Summer Projects

As schools close for the year, we begin to add our summer staff members. This is an exciting time – while many of our summer crew are familiar faces that are back for another year we also get to meet some new folks. With more staff we are able to complete many of the projects that we have in the 2018 plans. Some are routine like rough mowing in the open space and others are one-time projects like new fences.

I am sure many of you have been driving by the section of rail fence along the Valley Parkway that is leaning badly and wondered why this condition exists. This fence is

connected to a tie wall. The wall is the responsibility of the Master Association, and in 2018 the Board approved funding to repair the wall. Like all of the fence along the Valley Parkway, maintenance of it is the responsibility of the adjacent land owner. However, due to the connection between the two, one cannot be replaced without the other. This spring, the Master Association has been working with the adjacent neighbors to coordinate the best way to remove the fence, replace the wall and then install a new fence. With the help of a resident Eagle Scout candidate, we have a plan. As soon as we can coordinate schedules, work will begin.

Why Don't We Have an Indoor Pool?

In the 2012 and 2017 Resident Surveys, the community expressed interest in having an indoor pool. As the staff and Boards prepared for the bond initiative after the 2012 survey, they did research on the feasibility and cost of having an indoor pool. After meeting with neighboring entities and projecting the year-round costs to operate it, it was determined that an indoor pool would be cost prohibitive for a community this size.

Pools are not generally revenue generators. Even with estimated rental and program revenue, an indoor pool would need to be supported by tax and other program revenue, which is not available in the Metro District's budget. Additional challenges exist today in the form of staffing. Many neighboring indoor pools have struggled to find enough lifeguards to stay open year-round. The Metro District believes it can make better investments in the community and find creative ways to still offer amenities like this.

Since 2014, the Metro District has participated in an IGA with Foothills Park and Recreation District that allows Ken-Caryl Residents to access the Ridge Recreation Center and indoor pools at the Foothills resident rate. This mutually beneficial agreement gives Ken-Caryl residents access to a year-round indoor pool and programming without the cost and staffing burden of operating one in the Metro District. • Board Meeting Summaries

Master Association Board

On May 15, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- A resident voiced her concerns about Docmann Trail.
- A resident asked for a status of contractor trail maintenance work and budget. She also had concerns with parks maintenance, specifically at Heirloom Park, and mentioned the work of the Firewise Committee.
- The Board discussed updating the Trails Master Plan and the creation of a Task Force for this purpose. There were concerns expressed about spending money on a facilitator or consultant to help with the TMP's update. A resident expressed her concerns about a TMP Task Force and the possibility of it being biased toward more trails. The Board will defer the discussion until the 2019 Budget process.
- The Board discussed the possibility of adding another Recycling & Cleanup Event in the fall. Staff will determine the cost to add an event, and the Board will discuss it at its June meeting.
- The Board supports allowing the Trail Club to use the Ken-Caryl logo on a banner at events. A resident expressed his concerns with allowing the Trail Club to use the logo because he considers them a private group. The Board explained that the Trail Club is actually open to all members of the Association and is therefore not private.
- A motion was tabled for final alignment of a section of the East Plum Thicket/ Manzanita Trail. Two residents expressed their concerns about the project and crosswalk.
- A motion passed adopting the amended Committee Appointment and Operating Procedure. The Board decided not to institute term limits for committee members. A resident said she wants a level playing field for new applicants and current committee members, as well as qualifications and objective criteria for committee membership.
- The Open Space Manager gave an update on the Jefferson County Grading Permit process for Docmann Trail.
- A resident asked if the injured biker on Cougar Trail in late April was a resident.
 Open Space Manager Sean Warren said he was told the man was not a resident but was biking with a resident. He did not know the name of that resident.
 Given the serious health concerns (the injured rider was flown out by Fight for Life), identifying the resident status of those involved was not a priority.
- The Board discussed the Open Space Committee vacancy created by Bruce Stover's resignation from the committee. The Board wants staff to reach out to the three candidates who weren't selected in November and ask if they are still interested. Staff will also advertise the opening and seek applications from the community.
- Staff discussed issues at the Manor House with residents visiting the building during events as well as parking concerns. Staff will meet with the Manor House owner about the issues and communicate to the residents.
- Chris Pacetti discussed several projects that are happening now around Ken-Caryl Ranch. Projects include fixing potholes in the Ranch House Parking Lot, replacing the recreation deck at the Ranch House, and replacing the iron fence around the Bradford Pool.
- Sean Warren gave an update on the Dakota Lodge Pond leak project as well as the Brannon Gearhart Trail project.

