One Slick Move

A study I read said that one month after making a New Year's resolution, 36 percent of the people have already broken it. Nobody wants to face 11 months of failure, so my idea is to start over with a new goal. And the beauty of this one is that it provides a natural hiatus for several months in the middle to avoid burn-out and loss of momentum!

If you have a sidewalk in front of, on the side of, or behind your property PLEASE vow to keep it cleared of snow. All winter – every winter – we get visits, calls, emails and letters from residents complaining about the treacherous conditions for pedestrians throughout the neighborhoods. While this is not a covenant issue nor violation of a county ordinance, I am addressing it because frustrated residents turn here for help. Ours is an active community, and folks can be seen walking and running from early morning until after dark, regardless of the temperatures. Whether it's children walking to school or the bus, dog-walkers or joggers, they should have clear paths to minimize slipping hazards and to avoid having to walk in the street and contend with motor vehicle traffic.

In theory there would not be disagreement that pedestrian safety is important, and nobody wants negligence to result in even one tragic accident. When theory advances to action requiring effort is often where the disconnect occurs. If you have an argument which you believe absolves you from clearing the snow, try explaining it to the next person struggling to pass by your property. If there are obstacles to achieving clear walkways, you may wish to consider contracting with a landscape service or hiring a young person from the Teen Services listing at the back of Life at Ken-Caryl.

If you're still reading at this point, I would like to thank you for being a conscientious snow shoveler, or commiserate with you for having experienced slippery walkways. In conclusion, remember: de-icing – it's what's for winter!

Lower Level of Community Center to Open in Early March

Previous articles have outlined the interior construction phases at the Community Center. The lower level renovations will occur first, with the upper (main) level construction

occurring second. Perhaps by now you have seen some site work activity, which recently included the demolition of the four north tennis courts.

The lower level transformation includes having one contiguous level of fitness facilities. The racquetball floors were raised, and the locker rooms were reconfigured. There's a dedicated cardio area and a larger group exercise room that also are part of the lower level changes. Many 'behind the scenes' improvements were also included. New electrical panels and lighting, replacement of older plumbing, and a greater level of insulation are some of those improvements. A new LULA (Limited Use Limited Access) elevator will also make the lower level and the Dakota Room accessible.

The biggest benefit of the Community Center's lower level will be the incorporation of new fitness equipment. Commercial Fitness Solutions will be providing new equipment within the cardio and weight training areas. The equipment has been selected, ordered, and is on track for an early March delivery. Once the equipment is installed, and all inspections have passed, the lower level will re-open to the residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch. Access to the lower level will be through the main, front doors. Adolfson & Peterson will use signage and partitions to safely segregate staff and residents from construction

Everyone is excited to complete work on the lower level and present the new and improved fitness facilities to the Ken-Caryl Ranch community.

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

The following is a summary of items from the Feb. 9 business meeting of the KCR Master Association Board:

- The Board discussed 2016 goals.
- A motion was passed approving the 2016 vendor list.
- A motion was approved adopting a recommendation from the Open Space Committee to adopt a new rule for landscape violations.
- A motion was approved amending Open Space and Parks Rules No. 24 regarding remote-controlled aircraft (drones).
- A motion was approved appointing Kedra Hood to the Community Planning
- A motion was approved authorizing staff to enter into a three-year contract with Colorado State Forest Service to provide technical services for forest management, grants writing, public education on wildfire issues, oversight of contractual work and continued management of the Firewise Board. Annual cost not to exceed \$5,000.
- A motion was approved establishing the Parks Advisory Committee and appointing members.
- A motion was tabled regarding the neighborhood signs procedure as presented by the Parks Advisory Committee.
- The motion was approved adopting the 2016 Trails Management Plan. You can review the plan at www.ken-carylranch.org under the Open Space tab.





New Proposed Neighborhood Sign Policy and Procedure

Several neighborhood signs throughout the community look dated, and the recently adopted Community Plan includes an objective to promote one consistent Ranch-wide community.

Therefore, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association is looking to adopt a policy at their March 15 meeting with the goal of eliminating these signs. However, if a neighborhood is willing to take on the responsibility, including the cost, of replacing and maintaining their sign, the Master Association will work with them to facilitate. It is anticipated that this will be a multi-year process.





The signs for Village, Cimarron, Territory, Saddlewood, Spread and Deer Creek are the first set of signs to be targeted. If the policy is adopted, communication will be sent to homeowners in those neighborhoods informing the owners that they will need to demonstrate support via a survey of all residents in that neighborhood. The survey results should show a desire to retain their existing sign or install a new sign consistent with the family of signs recently installed throughout the Ranch and that they are willing to pay all related expenses. The survey results must demonstrate that at least 51 percent of the homes in the neighborhood wish to keep the sign.

