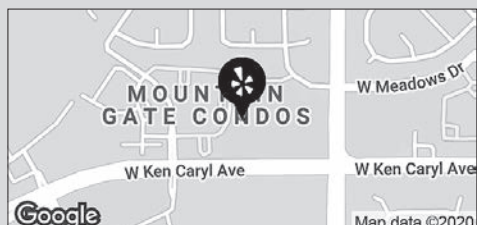

Planning Major Renovations? Here's What You Need to Know

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association requires residents to submit to the Architectural Committee for approval for all exterior improvements. With the new Colorado stay-at-home order, reviews are still being done, however, residents may experience some delays in this process. New applications may take 30 days for review and must be submitted online.

However, while interior improvements don't require approval, they can overlap with exterior improvements and covenants. An example of an interior improvement overlapping an exterior is with window replacement. Windows are often perceived as an interior improvement because we most often see them from the inside. However, windows require exterior approval as well because of grid styles, frame color, etc. A scenario where an interior project overlaps with covenants, typically in stored items or unsightly violations, can be a resident doing a DIY bathroom remodel where they use a popular alternative to dumpsters, the Bagster, for demolition debris. If a Bagster is reported to be in place for more than 10 days, or following the completion of a project, staff may have to send a reminder letter have it picked up.

We do our best to work with the residents in all circumstances and field the calls from neighbors as best we can. On an exterior project approved by the Architectural Committee, it's pretty simple to address questions about a project because we are aware of the work being done and the estimated time for completion, in addition to seeing work in progress. Interior projects may require some communication, and in some cases, collaboration with the Master Association.

What can you do?

- Submit for approval for any exterior improvement on your property, whether or not it's visible from the street. Visit our website's home improvement page found under the Residents tab for more information.
- Talk to your neighbors. If you are starting a project that you think may be a disruption, reach out to your neighbors directly to let them know

what's going on and about how long they can expect the activity. This is the most common and most successful way to lessen neighbor concerns.

- Prioritize your project plans to ensure the visual impact from the outside is as minimal as possible. Remove stored items or construction debris in a timely manner.
 - If you have an internal project that is taking a financial priority to an exterior need, for example, your driveway is cracked, and you received a letter to repair it, but you have to fix your heaving basement first, communicate with staff to discuss a reasonable timeline to replace the driveway.
 - If your project requires demolition and a Bagster is your best option, please be sure to place it on your property, rather than in the street, and have it picked up within 10 days. Waste Connections is the trash service for Ken-Caryl, and they will not pick up Bagsters. Waste Management offers Bagsters and their pick-up must be scheduled separately.
 - If you are embarking on a large-scale interior project that requires storage pods, dumpsters, portable toilets, etc., or if you are in a sub-association, reach out to your management company. Ken-Caryl Ranch does not require approval, nor are timelines imposed for dumpsters in place for the purpose of construction. A description of the work being done and an estimated time those articles will be present can go a long way in helping us to help you.
 - If you start a project, internal or external, and experience delays or the project exposes a bigger issue that takes priority, communicate with staff for your neighborhood so we can work together to lessen the impact on the neighborhood while we wait for the delay to release and you can get back to work. Leaving a project or construction materials indefinitely can be very challenging for a neighborhood.
 - At this time, physical paint samples are not required. For paint submittals please include the brand, color name and number. If possible, please include an image of the color (screen shot or photo).
- We want residents to make improvements on their properties inside and out. These improvements can positively affect the property values throughout the community. Communication and collaboration

with association management can be a beneficial partnership. For more information, visit our website at www.ken-carylranh.org.