Metropolitan District Board

On May 22, the Metropolitan District Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- Staff introduced the District's new Recreation Director, Amy Lear. Amy was hired to replace Kristen Peterka, who recently resigned from the position.
- The District's Controller gave an overview of monthly finances.
- The Board discussed the current status of the Ranch House Pool renovation project. A.D. Miller is working on preliminary cost estimates, and the architect is refining the pool design. The Board and staff agree pushing the pool build out a year will allow for a more thorough design and competitive bid

process. There will be more discussion at the June Joint Study Session.

- The Board continued to discuss a S.W.O.T. (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) Analysis for the Metropolitan District. Information from this analysis will be paired with financial data to create a business plan for the District.
- The Board discussed the possibility of adding a Mill Levy increase and a vote about the Gallagher Amendment to the November ballot.
- Kayla Kirkpatrick and John Huggins were declared elected to the Board.
- The Board appointed liaisons to the Open Space and Community Planning Committees
- Staff gave an overview of the benefits available to District Board members.

Who Do I Call?

Complaint reports and the follow up for them can be managed by different agencies than one might assume. I often receive complaints or reports for illegal activity, safety concerns and animal control issues. Other complaints I receive are for zoning and county violations. Occasionally I get complaints from a resident who simply doesn't care for the personal behavior of a neighbor or the activities of their tenants.

While any of these can be valid concerns, reporting them to the entity that can best help to resolve these concerns is important to the process. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Rangers or Community Standards Administrator may not be able to address your concerns effectively, and the Master Association often defers to other agencies for management. Jefferson County Zoning and Planning, Jeffco Sheriff, Jeffco Animal Control and Jeffco Mediation may be the appropriate parties to address your concerns. Below are some scenarios and the agencies best equipped to resolve your concerns.

Illegal Activity: For emergencies, call 911 immediately. Complaints received by the Master Association over the past year included break-ins, drug activity, hit-and-run accidents, and illegal fireworks, to name a few. If you think illegal activity is taking place in your neighborhood, you should reach out to the Jefferson County Sheriff's non-emergency line at 303-277-0211 or visit www.jeffco.us/597/Report-a-Crime.

Road Safety and Repair: The streets and sidewalks of Ken-Caryl are public, and their conditions are managed by Jefferson County Road and Bridge. If you are concerned about potholes, sidewalks or sightline obstructions, you should contact Jefferson County Road and Bridge at 303-271-5200 or visit www.jeffco.us/787/Road-Bridge-Division.

Parks and Open Space: If you live near open space or a greenbelt, chances are you may have to reach out from time to time to report a tree limb growing over into your yard or wildlife activity needing the Rangers' attention. If the common area you are reporting is green and irrigated, please contact the Parks Department. If you see a problem (broken sprinklers or irrigation pipe, damaged fences, landscape lights that are out, tree damage, etc.) or feel that a situation needs to be brought to the attention of the parks staff, please contact Parks Director Pat Malloy at patm@kcranch.org at 303-979-1876, ext. 300. If the situation needs immediate attention and cannot wait until the following business day, you can call after hours at 303-979-1876, ext. 320.

If the common area you are reporting is in the Open Space (non-irrigated) regarding vegetation, deer or elk, please call the Rangers at 303-979-1876, ext. 170. Park Rangers keep a call log when reports come in referencing sightings and or concerns about animals in the open space and private property. For after-hours wildlife issues, please call Colorado State Patrol at 303-239-4501, and they will contact the on-call Parks and Wildlife

Animal Control: Jefferson County Animal Control will respond to reports for dogs barking, dogs at large and wildlife concerns. Animal Control will remove any dead animals and advise on any other injured animals, for example, rabbits, squirrels, raccoons, etc. To report a problem or for more information, please call 303-271-5070 or visit www.jeffco.us/673/Animal-Control.