Homeowners will be given 90 days in which to respond. A responsible representative must also be identified so that staff will have a point of contact for the sign. If a neighborhood advises that they are not willing to maintain their existing sign or if no advisory is received within 90 days, the Master Association will remove the sign/signs.

The Master Association will work with subassociations and owners of neighborhood signs on private property in an attempt to either eliminate those signs or bring them up to the current design standard. It should be noted that Jefferson County may not allow replacement of some existing signs in their current locations due to new traffic sightline requirements. As such, if a neighborhood chooses to replace an existing sign with a new one, the new sign may not be located in the same spot as the existing sign.

The Volunteer Patrollers serve as an extension of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association's Park Ranger Staff. Volunteer Patrollers provide rules education, trail use guidelines and private open space information. Volunteer Patrollers strive to achieve and maintain a positive relationship with different user groups, and present a professional image. To be accepted into the program, you must submit a signed application and letter of commitment and complete a two to three hour training in April. Details forthcoming on exact date.

The basic requirements are to perform at least two trail patrols per month mainly from May through October but can also be outside of these months too. Must be 25 years of age or older, attend trainings and be willing to make routine contacts checking residency and provide basic rules education.

Patrollers will receive all related training and will be supplied with a yellow vest, volunteer ID, first aid kit, and a packet with brochures, patrol log and quick reference sheet. 



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Delivery of New Trash and Recycling Totes Underway

Residents now have the option of continuing to use their own trash and recycling containers (either trash cans or bags) or of using 96-gallon totes provided at no charge by Waste Connections. For those residents who have ordered their totes, Waste Connections began delivery in mid-February, but it will take a few weeks for all totes to be delivered. Please be patient if you haven't received your totes.


The totes have wheels and are 42 inches tall, the top measures 30x34 inches, and the bottom is 24x24 inches. If you still want to order totes, send an email to kencarylco@ wasteconnections.com or call the Ranch House at 303-979-1876. In the email or phone message, say that you want to sign up for totes and provide your name, address, email address and phone number. You can

request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.

When you receive your new totes, we recommend putting your address on the totes so that they don't get mixed up with other totes. If you have an old recycling bin that you no longer need, you can put it out with the trash for disposal. Another alternative is to see if any of your friends or neighbors who are not going to use the new totes would like to have an extra bin.

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FireWise and the CodeRed Emergency Notification System in Jefferson County

The CodeRed Emergency Notification
System is available to all residents
of Jefferson County, including KenCaryl Ranch. CodeRed is used by law
enforcement, fire departments and
Emergency Medical Services (EMS)
agencies to alert residents of emergencies
in their area, including wildfire evacuation
notices

Many people do not realize that when they dial 911 on a landline phone, their location is displayed to the emergency dispatcher taking the call at the Public Safety Access Point (PSAP). This process is known as "reverse lookup" and allows a dispatcher to quickly determine the caller's location. The operator can also dispatch help to the address and proceed with emergency response even if the call is disconnected or the caller is unable to speak due to a medical emergency or threat.

But what happens if a caller uses a mobile phone? That's the problem affecting many people today. According to a 2012 report from the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, more than 55 percent of American households with residents between the ages of 15 and 24 years old do not have a home phone. As more households choose mobile phones over landline phones, fewer people are receiving reverse 911 calls. Instead, they're opting for alternate contact method including mobile phones.

CodeRed allows citizens to enter various communication paths so he or she can be reached in emergencies. For the past few years, citizen opt-in portals have

been popping up on various municipal websites, making it easy for people to add multiple contact methods, even while away from home. Meanwhile, the implementation of these systems corresponds with the rising demand for new and more personal ways of receiving communications.

As a new, information-hungry generation emerges, more people expect to be informed. When it comes to lifethreatening situations, it is an expectation of the population to be notified immediately via several contact paths.

Jefferson County residents and businesses can register their mobile phone numbers or Voice over Internet Protocol (VoIP) phone numbers to receive emergency notifications. "Landline" phones are automatically included in the CodeRED database for each emergency agency.

CodeRED reaches numbers from two databases. One is the county's 911 database, which contains all listed and unlisted landlines. If you have a landline, it is automatically included in this database. The second is a database of mobile phone and VoIP numbers — established in 2009 — whose owners have opted in to receive the calls. If you don't have a traditional landline phone, or would like to receive a text, email or cell phone call in addition to the call on your landline phone, consider registering for this free service.

The CodeRed Emergency Notification System is designed to quickly provide important information to local residents regarding critical incidents. Because the CodeRed Emergency system is designed to call landlines within the community, those residents and businesses currently without a landline telephone must register their contact information to be on the emergency notification list. The CodeRed registration website www. your911.net is available to register your

contact information and preferences. Please note that residents who have previously registered their phone numbers must re-register under the new CodeRed Emergency Notification System to update their contact information.

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
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Seasonal Park Ranger
