Share the Trail, the KCR Way

Loo**K** out for other trail users Be **C**ourteous

Respect your open space Ken-Caryl Ranch trails are a unique resource in our community allowing all members to enjoy a recreational lifestyle in a natural and scenic environment. Please respect your neighbors and open space by following these guidelines. These guidelines are intended to support current Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Rules and Regulations, not replace them.

LooK out for other trail users

- Be aware of your surroundings and other trail users.
- Look up the trail, call out, and gain the attention of others in advance with a vocal warning or bell.
- Free one ear from headphones and ear buds so you can hear others.
- Most trail conflicts occur on blind turns, switch-backs, and other poor visibility areas. Be extra aware in these areas and anticipate other users around corners.
 Be Courteous
- All users yield to and pass equestrians with care. Slow to walking speed (be prepared to stop if needed) and wait for clear instructions from the rider.
- Cyclists yield to hikers and runners.
 Establish verbal communication or eye contact, slow down (be prepared to stop if needed), and pass only after the other user has had a chance to safely move aside.

- Be particularly courteous when overtaking from behind, as people may not hear your approach and be startled.
 Establish communication. Do not simply shout "on your left" and expect others to immediately move to the right.
- All users, do not block the trail when others are attempting to pass. Move aside when it is safe to do so.
- Dogs are required to be on leashes and under control at all times.

Respect your open space


- Obey all signs and trail closures.
 Cyclists, do not skid or slide around turns. This damages the trail.
- Non-members cannot be given "permission" to use our trails. KCR trails are private property for the use of members and ID-bracelet-carrying houseguests only.
- Avoid muddy trails. Ruts and hoof-prints damage the trail and must be repaired.
- If you leave tracks, turn back: If you're leaving tracks, then the trail is too wet. Please turn around and come back when conditions are drier.
 Horses are particularly damaging to wet trails.
- o Wait 48: It's a good rule of thumb to wait 48 hours after any significant rainfall or after snow has melted.
- In winter, trails are generally more solid in the morning and get sloppier in the afternoon.
- If you find yourself in mud unexpectedly, just go through it. Do not go off-trail to avoid the mud. This widens the trail, kills plants, and increases erosion.

Summer Covenant Enforcement


Summer is already just around the corner! Residents have been busy planning their landscape, deck, and paint projects. Neighbors are pulling their RVs out of storage and getting them ready for the season. Others may be planning big celebrations for graduations, weddings, and big summer holiday cookouts. This is Life at Ken-Caryl! Living life and enjoying the outdoors is at the very heart of this community and part of what makes Ken-Caryl Ranch a beautiful and fun place the live.



This time of year, the grass grows quickly, weeds spread like crazy, and your neighbors are outside enjoying their spaces. The Master Association increases proactive inspections to twice per month from May through September. Here are some things you can do to help maintain the beautiful neighborhoods and add not only to your enjoyment of the property but your neighbors as well.

- Set up a regular mowing and watering schedule to keep your lawn looking its best.
- Keep rock beds free of weeds and grasses.
- If portions of your lawn are not coming back this year, or you have bare dirt, you may
 have to replace with sod or another type of ground cover or consider a new landscape
 plan that will manage this common challenge. Remember to submit any new plans to
 the Architectural Committee for approval before you start work.
- Refresh mulch and rock beds as needed. Be sure to submit plans to the Architectural Committee for approval if you are making any changes to the existing layout.
- Store landscaping materials and equipment out of public view when not in use.
- Edging around trees, bed, utility boxes, etc., will go a long way in keeping that "finished" look to your yard maintenance.
- Nip those dandelions in the bud! They could spread to other yards potentially undoing a neighbor's hard maintenance work on their own yard.
- Make fence repairs as needed.
- If you have planter pots, be sure they are planted and looking their best. If the pot must be empty, be sure to store it out of public view until it can be properly utilized.
- Develop a regular schedule to pick up pet waste from backyards. The accumulation creates a smell and an unpleasant outdoor experience.
 - Smoking on decks and patios is not prohibited but please be courteous when enjoying tobacco and cannabis products in close proximity to your neighbors.
 - Trailer/RV/Boat/ATV Parking is restricted on Ken-Caryl. A resident may park their recreational vehicle for two non-consecutive days in a seven-day period for the purpose of preparation for a trip or clean up after a trip.