Zoning Issues: The most common complaints for zoning are home businesses and resident occupancy. Jefferson County Planning and Zoning can help answer questions and conduct any necessary follow up and enforcement. Call 303-271-8700 or visit www.jeffco.us/786/Planning-Zoning.

Neighbor-to-Neighbor Disputes: There are some concerns that cannot be resolved through covenants but that also aren't appropriate for the Sheriff or County to manage. Neighbor-to-neighbor issues include noise from stereos, motorcycles, children, overhanging trees, damage to fences and trees, property line issues etc. Jefferson County offers services to help neighbors reach a compromise. Newborn Wildlife Usually Better Off Left Alone

With spring and early summer comes a rebirth of Colorado's wildlife. From robins and jays to elk and deer, newborn wildlife can be found throughout the state at this time of the year. Colorado Parks and Wildlife asks Colorado residents and visitors to please refrain from touching or approaching the newborns so that they have a chance to thrive in their natural habitat.

According to Colorado Parks and Wildlife, "Young fawns and calves are left alone by their mothers for long periods of time. They are safer when left alone. If you find a young animal by itself, the mother is probably nearby. LEAVE IT ALONE!"

By design, deer fawns and elk calves are born with natural camouflage and a lack of scent. In the first few days of their lives, the newborns are not mobile enough to travel with their mothers. As a defensive tactic to keep nearby predators away from the newborns' location, the mothers will often leave the young animals alone for long periods of time. During this crucial period, the mothers will visit the newborns at least twice a day to feed them. After a few days, the fawns and calves are usually strong enough to join their mothers and the herd, where there's more protection.

If you find a newborn deer or elk, leave the animal alone for at least 12 hours before calling - unless you are absolutely sure the parent animal is dead (hit by a car, for example).

Oftentimes, people will find young birds that appear to have fallen from their nests. Sometimes

the birds have actually fallen and other times they're in the process of learning to fly. If the birds can safely be put back in the nest or on a high branch, it's okay to do so.

One of the best things residents and visitors can do to protect Colorado's newborn wildlife is to keep their pets under control. Countless numbers of baby rabbits, squirrels, birds and other wildlife fall prey to domestic dogs and cats every year. Owners of dogs that chase or injure big game animals – including newborns - can be held liable by law for their dog's

Keeping your pets restrained or indoors as much as possible will protect newborn wildlife, as will respecting the many seasonal wildlife closures that are in place during this time of the year on various municipal, county, state and federal properties to protect young animals.

Note from the Rangers: Blue grouse can be aggressive during the breeding season. If you are approached by an aggressive blue grouse, give them plenty of room and avoid hazina them in a manner that could cause them bodily harm.

• Rules Reminder

Drones Prohibited in Parks and Open Space

Drones can be a visual and auditory nuisance and could be used to harass wildlife when operated around Ken-Caryl Ranch. For these reasons, drones are not allowed in Ken-Caryl Ranch Parks and Open Space, with the exception of Community Park by permit only. Following is an excerpt from the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Rules and Regulations:

"Operation of remote controlled or motorized aircraft (includes drones), or boats from, in, on or over any Association or District owned property is prohibited. However, operation of remote controlled aircraft (including drones) is allowed by permit only in Community Park's air/land space."





Dive Into Fitness This Summer!

Water aerobics is an ideal exercise for people of any size, age and fitness level. If you are seeking a low-intensity form of exercise that burns calories, increases stamina, and strengthens and tones muscles, water aerobics is ideal. The aquatic environment provides buoyancy, resistance, as well as minimal impact to the joints. Both shallow and deep-water exercise classes offer many of the same benefits as land-based exercise, including toning muscle, improving posture and balance, increasing flexibility, and burning calories. Water aerobics provides exercises that target the upper body as well as lower. These classes will strengthen your shoulders, chest, biceps and triceps by adding water weights, or foam barbells, to your routine. Your lower body will be strengthened and challenged by large movements through the water as well as smaller movements to challenge your quads, hamstrings and calves.

