




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# Extended Hours at the Ranch House



Now that you are aware of these critical rules, you'll be better prepared to handle the ornery bunny herds – without the idea of acquiring a gang of bunny-fighting chickens.



## Commissioners Vote Down **Proposed Building** of South Jeffco **American Furniture** Warehouse

**Jefferson County commissioners** recently voted down a proposal to allow for retailer American Furniture Warehouse to build a 150,000-squarefoot furniture store and warehouse just west of the intersection of C-470 and



Jeffco's Planning & Zoning staff denied the proposed development, citing that it failed to meet the majority of the county's five criteria for appropriating a rezoning, which includes: degree of conformance with applicable land uses, the ability to mitigate negative impacts on the surrounding area and the availability of the necessary infrastructure and services.

# **MA Board Meeting** Summary

On March 16, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- Ken-Caryl Ranch will be hosting a virtual **Professional Community Association** Manager Case Study on April 15 – 16.
- The Board discussed community safety related to car break-ins and thefts. Most incidents have involved unlocked cars. Staff will provide community education about locking cars, will research neighborhood watch programs and will research security cameras for neighborhood entrances.
- Open Space Manager Sean Warren presented a Wildfire Hazard Fuels Assessment of areas along North Massey Draw and Brannon Gearhart Park. Recommendations included mowing, clearing woody vegetation, replacing flammable fences with non-flammable materials and homes creating defensible spaces. Staff will research the cost for a broader survey of all open space wildfire interface areas.
- The MA Board did not vote on the motion to approve the eagle monitoring survey and nocturnal animal survey. The Board is requesting input from the Open Space Committee on the two surveys and is requesting additional information from the consultant regarding the timing of the surveys.
- The MA Board approved a motion selecting Corona Insights in the amount of \$19,780 for administration of the 2021 Community Survey.
- The MA Board approved Board officers and committee liaisons for 2021.
- Public comment at the meeting included concerns regarding community safety and crime, fire danger on private property and open space, support for and concerns regarding additional studies related to golden eagles and nocturnal species in the Wildcat Ridge area, support for the concept of a dog park on Jefferson County land and support for clear questions in the 2021 Community Survey.

### **Bobcat Sightings**

If you don't know already, you live in Bobcat (lynx rufus) country! Bobcats primarily go near your home because they are attracted to a food source and/ or shelter opportunities that present themselves nearby. This is normal activity due to the fact that bobcats favor foothills, canyons, mesas and plateaus, where brush and woodland areas provide suitable habitat. This is also the time that bobcats are looking for a den to breed their young which happens in late winter and spring.



#### How do you identify a bobcat?


Bobcats, sometimes called wildcats, are roughly twice as big as the average housecat. They have long legs, large paws and tufted ears similar to those of their larger relative, the Canada lynx, which have recently been released in Colorado. Most bobcats are brown or brownish red with a white underbelly and short, black-tipped tail. The bobcat is named for its tail, which appears to be cut or "bobbed."

### What to do if you come in contact with a bobcat?

Seeing a bobcat is a truly amazing moment. The best thing to do is to enjoy them from a safe distance as to not put yourself or the bobcat in danger. However, if you feel threatened, the next step would be to haze them. Hazing not harassing is defined as an activity that humanely makes bobcats and/or wildlife more afraid, instilling their natural fear for humans. You can use things such as noisemakers, bang pots and pans, yell, wave arms and run toward them to try and deter them from returning to the area. We stress that you do not harass bobcats or any wildlife. The winter months are stressful on wildlife, especially as the snow accumulates and wildlife find it difficult to get around. Harassing would include feeding, trapping, domesticating, or shooting.

### What do you do if a bobcat is frequenting your backyard?

To keep bobcats away from your home, try to eliminate all food and water



sources they may have access to. Similar to feral cats, if bobcats are continuously fed, they will continue to come around your home. You should also consider blocking off shelter-like areas, like bushes, thickets and hollows, rooftops, attics and the space underneath decks, where bobcats may set up a residence.

### Preventative measures you can take to avoid conflicts with bobcats are:

- Make sure there are no food attractants near your home or in the area, i.e., bird feeders, pet food, trash, etc.
- Feed your pets inside, or remove uneaten pet food between feedings.
- · Keep your pets in a secured enclosure.
- Close or patch openings in fences.
- Keep shrubbery, grass, weeds, etc. trimmed to deny bobcats hiding cover.
- · Work with your neighbors and local wildlife officers to achieve a consistent solution to the situation.

As our cities and infrastructure of the Front Range and throughout the state of Colorado grow, new and expanding subdivisions and developments have a major impact on wildlife and wildlife habitat. Wildlife is usually displaced by development whereas other species i.e., coyotes, bears, mountain lions and bobcats, are able to adapt and live in nearby open spaces, parks, drainage ways, creeks or rivers. In most cases, people and wildlife can coexist without conflict. The most important key is to respect wildlife. Most dangerous conflicts and encounters happen because people choose not to respect and leave wildlife alone. If you are a having a wildlife conflict that poses or could possibly pose immediate danger for the animal or humans in the area, please contact your local Colorado Parks and Wildlife office enforcement agency by visiting https://cpw. state.co.us/.



