free W2 services. The Board approved a motion to migrate providers.
- Staff met with Jefferson County planning and North American Development Group regarding the District's options to request inclusion of new developments within Master Association boundaries but not District boundaries. Staff provided an update to the Board, and the Board discussed possible next steps.
- The Board discussed committee assignments now that the Board has been in place for six months. A revised slate of assignments was approved including the previously unfilled position with the Community Planning


Update to Cougar Trail Closures During Muddy Conditions



Since 2017, during the months of October-April, the rangers have been monitoring trail conditions on lower Cougar Trail, Bluebird Trail and the segment of Colorow trail connecting Cougar and Bluebird Trails to Massey Draw Trail and when warranted, have implemented trail closures in this area when excessively muddy conditions exist. When the decision was made to close the trails, it was inclusive of all the trail segments listed above.

Over the past three years, the rangers realized that the area containing these trails was so topographically and vegetatively diverse that a single closure area was not meeting overall management objectives, including natural resource protection and preventing trail damage. Starting in January 2021, a new closure plan will be implemented, which will divide the area into two parts; the eastern closure area and the western closure area (see map). The eastern area usually becomes muddy first and can be closed independently while the western area can still be frozen/snow covered and can remain open. Likewise, when the western area thaws and is muddy it will be closed, but usually by this time the eastern area is dry and stable and will be opened. There could be periods when both areas are closed at the same time.

The rangers will walk the trail segments during times when mud is expected and based on visual inspection, will make the decision on which trail sections to close. If a closure is implemented, chain gates will barricade the effected trail segments and notifications on the KCRMA website and social media will be posted. If you are descending from upper Cougar Trail, please check trail closure status before your trip to open space and plan accordingly.



MA Board Meeting Summary

On Dec. 15, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- Victoria DeSair reported on two Master Association Board seats that will be on the ballot in March 2021. Applications and more information are available at www. ken-carylranch.org.
- North American Development Group closed on their land purchase on Nov. 30. Approximately 700 units will be built within the Master Association boundaries.
- The Board reviewed the 2021 Annual Trails Plan with recommendations for specific projects for the upcoming year.
- Motions passed approving the following:
- o A conceptual trail design in the South Foothills Open Space to provide a focus area for a biological study.
- o A conceptual design of the Stove Prairie Trail Realignment for survey
- o An increase in the number of participants in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association-Willow Springs Open Space Association Trail Use Agreement from 100 to 110.
- The Master Association Check Signing and Expense Approval Policy.
- The 2021 Master Association Committee Membership and new Board Liaisons.
- o A write-off in the amount of \$2,233.65 for a homeowner account that declared bankruptcy.
- Residents Neil Chandra, Brad Walsh, John Hamilton, John Brant, Greg Milano, Jason Ulhman and Patrick McCoy expressed support for the conceptual trail design in the South Foothills Open Space and the value of the Ken-Caryl Ranch trail system.
- Residents Philip Varley, Kathy Webster and Rilla Reinsma expressed concerns regarding the conceptual trail design in the South Foothills Open Space due to concerns for wildlife, aesthetics, habitat fragmentation and potential social trail


- connections to Deer Creek Canyon Road. They requested the Board not approve the conceptual design.
- Resident Rilla Reinsma expressed concerns regarding the Stove Prairie Trail Realignment and resident Patrick McCoy expressed support for the realignment.
- Resident Joel Pankow requested the MA Board advocate for increased snow removal from Jefferson County in cul-desacs in Ken-Caryl Ranch. He expressed concerns regarding the increase in the number of participants in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association-Willow Springs Open Space Association Trail Use Agreement.



Jim and Mary Up the "Antes" When it Comes to KCR Preservation Efforts

When it comes to the dedication to preserving Ken-Caryl Ranch's unique and rich history, Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society Chair Jim Antes and his wife Mary have gone above and beyond in their contributions to this community organization.

From community contributions, paper submissions, awards and online resources to help keep the community abreast of the organizations' tireless efforts, the Antes have left their own legacy and inedible mark on not only the society, but for all of Ken-Caryl Ranch for decades to come.

Recent efforts included the production of a video to commemorate the 50th anniversary of Ken-Caryl Ranch's transition from a privately-owned cattle ranch to be corporation-owned by Johns-Manville. The video features our community development from 1971 to the present time. Many colorful pictures and news

clippings tell the story of Johns-Manville moving its world headquarters from New York City in the 1970s through the construction of various neighborhoods, businesses and amenities that we enjoy today. Additionally, under Jim and Mary's direction, the Landmark and Preservation Committee of the Jefferson County Historical Commission (JCHC) recently awarded the Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society (KCRHS) the recipient of this year's Norm and Ethyl Meyer Award to recognize the Society's historic preservation efforts. JCHC Commission Chair Lee Katherine Goldstein presented Jim with the award during a socially-distanced ceremony at the Bradford-Perley House in October.

"They are truly one of the most active and dedicated volunteer groups on Ken-Caryl Ranch. I would love to give a special thanks to Jim and Mary Antes for leading many of the group's efforts. 