Many of these issues will be addressed during proactive bi-weekly inspections, some are courtesies, and some may be enforced by other agencies. If you have questions, please contact Jenny Bernal at jennyb@kcranch.org.



• Board Meeting Summaries

Joint Study Session

On May 7, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards held a Joint Study Session and discussed the following items:

- The Boards discussed the plans for the Ranch House pool replacement project. The Master Association will sign a contract with AD Miller for construction management of the project. Removal of the current pool will begin in early August 2019, and pool construction will take place over the winter and spring of 2019-20. A skimmer system versus a gutter system will be used. Staff is looking at options for spray features to be added later when funding is available. In the 2020 budget discussions, the Boards will look at budgeting for more enhancements to the pool. The new pool is planned to open Memorial Day weekend 2020. The project is budgeted at \$3.6 million, of which \$2.25 million will come from Plains Metro District lawsuit settlement funds designated for pools. The remainder of the funding will come from Master Association Reserves and **Operations.**
- Resident Cathy Packard expressed her concerns with the Ranch House Pool zero-entry area and shade.
- Chris Pacetti said the Boards need to approve the Ranch House Pool agreement between the two Boards.
 The Boards will review and vote on the agreement at their respective meetings in May.
- Members of the Joint Study Workgroup gave an overview of the group's meetings. The workgroup is made up of a couple members of each board plus Chris Pacetti. They have met weekly to look into potential cost savings and realignment of responsibilities between the Master Association and Metropolitan District. The Boards want to move forward with hiring a manager for each entity but will continue to explore options to realign responsibilities.

Metropolitan District

On May 7, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board held a Special Meeting and discussed the following items:

 The Board discussed the hiring process for a new District Manager for the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District. District Manager Melissa Daruna resigned from the position in April. Co-Interim District Managers Pat Malloy and Jeff Leniger have stepped into her role. The Board is moving forward with the hiring process for a new District Manager. The Board is finalizing the job description for the position that will be posted initially on two external

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


websites.

- Initial salary range is estimated at \$90,000 to \$105,000 per year.
- The Board plans to post the job announcement in June and hopes to name a replacement later this summer.

Proposed Changes to Open Space Rules

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association and Metropolitan District Open Space and Parks Use Rules were revised at the KCRMA Open Space Committee Meeting on April 24. Staff and the KCRMA Open Space Committee removed old language and added new language to better clarify several rules.

You can find the rules document with the revisions on the Ken-Caryl Ranch website at www.ken-carylranch.org under Open Space, then Rules & Regulations.

Highlights of the proposed revised rules are listed below:

• Rule #1, clarified use of private open space.

Rule #2, clarified activity in the open space, greenbelts, and park areas after dark. Proposed revision to the rule states: Authorized activity in open space, greenbelts, and parks is allowed after dark unless posted otherwise. Examples of authorized activities include walking, bicycling, jogging, stargazing, or camping in designated areas. Use of baseball diamonds, playgrounds, and the frisbee golf course at the Ranch House is prohibited after dark. Use of tennis courts is prohibited after dark (unless lighted, then close is at 10 p.m.). Equestrian Center visitors allowed only from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

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
- Rule #5, Added language encouraging mowing along private property in open space and changing height of mowed grasses to coincide with the Wildfire Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- Rule #6, Removed e-bikes as an unauthorized vehicle, and revised e-bike use in open space, greenbelts, and parks. Proposed changes to the e-bike rules are as follows: Class 1 e-bikes are allowed on natural surface and paved open space, greenbelt, and park trails. Class 2 e-bikes are only allowed on paved open space, greenbelt, and park trails. Class 3 e-bikes are only allowed on roads and parking lots where motorized vehicles are authorized to travel.
- Rule #16, Added all camp site locations to the rule

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Open Space

Proposed Language Modifications to Open Space Documents

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Revised Open Space Comprehensive Management Plan, adopted by both the Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards in December 2017, inadvertently contains obsolete language from the original 1997 plan. This language is found in Section VI. J and relates to the extension of a resident's property onto Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space previously identified as encroachments but later changed to landscape violations. The proposed modified language in the revised plan replaces the term "encroachment" with "landscape violation." An example is shown below:

Landscape rule violations resulting from the extension of a resident's property onto Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space can take a variety of forms. These range from a simple expansion of a turfed yard or pet area (using invisible fences) to elaborate landscaping, playgrounds, and even irrigated soccer fields. Landscape rule violations from the 850 properties bordering the interior Open Space as well as several properties that are adjacent to our exterior boundary are no longer tolerated and resident requests will not be approved.