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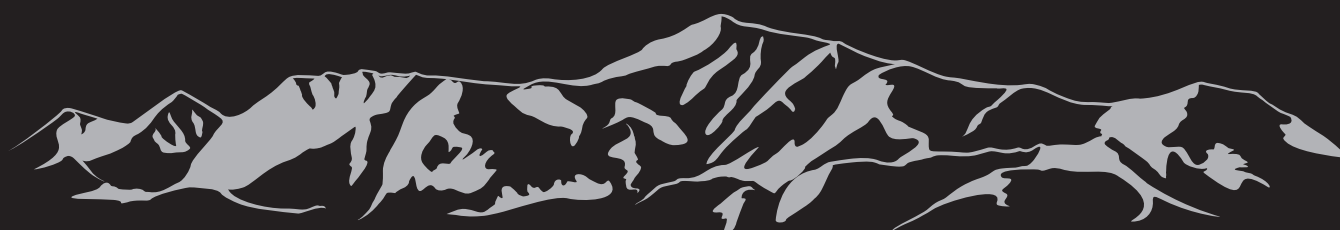


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Trail Improvements Project in Brannon Gearhart Park Now Complete

Construction on drainage improvements and paving replacement on a 600-foot section of hard surface trail at the west end of Brannon Gearhart Park wrapped up at the end of March. The trail is now open for use.

The approximate \$150,000 construction cost for the project included installation of two drain lines, buildup of the trail base and excavation of a drainage swale to direct runoff to the eastern drain line inlet. The project addresses years of maintenance problems attributed to inadequate drainage that had caused substantial damage to the asphalt paving and led to a hazardous ice formation in winter. This renovation should improve winter trail conditions significantly for years to come.

Enginuity Engineering Solutions provided engineering services for the project and Valles Construction completed the construction work. Delays with fabrication of the pre-cast concrete components for the project pushed out the start date to late December 2019. Winter conditions also hampered progress, especially grading operations, which had to be delayed until the ground thawed in mid-March.

For the past eight years, KCRMA has been converting hard surface trails in private open space from asphalt to colored concrete. This work is being paid for out of the reserves budget. A combination of these reserve funds and the operational budget for drainage repair covered the cost of this project.

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Corona Virus and Your Money: What you Need to Know

The corona virus pandemic is affecting nearly every aspect of our daily lives, and even our finances are not immune. You have questions? We have answers. Mike Williams, president and CEO of Colorado Credit Union, offers information and covers the topics that matter most to you and your wallet.

How can people financially protect themselves from the impact of the corona virus? What steps should they take?

Now is the time to take a close look at your finances and cut any non-essential expenses. With so many people working from home, and children not physically going to school, many families are spending less on expenses such as gas or eating out during the current stay-at-home order. If you are one of these families, you should use that extra money to pay off high-interest debt, or replenish or continue to build your emergency savings fund.

Now is also a great time to look at the interest rates on all your loans to see if you could save money by refinancing. If you are paying more than 4% interest on your mortgage, you may consider refinancing to save money, as mortgage interest rates are at an all-time low. Auto loans are another area where you can potentially save money. Many people don't think about refinancing their auto loans, but with interest rates dropping recently, it might be worth looking at. Even a savings of \$50 per month can make a difference.

If you have credit card debt, you might consider shopping for a better rate, or transferring your balance to a credit card that offers a low promotional rate for balance transfers.

How should people manage their money and finances during this crisis?

Developing and following a budget is always an important tool to managing finances. If your financial circumstances have changed due to the corona virus, it's important to immediately update your budget based on your new financial situation. If you have suffered significant income loss, food and housing should be your top priority. If you have money remaining after paying essential needs, then make at least the minimum payments on loans and credit cards. If you are unable to make loan or credit card payments, it is critical to contact your lender as quickly as possible. Your lender may have resources to help you get through. At Colorado Credit Union, we are offering members a variety of options to help those who are suffering due to the corona virus, including a Skip-A-Payment program for a variety of loans.

If you need help building a budget or calculating debt, our website offers multiple free resources to help. Visit ccu.org/financial-tools.

Are there plans in place or resources available to assist residents during this time?

There are numerous resources available to assist people during these times, some are provided by the U.S. Government and others provided by individual financial institutions. Many credit unions and banks are offering relief programs to their members/customers, including the ability to defer loan payments, waiving selected fees and low-interest loans or lines of credit. Check with your financial institution to see what options are available to you.

Do you have any advice for people who are having problems paying their bills and other financial obligations?

Please reach out to your lender. Lenders understand bad things happen to good people, but need to know your circumstances so they can help. Lack of communication only exasperates the problem down the road.

Is it better to pay for expenses using a credit card and then slowly pay off this debt? How heavily should we rely on credit cards during this crisis?

