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Show Your Interest in the Optional Composting Service



Metro District Board

On March 22, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors and discussed the following items and took the following actions:

- Staff updated the Board on the planned park renovation projects at Heirloom, Saddlewood and Territory Parks.
- The Board reviewed a draft resolution to establish the hiring process for the District Manager.
- The Board received an update on discussions for a new easement agreement with the Ken-Caryl Ranch Water and Sanitation District at the Community Center.
- The Board reviewed the Investment Report for the fourth quarter of 2015.
- The Board took action to approve an application for a liquor permit for the Sept. 24 Barn BrewHa special event planned at Dakota Lodge.
- The Board took action to approve relocation of the Manor House prairie dogs to designated sites in the South Hogback open space.
- The Board took action to cancel the May 3 Board of Director election and to deem Lauri Lehan-Milano, Jeff Esbenshade and Jami Jensen elected to the Board of Directors to serve until May
- Staff reported that the new fitness room at the Community Center is now open for use by patrons.
- The Board received an update from the Veterans Monument Committee on the progress of the bronze eagle being designed for the site.
- The Board discussed ideas for a planned budget summit meeting with the **Master Association Board of Directors** sometime this spring.
- The Board reviewed a monthly staff report of bond project expenditures since the inception of the projects.

Open Space Weed Management

Spring is here and, along with warmer temperatures and longer days, weeds are starting to appear in lawns, parks and open space areas. As part of an integrated management approach, herbicide applications and mowing are used to combat weed infestations in the open space. This year's herbicide applications will be conducted from approximately April to July depending on weather and growing conditions. Mowing operations are usually performed in late summer to prevent seed production.

Bare ground areas like picnic pads, hard surface trails and kiosk pads are treated first with a pre-emergent herbicide. Applications can be conducted before weeds emerge, and these herbicides prevent weeds from germinating in the area throughout the growing season.

The next weeds managed are the biennial weed species like musk thistle and knapweed. Knapweed and musk thistle are list B noxious weed species, which mandates that landowners make attempts to control and stop the spread of these weed species. The first year and early spring growth form for these weeds is a rosette of basal leaves lying close to the ground. At this stage they are most vulnerable to chemical application because of their increased uptake of water and nutrients. Even though knapweed and musk thistle can be effectively treated all the way up to the budding stages, we have found that spring and fall spraying in the rosette stage is most effective.

As spring turns into summer, the Ranger staff turns their attention to deeply rooted perennial weeds like Canada thistle. Spraying Canada thistle and other deeply rooted perennials is more effective when the plants have bolted and grown to approximately 10 inches in height. At this point, they are still transporting nutrients to the root system, which will allow for more herbicide uptake. Mowing is also an effective way to make the perennials use more energy as they attempt to recover from the mowing. Mowed perennials are also more susceptible to fall herbicide applications.

The weeds being managed this season are very aggressive invaders that have the potential to take over native plant communities. Priority was given to areas where infestations pose the worst threat to native plant communities and where they are bordering home lots. A contract herbicide applicator and the in-house open space crew will be performing the herbicide applications. So that you can better understand why these changes are being made, here are a few key points about water consumption on Ken-Caryl Ranch:

The purpose of the Landscape Master Vision is to facilitate a more consistent and attractive landscape throughout Ken-Caryl Ranch; increase environmental stewardship on community-owned and privately-owned lands; and reduce

- Finding ways to conserve water helps the sustainability of this precious resource. 
National Drug Take Back Day

The DEA's National Prescription Take-Back Day provides an opportunity for the public to surrender expired, unwanted or unused pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medications for destruction. These drugs are a potential source of supply for illegal use and an unacceptable risk to public health and safety.

Sheriff's representatives will be set up at three drop-off locations in the county on Saturday, April 30 from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.:

- Sheriff's Office Headquarters, 200 Jefferson County Parkway in Golden
- Conifer High School, 10441 Co Rd 73 in Conifer
- Dakota Ridge High School, 13399 W. Coal Mine Ave. in Littleton
 This one-day effort is intended to bring national focus to the issue of increasing
 pharmaceutical controlled substance abuse. A few details about the event:
- The program is anonymous.
- Prescription and over-the-counter solid dosage medications (tablets and capsules) are accepted.
- Intravenous solutions, injectables, needles and oxygen containers will not be accepted.
- Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not part of this initiative.
- The prescriptions should be removed from the original containers and placed in plastic or Ziploc type bags prior to drop off.

History of Fire in Ken-Caryl Ranch Area

Wildfires are a natural part of Colorado's ecosystems. Before European settlers began suppressing them, wildfires would burn periodically through the grasslands and forests as a result of lightning or Native American ignitions. Fires could occur throughout the year, depending upon the cause, weather conditions, and how dry the natural fuels would be.

In the lower Front Range areas of Colorado, wildfires would occur: in the grasslands every one to three years; in the grass and shrub areas every decade or so; in the ponderosa pine forests every two to three decades; and every 50-200 years or more in the mixed conifer forests of Douglas-fir, aspen and ponderosa pine.