The language in the revised plan also eliminates the provision for licensing new landscape violations. Consequently, language in the Landscape Rules Violation Enforcement Policies and Procedures (adopted April 2014) requires modification to reflect this policy change. The proposed change to the Landscape Rules violations language removes any mention of licensing future violations. The introduction to this section now reads:

The Master Association's Board of Directors ("Board") recognizes that some

homeowners in Ken-Caryl Ranch have made landscape improvements that encroach on property owned by the Master Association ("Association"). To protect the Association properties for the benefit of all members, landscape extensions into open space are considered rules violations and will be corrected through procedures identified in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and Parks Rules and Enforcement Policy.

In addition to the changes noted above, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society and the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee recommend a revision to Section A (Cultural Resources and Paleontology) of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Revised Open Space Comprehensive Management Plan which would allow open space visitors, under special conditions, to remove artifacts from open space. New language will also be added to this section encouraging the public to bring in artifacts they may have found in the past to an "Artifact Day" event to determine the age of the artifact and what it is. It also gives the Historical Society authority to grant ownership of an artifact to the finder if the artifact is determined to be of low value based on the assessment of experts at an Artifact Dav event.

Finally, new language will be added to Section Q, Maintenance Procedures, to reflect that the Volunteer Trail Coordinators are responsible for construction and maintenance of singletrack trails.

All language changes have been reviewed and approved by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee and can be found at www.ken-carylranch.org under the Open Space tab then Plans & Studies. The Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards will vote on the proposed changes at their respective meetings on May 21 at 6 p.m. at the Ranch House.

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
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Wildfire Hazard Mitigation Plan Updates

Updates to the Ken-Caryl Ranch Wildfire Hazard Mitigation Plan were prepared by the Colorado State Forest Service with input from Open Space Staff, the Firewise Committee, and West Metro Fire. The Master Association Board will review and vote on the proposed changes at its May 21 meeting at 6 p.m. at the Ranch House.

Recent fires in Colorado have shown that the biggest threat to communities is home-to-home ignition. The updated plan places more emphasis on residents creating defensible space around their homes in case of a wildfire. The home ignition zone has been added to include the home itself as well as the hazards around the home. The plan also included the 10-foot expanded mowing buffer into open space. Residents living adjacent to open space are encouraged to mow and maintain the buffer.

Ken-Caryl Conservation Club Educates at Earth Extravaganza Event

"BEE" A Friend to the Earth

By Kathy Webster, Ken-Caryl Conservation Club Rachel Carson's book, Silent Spring, published in 1962, was the first book to document the adverse environmental

document the adverse environmental effects of the indiscriminate use of pesticides. Even though this book led to an environmental movement and the formation of the Environmental Protection Agency, we are still experiencing the longterm detrimental effects of pesticides and herbicides. These chemicals are killing the bees and other valuable pollinators.

On Saturday, April 27, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held an Earth Extravaganza Event. The Ken-Caryl Conservation Club participated in this event by educating people about the dangers that our bees and butterflies are facing. Two Boy Scouts, Ian McGlashan and Brodie Collier, explained the importance of bees as pollinators and how the bees travel from flower to flower spreading pollen that allows for fertilization. This is necessary for the formation of seeds, which are required for expanding plant populations. Bees are not only vital to the reproduction of wild plants but also to the agricultural production of our food. Besides the imbalance of the ecosystem caused by the decline in pollinators, food security may be jeopardized. Three-fourths of the world's food supply are plants that require pollinators!

Elizabeth Allison, Kathy Webster, and Rilla Reinsma also helped to educate people on the decline of butterfly populations due to pesticides and loss of habitat. The focus was mainly on the Monarch butterfly. The Monarch is a migratory butterfly making a marvelous journey north in the summer and south in the winter. The Monarch and the Milkweed plant have a special symbiotic relationship. The disappearance of the milkweed plant due to pesticide and herbicide use has resulted in a sharp decline in Monarchs. The Monarch is very particular and will only lay its eggs on the milkweed plant. The Monarch caterpillar will only eat milkweed. If the caterpillar can't get milkweed, it won't eat at all and will starve!