It is rarely a good idea to rely on credit cards to pay for expenses and this should be considered a last resort. If you have suffered income loss due to the corona virus, the first step is to cut out all non-essential expenses. Go through your bank statements and identify any recurring expense that isn't necessary for survival. Although your teenagers may disagree, subscription services such as Netflix, Hulu and Spotify are not critical and should be canceled if you are experiencing a financial hardship.

If you can't avoid using a credit card to pay for essential needs, then use the card with the lowest interest rate, and use it sparingly.

If you own your own home, you might consider a Home Equity Line of Credit (HELOC) as a lower interest option to credit card debt.

What advice do you have for people if they have experienced a loss of income?

Losing a job or taking a pay cut is never easy. Unfortunately, millions of Americans are facing these challenges and uncertainty as businesses are shut down to prevent additional spread of the corona virus. In response to this pandemic, unemployment benefits have been increased to help many who have lost their job.

If you are not able to make loan or credit

card payments, you should immediately contact your lender or financial institution to discuss your options. Many financial institutions have created programs to help people who have lost their jobs.

What steps should people take if they think they might have been targeted by a scammer?

The COVID-19 outbreak has provided scammers a variety of new opportunities to take advantage of people. It's especially important right now to avoid clicking on suspicious links or ads and avoid answering phone calls from numbers you don't know. Working from home scams are becoming very creative and aggressively targeting job seekers. Never give out your bank account or debit/credit card information to an unknown source, even though they are promising to send you money.

From a banking perspective, it's important to regularly monitor your checking and credit card accounts. Immediately notify your financial institution if you see suspicious activity. Through online banking, many account holders have the ability to temporarily turn on and off their debit and credit cards. This is a great tool if you have lost your card, or if you think your card information has been compromised.

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) provides extensive information about current scams and steps consumers should take to avoid falling victim to fraud. To see the latest information, visit

What are the safest ways to bank during the corona virus outbreak?

Credit Unions and banks take the safety of their employees and their members very seriously. For this reason, most financial institutions have limited face-to-face access as much as possible. At Colorado Credit Union, we have temporarily closed our branch lobbies and are conducting all transactions through the drive-up windows. We felt this measure was critical to mitigating the risk associated with the virus. Through our digital banking platform, our members can check their accounts, make deposits, pay bills and transfer funds. Most financial institutions offer similar services allowing their customers to continue to bank "normally", regardless of whether the bank lobbies are open.

Green Bag Lady Teresa VanHatten-Granath Contributes to Mask-Making Efforts

Affectionately known as our local “bag lady”, resident Teresa VanHatten-Granath and her team of “bagettes” recently turned their attention – and sewing talents – to helping make masks for healthcare workers on the frontlines battling COVID-19 as well as those in need.

According to Teresa, she read about mask making back in March and thought it would be helpful to craft and send some to her friends in the medical field. She created a sample mask and posted a tutorial on her website, www.greenbaglady.com, on March 20 calling on her “Green Bag Lady Army” to start making them. The response has been incredible, with Teresa’s dedicated team sewing about 50-60 masks per day, with more than 1,500 masks to date.

Teresa’s team – locally and globally – are assisting in the mask-making efforts. In Ken-Caryl, her team is composed of Danette “Danny” Henderson, Lori Thorp, Carol Grape, Erlinda Stafford, Joan Kaufman and Gabby Kowaliuk. Internationally, teams in Holland, Germany and Spain are contributing to the efforts as well.

“Each and every one of these ladies is a gem,” said Teresa. “I do know there are other area groups making masks too, along with others making them for friends and family. Kudos to all who are joining in the effort!”

Teresa’s masks are made of 100% organic cotton for long-wear use and comfort and should be washed before and after each use. They are machine washable, but air drying is recommended.

These masks are free. If those in need are inspired to donate to these mask-making efforts, Teresa and her team are accepting

fabric, elastic and monetary donations. She is grateful for people like friend Harmony Susalla, whose company has donated organic fabric for mask production.

Teresa is producing masks for community members upon request, however, due to high demand, there is currently a waitlist. She can be privately messaged on Facebook and requests understanding that it may take a few days to fulfill orders. Orders are limited to one per person – to share the love and limit germ transmission. Pick-ups are available at her home in Ken-Caryl, or can be shipped for the cost of shipping to non-healthcare workers.