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


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## The Home Ignition **Zone: Protecting** Your Property from Wildfire

The Home Ignition Zone is defined as the home and everything around it out to 100 feet (more on steeper slopes). Ken-Caryl is a community at risk for wildfire. All of Ken-Caryl lies within the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). With our hot, dry summers and abundant fuels, it is not a matter of if a wildfire will occur, but when. Wildfire can threaten homes, property and lives. But it also plays important ecological roles, such as reducing fuels and recycling nutrients.

Historically, not all wildfires in Colorado were the same. Some burned much hotter than others. Some forests burned more frequently, but the fires were less intense. Generally, the state's wetter regions tended to experience intense, but infrequent fires, while drier locations experienced much more frequent low- and moderateintensity fire. In recent decades, hotter, drier summers and a buildup of flammable vegetation have led to an increase in fire size and severity in these drier areas of the state. The three largest wildfires in Colorado history all occurred in 2020.

For homeowners, living with wildfire means protecting your home and property from damaging fires while creating a home and property that are fire-resistant — meaning one that can experience a

wildfire and survive, more or less intact. For communities, living with wildfire means suppressing wildfires when necessary, but also encouraging the use of prescribed fire at times and in locations where appropriate.

#### Personal wildfire preparedness

Get ready. If a wildfire occurs, you may be evacuated. Become familiar with the three levels of evacuation preparedness (Be Ready, Be Set, Go!). In Ken-Caryl, you should always be at level 1 (Be Ready). At level 2 (Be Set), you should be ready to evacuate at a moment's notice. At level 3 (Go!), leave immediately.

Create an emergency kit and an evacuation plan that lists what you need to take with you, where it is and how you are going to get it away from your property.

Remember these six "P" items in the event you need to evacuate:

- 1. People and pets
- 2. Papers, phone numbers and documents
- 3. Prescriptions, vitamins and eyeglasses
- 4. Pictures and irreplaceable memorabilia
- 5. Personal computers, hard drives, cellphones, chargers, batteries, etc.
- 6. Plastic (credit cards, ATM cards) and cash

#### The Home Ignition Zone

Homes built in the wildland-urban interface, where urban and suburban areas intermingle with the surrounding forest or other wildland vegetation, are at high risk from wildfire. Home ignition in a wildfire typically occurs when:

1. Radiant heat from nearby burning vegetation or structure fires rises to a level that induces combustion.



- 2. Surface fires reach the walls or roof of the home.
- Embers, also known as firebrands, fall on combustible materials on or around the home
- 4. Most commonly, homes are lost in wildfires when they come into contact with embers or low-intensity surface fires — not from a giant wall of flames from an advancing wildfire.

The Home Ignition Zone (HIZ) is defined as the home itself and everything around it out to 100 feet (out to 200 feet on steeper slopes). The condition of your HIZ is the primary factor that determines whether your home will survive a wildfire. The good news is that there is much you can do to reduce your risk!

The HIZ is divided into three zones:

#### 1. Immediate zone (0-5 feet)

This zone includes the home itself and everything out to 5 feet from the foundation. Consider the composition and condition of your roof. The roof is the most vulnerable component of a home when it comes to wildfire. The roof should be made of a combustion-resistant material, such as those in Class A (clay tiles, metal, slate, composition shingles).

Keep the roof and gutters free of debris and tree litter. This is one easy and effective way to prevent embers from igniting there. Combustible gutters, such as those made of vinyl, can fail under radiant heat, exposing the underlying surface to direct flame contact.

Windows and siding that fail due to radiant heat exposure can expose the interior of the home or the underlying structure, both of which are more susceptible to direct flame contact and ember showers. Install metal mesh screening with 1/8-inch openings, which has been shown to reduce the chances of embers entering the home.

Maintain a noncombustible area at least 5 feet wide around the base of your home. Use gravel, rock mulches or hard surfaces such as brick and pavers. Remove dead vegetation and debris under decks. Never store lumber, firewood or other flammable materials underneath. Install screen under low-profile decks to prevent ember entry.

Keep accessories such as patio furniture, gas grills and even welcome mats in an enclosed storage area or away from the home when the wildfire threat is high.

These can be a source of ignition under an ember shower.

### 2. Intermediate zone (5-30 feet)

This zone should be "lean, clean and green." Discourage fire-prone, flammable vegetation within 30 feet of the house to keep it "lean." Maintain a low density of vegetation in general. Keep it "clean" by preventing the accumulation of dead vegetation or flammable debris within this area. Keep plants healthy and "green" by watering sufficiently during fire season. For most homeowners, the lean, clean and green area is the residential landscape. This zone often has irrigation, contains ornamental plants and should be maintained annually.

#### 3. Extended zone (30-100+ feet)

This area extends from the 30-foot lean, clean and green area out to at least 100 feet, and up to 200 feet or more on steeper slopes with thick vegetation. It typically lies beyond the residential landscape and often consists of naturally occurring plants such as conifer and hardwood trees, brush, weeds and grass. You may find that your Home Ignition Zone overlaps onto adjacent properties. Work closely with



neighbors to reduce your shared risk.

#### **Access is Critical**

Clearly post your home address on your home. Make sure your driveway has the proper clearance for large fire equipment. Firefighters cannot safely defend a structure that has inadequate ingress and egress routes or one that lacks defensible space.