Everyone who stopped by the Conservation Club table was given a wildflower pollinator mix of seeds for bees, butterflies, and other insect friends. If you did not receive a seed mix, here are some wildflowers that will attract pollinators: Showy Milkweed, Western Yarrow, Prairie Aster, Yellow Prairie Coneflower, Annual Sunflower, Rocky Mountain Penstemon, Plains Coreopsis, Purple Prairie Clover, Native Blue Flax, Lupine, Rocky Mountain Cleome, and Native Bee Balm. These wildflowers provide a nectar source from late spring through summer for these important insects.

Conservation Club Earth Day event coordinators, Linda Metzger and Doug Graham, collected donations for the Bradford-Perley Apple Orchard Propagation Project sponsored by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society. The Conservation Club plans to purchase heirloom Ben Davis Apple Trees for the small Bradford Apple Orchard behind the Bradford-Perley House. Forty dollars was collected toward the purchase of the apple trees. The Conservation Club will be planting the two trees on May 19. Thank you to all who donated.

In conclusion, please ask yourself, "To bee or not to bee?" That is the question. The answer is:

BEE SAFE!

Plant any of the flowers listed above using only organic soils, no pesticides. **BEE AWARE!**

Use alternative pest control methods, attract beneficial insects.

BEE VIGILANT!

Read labels, avoid the chemical group neonicotinoids, ask your local garden retailer to stop carrying products containing neonics.

BEE VOCAL!

Tell your friends and family about the importance of bees and butterflies.

The bees and butterflies are sending us a warning of the imminent and frightening threat to our ecosystems and our food. We each need to do our part to assure

May these wildflower seeds also grow knowledge and wisdom that pollinates and produces in us the understanding that "in nature nothing exists alone." Everything is connected. We must all educate ourselves and others; be vocal and spread the BUZZZZZZZZZZZZZZ

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

Plant Sale Coming to Ken-Caryl

On Sunday, May 19, you can purchase your bedding plants right here in Ken-Caryl. Stepping Stone Communities, a nonprofit for adults with developmental disabilities, will be offering hardy, Colorado-grown flowers, vegetables, and herbs at the 0Ken-Caryl Community Center from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

Stepping Stone Communities is a non-profit organization with a mission to create affordable homes in intentional and integrated communities for adults with and without developmental disabilities. This concept was inspired by the success of Stepping Stone Support Center. Since 2013, Stepping Stone has provided prevocational and life skill training, job placement, and job coaching services, as well as facilitated social events and community connections for more than 100 individuals with developmental disabilities. Stepping Stone has been enormously successful in guiding these individuals to live meaningful and productive lives.

However, one important piece was missing: homes of their own! The individuals Stepping Stone works with are first and foremost adults and, like all adults, they desire to live independently in a place of their own. Unfortunately, safe and appropriate options are rare and financially out of reach for the majority of these adults. So, in 2016 a group of parents, Stepping Stone staff, and other friends of Stepping Stone came together to create Stepping Stone Communities for the purpose of providing innovative and affordable options for homes where adults with developmental disabilities can lead full and meaningful lives.

Stepping Stone Communities has taken significant steps since 2016 and is in the process of acquiring and building an apartment building for both adults with developmental disabilities and members of the general population to be built near Bowles and C-470.

Arbor Day Tree Planting

Shovels, dirt, and preschoolers – a recipe for true joy and a new tree in Ken-Caryl Ranch. Students from the Ken-Caryl Ranch preschool program joined Ken-Caryl Ranch Parks staff for the annual Arbor Day tree planting. Twenty eight students scooped dirt to plant a fall fiesta sugar maple at Bradford Park on April 25.

The annual tree planting is part of Ken-Caryl Ranch's Tree City USA designation. Every year the Parks Department plants 40-60 trees, both replacements and new trees.

"We are trying a lot of new varieties to introduce diversity into our urban forest," said Jonathan Bedoy, KCRMD Arborist.

Jonathan started the Arbor Day planting with a simple question for the preschoolers: "Why are we planting a tree?" Responses included, "to help us breathe," "to dig in the dirt," "some food grows on trees," "they make breezes," and "they help our environment." Preschoolers then took turns scooping dirt to fill the hole around the new maple.