Disclaimer about the masks: These masks are not meant to replace medical supplies or N95 masks that are used by medical professionals. However, any type cloth mask use has been recommended by the CDC to help people remember to keep their distance from one another and offer at least some protection when going out to get essentials.

According to an article appearing in TIME, many people are howling to thank the nation’s healthcare workers and first responders for their selfless sacrifices, much like the balcony applause and singing in Italy and Spain. Others do it to reduce their pain, isolation and frustration. Some have other reasons, such as to show support for the homeless.

Residents Matt, Lauren, Emery and Madelyn Williams, who reside in the Plains, have been participating in these evening howls as a family to offer a show of support for those on the frontlines.

“We have many family members, friends and neighbors that are healthcare workers, first responders, truck drivers and grocery store employees who are out there on the frontlines protecting and servicing our community,” said Matt. “It is our small part to thank them for their sacrifices. It’s become something everyone looks

forward to, and our kids can’t wait until they can do it the next night. Many of our friends and neighbors in the community are participating, and it’s exciting to hear the howls echo through the Ken-Caryl community. It should remind us all, as friends and neighbors, that we are not alone in this fight.”

On a similar note, resident Bruce Heise was moved by the impressive community effort, regardless of the weather. He began participating in these nightly howls to support his sister who is a healthcare worker.

“I howl for my sister, a rapid response nurse in Maryland who has spent the last four weeks working 13-hour shifts intubating people who never come off it,” said Bruce.

Whatever the reason, howling has caught on among people who feel cut off from society during the national quarantine and are looking for a way to let off some steam. Social media has also played a large role in connecting communities with a public Facebook group called “Go Outside and Howl at 8pm” to try to get as many people to participate as possible.

Who do you howl for? Whether you choose to participate in this evening ritual or not, the nightly howls serve as a reminder that we are not alone and we will all get through this together.

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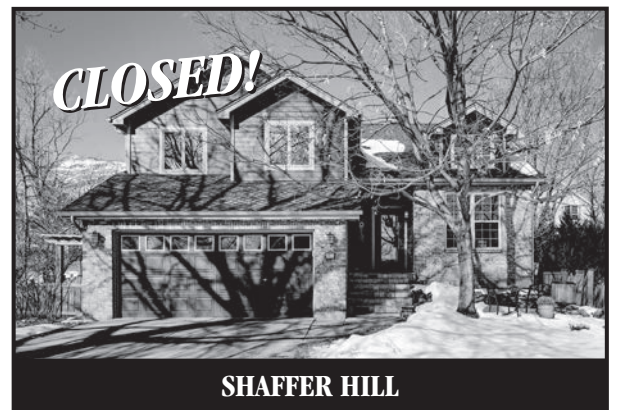

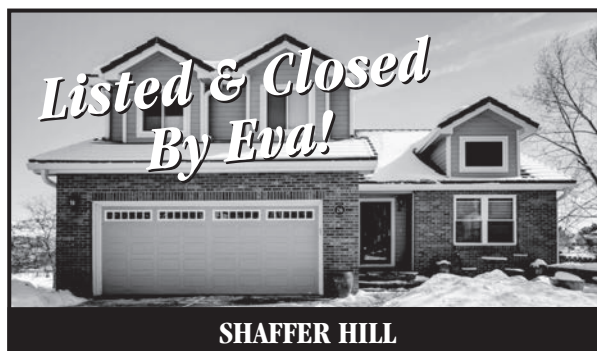

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Have You Seen This Bird? What to do if You Encounter a Grouse

Our neighborhood feathered curmudgeon is back! Reports of unusual encounters with a small chicken-like bird have been recently investigated by the Open Space Department staff. The bird was seen this month and appears to be a Dusky Grouse; it has a small head, large body with brownish plumage and walks along the ground pumping its head as it moves. The grouse approaches people, and if allowed, will peck at their legs and exhibit other aggressive behavior. Staff do not know whether this behavior is unique to this individual bird. Dusky Grouse are common in our open space and usually secretive, but during the breeding season males become very protective of their territory, and in some cases, will engage people. Reports of this type of behavior have been recorded over the last few years throughout our Foothills Open Space. Trail users should be on the lookout and heed the following steps to protect yourself and

the grouse;