Wildfires in the grasslands and grass/ shrub areas would burn rapidly and hot. They would only last as long as it took to consume the dry grasses or the wind would be blowing to spread the fire. Wildfires in the ponderosa pine forests would remove accumulated leaf litter, woody materials and vegetation (grass, shrubs and small trees) by natural, low-intensity surface fires. Large fires occurred less frequently as there was less fuel for them to burn. On those occasions when drought, wind and topography aligned, large wildfires that also burned through the mixed conifer forests found on wetter and north-facing slopes would result in "crown" fires that would kill some or all of the trees. These mixed conifer forests would gradually recover through regrowth of aspen and reseeding from adjacent trees that had survived the wildfire. In all cases, the ashes of the burned vegetation would recycle nutrients back into the soil and help feed the growth of new plants.

Since settlement, natural wildfire occurrences within the ecosystems of the Ken-Caryl Ranch area have been interrupted. This has altered some of the natural conditions that would be kept in balance by nature's forces. Grasslands and shrublands may become more overgrown and have greater levels of wildland fuels, while providing less palatable food for wildlife. Ponderosa pine forests have increased amounts of shrubs and small trees growing under the larger trees, resulting in the potential for increased fire behavior and "crown" fires. Mixed conifer forests may suffer more frequent crown fires from larger, more severe and more frequent wildfires occurring throughout the Front Range.

The September 1978 Murphy Gulch Fire, which burned 3,300 acres and part of the Ken-Caryl Ranch open space, was considered one of the first significant fires in the Front Range Wildland Urban Interface. A number of other large wildfires have occurred along the Front Range of Colorado since that time and in all seasons, including the June 2002 Hayman Fire, which is still the largest Colorado wildfire at over 138,000

Wildfires have become less frequent due to increased fire protection and detection, but they threaten more homes and property when they do occur. Large wildfires are becoming more common and more severe throughout the Front Range. The fires of 2012 and 2013 (High Park, Waldo Canyon and Black Forest) served as a notice that large and destructive fires will very likely become the norm along the Front Range. Smaller wildfires have also occurred in the Ken-Carvl Ranch area throughout the vear and have threatened the community in various ways, such as the 400-acre Wadsworth Ridge fire of October 2010 and the 31-acre North Hogback Fire in October

Ken-Caryl Ranch is located in the Wildland Urban Interface and, as such, is exposed to the risk of destructive wildfire. Residents can help reduce their risk from wildfires by utilizing Firewise landscaping and construction materials, year-round maintenance and removal of fuels, and becoming aware of, and involved with, community efforts to prepare for wildfires.

Both the Ken-Caryl Ranch Firewise Board and West Metro Fire provide up-to-date information and community efforts to improve wildfire mitigation. The Firewise Board can be contacted through the Ken-Caryl Ranch House at 303-979-1876. West Metro Fire Station 13 is located at 12613 W. Indore Place or 303-972-3349. The firefighters there welcome any questions and are happy to serve you in your preparedness efforts.

There will be a Wildland Fire Evacuation Exercise in Ken-Caryl Valley on Saturday, May 21. Emergency vehicles will swarm into Ken-Caryl Valley as citizens are evacuating from a simulated wildfire. The response by fire departments and law enforcement may look real, but it will only be a drill. The simulated wildfire response and evacuation exercise is sponsored by Jefferson County Sheriff's Office of Emergency Management and West Metro Fire Rescue.

Those living in Ken-Caryl Valley and the North Ranch will be invited to take part in the voluntary community evacuation drill. The exercise will begin at 8 a.m., and the evacuation will start at 9 a.m. Residents of the area will receive an evacuation notice via telephone. Residents who have signed up with CodeRed will also receive notification via smartphone. If you haven't signed up for emergency notifications through CodeRed, please sign up at www. your911.net. Participating residents should evacuate safely with their family members in their car and can meet at the evacuation point (Chatfield High School) if they choose. The drill is meant to simulate a real-life emergency and test evacuation procedures.

The May 21 wildfire response and evacuation exercise will prepare the Ken-Caryl community for a major wildland fire, such as those that have struck the Waldo Canyon or Black Forest areas. Preparation, mitigation and safe evacuation is beneficial for us as residents and for our neighbors. Additional information will be provided by West Metro and the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office prior to the evacuation exercise on May 21.

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Trash and Recycling Tote Delivery





Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor:

I would like to let people know of an upcoming major change planned for the irrigated landscape that runs along either side of and in medians of Valley Parkway. An open house to present the plan is scheduled for April 5. Unfortunately, due to the lack of publicity and letter submission deadlines, this letter won't appear until after the open house. I urge people living in the Valley to learn more about the planned changes and let board members know of any concerns.

Changes include turning off irrigation along significant stretches and letting the turf revert to dryland grass. In addition, the plan proposes removal of pines and spruces to "create a more natural and native view of the surrounding environment" (quote from

In my opinion, the mature evergreens lining Valley Parkway are a significant community asset and should be preserved, not removed. I am also concerned about the long-term viability of all trees in areas where irrigation is to be turned off. Finally, while the plan renderings show thick lush uniform stands of dryland grass, I worry that the reality will be much less aesthetic.

If the goal is to reduce water usage, I would suggest that a good first step would be better management of the existing system, a system that was completely replaced over the past few years. Last year was the wettest on record on the west side of the metro area. Last summer, when I had occasion to drive back into the Valley after dark, I can't tell you how many times I observed the irrigation system running when there was absolutely no need for watering.

I am concerned the ultimate result of this plan will be to degrade the appearance of our public spaces, which I view as a community asset. One of the goals of the bond issue was to support property values, but I am afraid the proposed changes may have the opposite effect.