Ken-Caryl Ranch was originally a monoculture of cottonwoods and pines. The new fiesta sugar maple, along with a large variety of other new trees, will replace the cottonwoods as they age out. And the preschoolers will be able to visit the park and watch their new tree grow for years to come.

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














Recycling Event a Huge Success!

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Grouse Encounters on Foothill Trails Can Be Unnerving

By Open Space Manager Sean Warren Reports of unusual encounters with a small chicken-like bird on Cougar and Docmann Trails have been investigated by the Open Space Department staff. The bird was seen on Friday, April 26 on the far northern section Docmann Trail near the Question Mark Peak overlook. The bird appears to be a male Dusky Grouse; it has a small head, large body with brownish plumage and walks along the ground pumping its head as it moves.

The grouse approaches people and if allowed will peck at their legs and exhibit other aggressive behavior. Staff do not know whether this behavior is unique to this individual or to multiple birds over the area where incidents have occurred. Dusky grouse are common in our open space and are usually secretive. During the breeding season, males become very protective of their territory and in some cases will engage people. Reports of this type of behavior have been recorded over the last few years throughout our Foothills Open Space. Trail users should be on the lookout in this area and heed the following steps to protect yourself and the grouse:

• When hiking in this area be sure to keep your dog on a leash. Consider leaving

your dog at home. Grouse spend a lot of their time on the ground, and nests are usually found on the ground, too. Grouse are very vulnerable to disturbance by offtrail use and curious pets.

- If a grouse approaches you, do not panic. They weigh about two pounds, and you are many times larger than them. Carry a trekking pole and use it if needed to shield yourself. You can also use a backpack. Do not swing or kick at the bird. Wear long pants; the grouse may lightly peck at your legs or flap its wings rapidly striking your leg. Staff experienced light blows that were not harmful.
- Move along! Do not give the grouse a chance to get close to you. He may chase you, but if you keep moving, he will stop and turn around.
- If riding a bike, be especially watchful and control speeds. If the grouse is on the trail, dismount and walk your bike, keeping it between you and the grouse as a shield. Trying to ride around the grouse might result in a fatal collision.
- Equestrians should be alert and anticipate how to respond if their horse is spooked by the grouse.
- These encounters are more likely to occur in the spring and summer months. Staff believe that this situation is not dangerous to trail users but can be an unnerving experience. Please be cautious and aware and respectful of these animals.

I finally had a 3-inch-wide trench dug through the soil and into the red clay. The stainless-steel mesh Sean talked about was put down in the trench and stapled to the inside of the deck all the way to the top. Concrete was placed into the trench to secure the screening. I next placed a screen of wood slats to the outside creating a wood barrier.

No rodents, no food for snakes, and no more snakes in the yard since then. Great solution that you may want to try. It works! Paul Gesso



New Volunteer Patrollers Complete Training

Recently, six Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association members volunteered their Saturday and completed a two-and-ahalf-hour training to become volunteer patrollers! There is a total of 26 volunteers patrolling the open space for the 2019 season.

If you are recreating on the trails, you may be contacted by one of these volunteer patrollers at a trail intersection or passing by on the trail. Each will be wearing a blue vest, with a patch and printing that reads "Open Space Patrol." An ID will also be displayed to indicate they are working on behalf of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers. Mountain bike volunteers will also have an orange placard visible on their handlebars stating "Volunteer Bike Patrol."

This program is in its eighth year and the volunteers are a tremendous help to the rangers assisting patrol of the trails. The volunteers cannot issue contact notices for rule violations like park rangers can but are a great resource in viewing any trespassing and other rule violations taking place in the open space. Volunteers also report any obstacles across the trails or other problem areas and if a pattern of rule violations develops in open space.

I want to also remind users to please be COURTEOUS to these volunteers as they will be stopping each trail user to check membership unless a user is displaying an approved Trail Club (silver) or KCR ID (orange) Bracelet.

A great alternative to stopping and proving membership, is to obtain a KCR ID bracelet. Visit the Recreation Department at the Ranch House at 7676 South Continental Divide Road or the Community Center at 1 Club Drive. You will need to complete a simple registration form and provide one of the items below for proof of membership;

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
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