- When hiking, be sure to keep your dog on a leash. Consider leaving your dog at home. Grouse spend a lot of their time on the ground, nests are usually found on the ground too. Grouse are very vulnerable to disturbance by off-trail use and curious pets.
- If a grouse approaches you, do not panic. They weigh about two pounds and you are many times larger than them. Carry a trekking pole and use it if needed to shield yourself. You can also use a backpack. Do not swing or kick at the bird. Wear long pants as the grouse may lightly peck at your legs or flap its wings rapidly striking your leg. Staff experienced light blows that were not harmful.
- Move along! Do not give the grouse a chance to get close to you. He may chase you, but if you keep moving, he will stop and turn around.
- If riding a bike, be especially watchful and control speeds. If the grouse is on the trail, dismount and walk your bike while keeping it between you and the grouse as a shield. Trying to ride around the grouse might result in a fatal collision.
- Equestrians should be alert and anticipate how to respond if their horse



is spooked by the grouse.

- These encounters are more likely to occur in the spring and summer months. Staff believe that this situation is not dangerous to trail users, but can be an unnerving experience. Please be cautious and aware and respectful of these animals.

Resident Organizes Community Motorcade Parade to Celebrate Educational Milestones

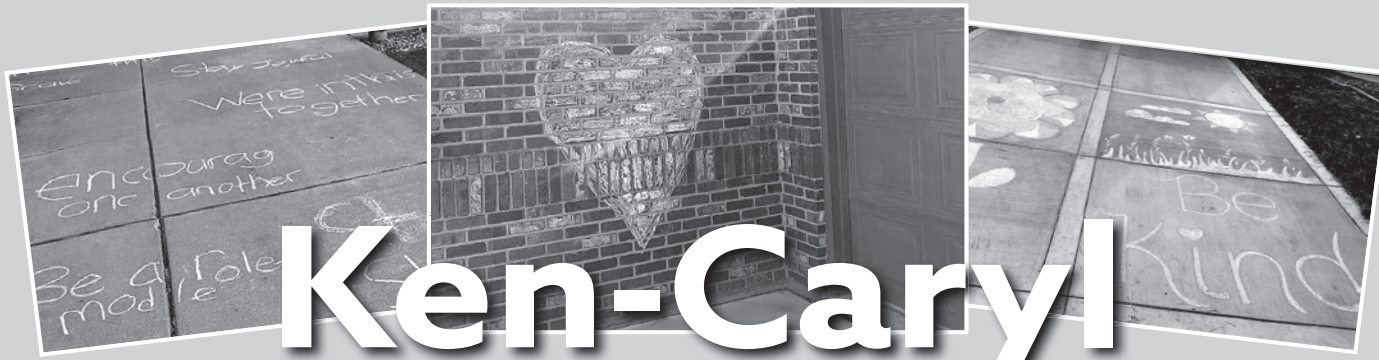

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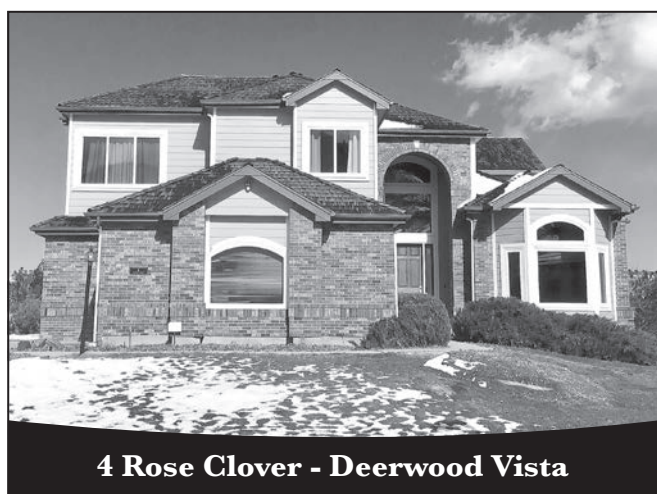
