Up to Speed on Parking

With the school year ending and summer around the corner, there will be many more vehicles in driveways and at the curb. Backyard picnics, boat excursions and camping trips all generate an increase in the motor vehicles parked in our neighborhoods. To lessen stress and increase enjoyment, I would like to highlight parking rules and courtesies.

Boats, campers and RVs can be parked on the street or in a driveway for two non-consecutive days during a seven-day period. The intention is to allow time to get the vehicle stocked and outfitted in the beginning and also to have time after using to unload, clean and get it returned to storage. Any type of vehicle is prohibited from being parked on the landscape or lawn portion of a yard, and expansion of a driveway to accommodate additional parking is not allowed. No vehicle covers are permitted, unless parked in the garage.

Our governing documents specify several types of vehicles that are not allowed to be stored outside of an enclosed garage. A stored vehicle without a current license plate sticker or which cannot be driven under its own propulsion falls into that category. In addition, trailers, graders, trucks other than pickups, tractors, wagons, buses, sleighs (sorry, Santa!), motorcycles, motor scooters, snowmobiles, snow removal equipment and landscape maintenance equipment cannot be parked in public view. Nothing in these rules prohibits the parking of a contractor's vehicle at a residence during reasonable work hours for the purpose of performing services for the owner.

Beyond the parking rules, there are courtesies pertaining to vehicles which should be taken into account. Pedestrians frequently encounter vehicles which extend beyond a driveway and block a sidewalk, or vehicles parked in the street that straddle halfway onto the sidewalk. You are correct that our streets belong to Jefferson County, but common consideration for a neighbor would involve not consistently parking a vehicle in front of another person's house. There are times this is necessary when several visitors or contractors are at a home at once, but a resident has a valid complaint when their closest street parking is monopolized by a neighbor for their own convenience. Loud vehicles are disruptive to neighbors' enjoyment of their homes, so idling should be kept to a minimum. Finally, parking vehicles in the street should be done with attention to safety and optimal traffic visibility.

Please remember that updated rules address issues as they surface. Ken-Caryl Ranch documents are available at the Ranch House and on our website at www.ken-carylranch.org. Wildfire Evacuation Exercise May 21

There will be a Wildland Fire Evacuation Exercise in the Valley and North Ranch on Saturday, May 21. Emergency vehicles will swarm into the Valley and North Ranch as citizens are voluntarily evacuating from a simulated wildfire. The response by fire departments and law enforcement may look real, but it will only be a drill. Those living in the Valley and the North Ranch will be invited to take part in the voluntary community evacuation drill that is meant to simulate a real-life emergency and test evacuation procedures.

Participating residents should evacuate safely with their family members in their car and can meet at the evacuation point (Chatfield High School) if they choose.

The exercise will begin at 8 a.m. on May 21, and the evacuation will start at 9 a.m. Residents of the area will receive an evacuation notice via telephone. Residents who have signed up for CodeRed will also receive notification via smartphone. If you haven't signed up for emergency notifications through CodeRed, please sign up at http://jeffco.us/sheriff/emergencies/code-red/.

Some area schools have graduation that day, but please know that no roads will be closed and residents will have complete access to the area. The only difference is an increase in law enforcement and fire apparatus traffic in the area. The increased traffic in law enforcement and fire apparatus is expected to wind down by 2 p.m. as that portion of the exercise is completed.

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Update on Massey Draw Stream Stabilization Project

Construction of the drainageway improvement project on Massey Draw along the east side of the Ken-Caryl Community Center is now complete. Seeding and installation of additional sediment and erosion control features were finally finished in the past month during a rare occasion when the site wasn't a muddy mess. The recent moisture will help to insure that the new seed germinates and grasses grow quickly to help stabilize the bare ground.

After reviewing submitted proposals during the a competitive bidding process, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board of Directors hired AGE Inc. to complete the project. The nearly \$500,000 cost of the project was funded entirely by Master Association dues. Benefits of the project include:

- Prior to construction, the site had some of the most active erosion in our drainageway system. The boulder drop structures and other features will armor the stream channel and eliminate previous head cutting. The reduction of soil loss will also improve water quality, which has become increasingly important as regulatory standards have become stricter.
- Unstable cut banks have been filled/ graded and a newly created series of gentle cascades and pools creates a safer condition for anybody exploring the stream channel.
- A future trail across the top of the highest drop structure and wrapping around the north end of the site will

create a new connection to Brannon Gearhart Park and North Massey Draw Trail. The Master Association installed a guardrail along Ken-Caryl Ave. to protect future trail users from vehicular traffic. Work began on Nov. 10, 2014. There were several delays due to inclement weather, poor site conditions and redirection of the contractor to other Master Association projects that required immediate attention. It is important that during this re-vegetation phase of the project that visitors do not disturb or damage new seedlings by walking around or across the site. A narrow, backcountry type, natural surface trail will be built in the fall to make the connection to Brannon Gearhart Park.