Birch (#226053):





Dear Editor:

I was dismayed to learn that the Open Space Committee unanimously approved without comment an application from "Avout Racing Inspire Juniors" to use Ken-Caryl Ranch facilities twice weekly from March through October for racing practice for up to 40 riders, according to the forms made available prior to the committee meeting. For such privilege, "Avout Racing Inspire Juniors" will charge somewhere between \$495 and \$895 per participant (see http://avoutracing.com/inspirejuniors-race/) depending on the timing. Of that \$28,000 in income, what fraction would be used to reimburse the KCRMA for trail rehabilitation, among other things, were the application approved?

The Colorado Secretary of State's office informs that "Avout Racing Inc." is registered with the State as a nonprofit corporation. I believe the Master Association Board would be neglecting its fiduciary responsibilities to consider an application from this enterprise if it will not show that it is operating legally and ethically.

The Master Association Board must consider the ramifications of effectively partnering with this organization by

granting permission to use the private recreational trails managed by the KCRMA. Given the litigiousness of our times, I wonder if even \$100,000,000 is sufficient liability protection when one of those up to 40 riders is seriously injured, injures a pedestrian, or causes a horse to spook and toss his rider. Who is going to pay for that? Who pays for the rescues?

Without exception, our open space trails cannot survive up to 40 riders in concert, twice each week, for 2.5 hours, over eight months. For proof of that, one need only look at what once was green space at Bradford North. Unless someone pays for remediation, that damage will be visible beyond your children's lifetime. Members of the Board have already heard many complaints from walkers, hikers and equestrians about the declining condition of our open space trails, also compromising safety and many complaints of conflicts on the trails.

I am opposed to Ken-Caryl trails being used for racing of any sort under almost any circumstances. Moreover, KCRMA private recreational trails should not be routinely used as a revenue-generating vehicle even by non-profit entities.

Editor's Note: The Open Space Committee announced the Avout racing discussion on their agenda prior to the meeting and gave residents an opportunity to sign up to comment. The committee listened to concerns and made changes to the conditions of the permit to address concerns.

Dear Editor:

Recent actions by the Open Space Committee and the MA Board are continuing the policies of never-ending trail construction, ignoring those residents who would like to see our remaining open space preserved from such developments. Two new trails are in the pre-construction phase, Docmann South (renamed Wildcat Ridge) and Stove Prairie.

For Docmann South, the MA Board in November approved paying for an environmental study, which is the last legal hurdle before construction can begin. Previous studies concluded that new trails would cause environmental harm, yet construction proceeded. But for Docmann South, the issue is not merely that it will destroy the last remaining square mile of our open space, it is that it will provide access to Ken-Caryl trails for anyone, from Deer Creek Canyon Road.

On Dec. 2, an excellent illustrated presentation of the proposed route was presented to the Open Space Committee. One of the aerial images clearly showed a "social trail" which already exists through the south end of our property. How will access to our trails by trespassers be

prevented, if Docmann South is built?

And why should it be built anyway? There are no metrics justifying its construction. The trails are not overcrowded. Ranger staff data show that Docmann trail users are 20:1 bikers to hikers, so why should 4,000 households subsidize a trail which few will use? Consider also that more than 80 percent of bikers are non-residents, taking advantage of the 5:1 allowed guest to resident ratio, or other reciprocal, or racing agreements.

There are already 50 miles of trails in Ken-Caryl. To suggest, as the presentation did, that such new trail will "create interesting vistas" completely ignores the fact that as shown clearly by the first slide in that presentation, a mile-long gash across the Ken-Caryl facing slope of the hillside will be visible to everyone entering the Valley.

For those who want more interesting vistas, they should expand their territory to the 250 miles of trails maintained by Jefferson County. The responsibility of the MA Board should be to all Ken-Caryl homeowners, not a small special interest group.

Dear Editor:

This Mountain Biker's perspective with three interesting concepts for KCR to consider in 2021.

1. A Dog Park on nearby Jefferson County Open Space.

2. A Conservation Area in KCR Open Space as recommended by two of the Biological Surveys paid for by the MA

3. Our trails should be used to reach points of interest and not as a future mountain bike race course or for practicing dangerous mountain

biking activity. Yes, mountain bike races were held here in 2009 and earlier. Coincidentally, the Trails Master Plan appeared in 2009. To me, it resembles a race course. When the Trail Club presented this Trail Plan there was resident criticism and a comprehensive critique from our competent Ranger Staff Office as being too extensive and a great mistake drafted by the inexperienced. Then we heard this disputed inferior product was merely conceptual? Yet, that is not how some interpret this plan today.

First item of interest: I remember many requests by residents for a Dog Park in KCR. Parking and location were identified as the problem. Jefferson County Open Space just east of South Valley Road would be an ideal spot. There is a JeffCo parking lot already in place. The necessary fencing and gate could be hidden from view so it would not be seen from the road. When I was stationed in New Jersey, my dog loved going to the dog park. Dogs are social animals, and they get along just fine. The KCRMA could simply make the request.

Second item: Designating a fragile portion of our open space as a Conservation Area is a concept everyone can embrace. Open Space preservation is a good and worthy cause. Being able to reach points of interest and observe this area on foot is essential to its preservation rather than bicycling all over it. Other communities throughout the USA and in Colorado are doing this, why not KCR?

Third item: Having a mountain bike practice course is expensive for everyone and benefits the few. KCR should not be known for being the Bandimere Speedway of mountain bike racing activity.