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
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Bookmobile News

Preparing Your Home and Family for Wildfire **Evacuation**

Wildfire events can be swift. They can occur during the day while you are at work or at night while you and your family are sleeping. And there can be very little warning. Wildfires can move at incredible speeds, often generating their own weather. High winds, heat, dense smoke, and flying sparks and embers are all common during a wildfire. And then there is the noise, which in and of itself can be completely unnerving and may cause panic.

On May 21, Jefferson County and West Metro Fire Rescue will hold a voluntary wildfire evacuation exercise in Ken-Caryl Valley and the North Ranch. Your participation will help to prepare your family, neighbors and community for a safe evacuation during a wildfire. If you have to evacuate your house, put life before property -- your foremost concern is to get your family out, and after that, your pets.

Before an evacuation order:

Sign up for Code Red with the Jefferson County Sheriff's Office. Code Red will be used to notify Ken-Caryl residents of an evacuation order. If a wildfire is approaching, don't wait for an evacuation order – initiate your family's evacuation plan.

If you know that wildfires are burning in the area, monitor local social media and listen to a battery-operated radio for reports and updates.

Make sure your car has a full or nearfull tank of gas. Park it in the direction of escape and keep the keys immediately available. Shut (but do not lock) car doors and roll up windows. Disconnect automatic garage doors and gate openers.

Ways you can help firefighters protect your home:

- 1. Position a ladder against your home in a visible location.
- 2. Drag your garden hose around your home to a visible position, but leave it turned off.
- 3. Place tools such as a heavy rake and shovel in a visible location.



All of these quick actions can reduce time firefighters spend preparing to defend your home and provide a safer environment for firefighters to work.

Round up pets and confine them in one room. Make sure identification tags are attached to collars.

If you do not have an emergency kit prepared, assemble the essentials: water; food that won't spoil; prescription medicine; eyeglasses; diapers, formula, bottles and other supplies for infants; a change of clothing; and blankets.

Have credit cards and cash ready, along with cellphones and chargers. Know where your valuables and important family documents are (insurance policies, bank account and credit card numbers, deeds, passports, birth and marriage certificates). Line up leashes, crates and carriers for your

The Five Ps of Immediate Evacuation – An easy-to-remember priority list:

- 1. People and Pets Always First
- 2. Papers Important Documents
- 3. Prescriptions Pills and Eyeglasses
- 4. Pictures Irreplaceable memories
- 5. Personal Computer Information on hard drives and disks

Generally, a family forced by wildfire to evacuate will do so together, so the escape route will be the same for all. It is important to establish a meeting place in case all family members are not home when the evacuation takes place.

Children who are home alone should have firm instructions to leave the home at the first threat of danger or know who to contact for safe evacuation assistance. They should report to the prearranged family meeting place and stay there until they hear from you. Should they encounter a threatening situation upon arriving home, their instructions should be to go directly to the meeting place.

Preparing your family, pets and home for a wildfire can reduce wildfire risks and allow your family to safely escape from the path of a wildfire.

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

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Rabies Confirmed in a Second Skunk in **Jefferson County**

Jefferson County Public Health has confirmed that a second skunk has tested positive for rabies in Jefferson County. The skunk was reported by a citizen and euthanized by Jefferson County Animal Control. There were no known exposures to animals or people. This skunk was found near Highway 93 and 58th Ave. just north from the City of Golden.

Jefferson County Public Health wants to remind all citizens to vaccinate their livestock and pets and not allow pets to roam free. It's also important to remember to never feed or walk up to a wild animal. Be careful of pets that you do not know. And if any animal is acting strangely, call your local animal control officer for help.

The public is strongly urged to vaccinate all of their domestic pets and valuable livestock against rabies and to be sure vaccinations are kept up-to-date. Now that rabies has been found in a terrestrial animal within the county, any domestic animal encounter with any wild animal will be treated like an exposure to a rabid animal. Domestic animals with one expired rabies vaccination or without any rabies vaccinations will be classified as high risk and be required to undergo a 180-day quarantine.

Rabies is caused by a virus that affects the nervous system of humans and other mammals, and is nearly always fatal. The virus is shed in the saliva of infected animals. People or animals can get rabies from the bite of a rabid animal or from a rabid animal's saliva if it comes in contact with their eyes, nose, mouth or open wounds. Immediate medical treatment is required after exposure to an infected animal. Skunks, bats, foxes, raccoons and other wildlife should not be handled or fed in order to prevent exposure to this virus.

In addition to rabies vaccinations for pets and livestock, there are additional precautions to prevent possible exposure to rabies:

- · Avoid contact with any wild animals, especially any that act unusually. A healthy wild animal will generally avoid human contact.
- Teach children to stay away from all wild animals, stray domestic pets, or any dead animals and tell an adult if they are scratched or bitten.
- Wildlife suffering from rabies will often be out during the day, act aggressively and violently approach people or pets. Rabid wildlife might also stumble or have trouble walking.
- Do not let pets roam freely since this can increase the chance that they could be exposed without your knowledge.
- · Contact your veterinarian if your dog or cat is bitten or scratched by a wild animal.
- If a person has been bitten or scratched by a wild mammal, they should wash the area thoroughly with soap and water, seek immediate medical attention and also notify their local public health agency. Prompt medical treatment is the key to preventing rabies after a possible exposure.
- Do not feed wild animals, since this reduces their natural fear of humans.
- · Do not leave pet food or livestock feed outside or feed more than your outdoor pet will finish in one feeding.

Social Media Safety: Advice for Parents

Submitted by Peter A. Weir, Jefferson County District Attorney

1. Parents should monitor their children's social networking sites, including Facebook. To see if your child is a member of one or more Facebook groups, either check "Groups" on their device, or use their password and sign-on information to check their Facebook page. Select "Groups" to see the child's activity in various groups.

2. We recommend parents supervise or monitor their child's use of technology devices, regardless of the age of the child. The best place for parents to start is to enable privacy settings. These settings require the parents' authorization when your child wants to add apps and programs:

FOR IPOD, IPAD, APPLE PRODUCTS a. Go to the main "Settings" menu on the

device

b. Go to "General"

c. Go to "Restrictions":

i. Choose "Enable Restrictions." You will need to create a 4-digit password here. Choose one your child cannot easily guess.

ii. Select the apps or programs you want to privacy protect.

iii. When your child wants to add an app, they must have your authorization, enabling you to learn more about what the app does. Follow this procedure up to "Restrictions"

where you will be able to "Disable Restrictions" so that an app can be added.

If you still have problems working through parental controls, your service provider (Verizon, AT&T, etc.) have help desk staff that will help you.

FOR ANDROID PRODUCTS

The steps to enabling parental controls with an Android device are different from that of an Apple product. Below are some helpful links:

3. We recommend a curfew for technology where ALL technology devices are turned in to the parents at a set time each night. The electronics can be charged in the parents' room, rather than accessible to your child throughout the night.

Visit the Veterans Monument to Commemorate the I50th Anniversary of Memorial Day

In 1966, Congress and President Lyndon Johnson declared Waterloo, New York the "birthplace" of Memorial Day because 100 years earlier there was a ceremony there to honor local veterans who had fought in the Civil War. The day was originally called Decoration Day, and this year marks 150 years since that first ceremony.

According to the Veterans Affairs website, www.va.gov, approximately 25 places have been named in connection with the origin of Memorial Day. Supporters of Waterloo's claim as the birthplace say earlier observances in other cities were typically one-time events, informal and/or not community-wide.

After World War I, the day was expanded to honor those who have died in all American wars. In 1971, Memorial Day, which is still sometimes called Decoration Day, was declared a national holiday by an act of Congress. It was decided that the holiday would fall on the last Monday in May.

Residents are invited to visit the Veterans Monument at Ken-Caryl Ranch on Memorial Day at noon for a special ceremony to honor our local heroes. The Ken-Caryl Veterans Community Allies Group will be laying a wreath in honor of all those who have served this great country. There will also be bubbles and cookies for the kiddos. The monument is located at the southeast corner of Crestone

Mountain and Sangre de Cristo Road in Community Park.

Donations are still needed to help offset the cost of the bronze eagle sculpture as well as to continue to improve and enhance the monument. 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
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
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Volunteer Residents Patrolling Trails

They are each wearing a vest with the KCR Logo and "Volunteer Patrol" printed on the front. An ID will also be displayed to indicate they are working on behalf of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers.

This program is in its fifth year, and recently the annual training was attended by nine new volunteers bringing the total number of patrollers to 19. We appreciate each of them donating their time to educate trail users about Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and the rules.

Please be courteous to these volunteers as they will be stopping each trail user to check residency unless a user is displaying an approved ID Bracelet.

A great alternative to avoiding this issue is to obtain your own ID Bracelet. Visit the Recreation Department at the Ranch House at 7676 South Continental Divide Road or the Community Center at 1 Club Drive. You will need to complete a simple registration form and provide one of these below for proof of membership:

- COLORADO DRIVER'S LICENSE Valid with current KCR address.
- COLORADO ID Valid with current KCR address.
- PROPERTY TAX STATEMENT Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- WARRANTY DEED Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- LEASE/RENTAL AGREEMENT Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.

There is no cost and bracelets are issued two per household and can be temporarily used by house guests when not accompanied by the member. All bracelets expire at the end of 2018 at which point new bracelets will be issued. Most importantly, it is not mandatory to have an ID Bracelet when using Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space, but if you have one easily displayed on your wrist, bike handlebars, or your dog leash, you can enjoy your activity without answering questions about membership from the Volunteer Patrollers or Park Rangers.