Aquatic exercise is often suggested for people with arthritis or mobility concerns as well as natal and post-natal women.

Regardless of your fitness level, water exercises can provide a fun and therapeutic workout. One common goal of exercise is abdominal toning. If you target different large muscle groups and focus on the contraction of your abdominal muscles, nearly any water exercise routine can help to tone this area. While no one water exercise offers the best toning, some are more effective than others. The following exercises are examples of what you might experience in a water class.



Treading Water

Treading water, although it sounds mundane, will actually do wonders for strengthening and toning your body.

Try this: Tread water at a rapid pace for 30 seconds. Rest for 30 seconds and repeat three times. Once you are ready to, increase to one minute of treading and five repetitions. To enhance the effect it has on your stomach, focus on contracting your abdominal muscles while you tread. It helps to imagine a string tied to your belly button that tightens all the way to your spine.



K-Tread

One of the best aquatic exercises for targeting the abdominal area is the

K-tread, according to "Fitness" magazine. As its name suggests, this move is a modified tread meant to amp up the ante. Begin somewhere in the pool where your feet do not easily touch the bottom. Start treading water with your arms out to your sides and your hands making small circles. Stretch your left leg, toes pointed, toward the bottom of the pool. Lift and stretch your right leg out to hip level, toes pointed away from you. From the side, your body should look like the letter "K." Once you have figured out the basic shape, quickly alternate your legs so that you bring your right leg down and your left leg up to hip level. Keep your toes pointed and hold each leg side for five seconds before switching. Continue at this rate for 30 seconds or longer if you can.



Shoulders

Stand tall with your belly button pulled toward your spine and your feet flat on the pool bottom. Straighten your arms out to your sides at shoulder height with your palms facing toward the floor. Your body should resemble the shape of the letter "T." Exhale and lower your straight arms to your sides. Inhale and slowly return your arms to the starting position. You can also do this exercise while holding onto water dumbbells or paddles to create more resistance while you strengthen your shoulders.



A Look at Facilities, Amenities and Services



I am a Realtor and really got to know the area while helping some friends purchase a home here. The close proximity to the mountains was ideal for me. I also love being able to ride to the trails from my house, especially now while training for this year's Leadville 100 mountain bike race. I wanted to get involved with this great community right away and decided to volunteer for the Community Planning Committee. I'm proud to be a part of these hardworking individuals and have learned much about our past, present and future. I am Ken-Caryl.

In this segment, we are reporting on future facilities, amenities and service ideas as reported by data from the 2017 community survey results presentation. When asked about interest in expanding our current amenities, park updates, paved paths, community events, outdoor event areas, fitness facilities and dirt trails were among the top responses. The majority of residents were also for, or open to, expanding a number of other existing offerings such as youth program space, multipurpose space, meeting rooms, baseball fields and outdoor courts. A golf course and skate park were the only two choices that the majority of residents were against.


In terms of activities or amenities not currently offered, restroom facilities at parks, a bar/grill/coffee shop within a Ken-Caryl Ranch facility, a dog park, indoor courts, bike park and pickleball were of interest to the community.


When asked in an open-ended question about activities or facilities that do not currently exist but should be added, indoor swimming, pickleball and a dog park were the top responses. It was noted by the committee that some people might not be aware that arrangements have been made to give Ken-Caryl residents access to the Foothills Ridge Recreation Center and indoor pool at Foothills resident rates. 


Resident Collecting Medication and Supplies for Africa



Dear Editor:

I had sent an email to the MA Board in early April, to which I did not receive a response. April 17, I handed, to all Board members and other staff, a memo to which the chairperson responded almost two weeks later. The memo listed five topic points of which I asked specific questions. The response I received answered none of the questions asked, but stated that I and others, concerned with conservation of the remaining open space, are attacking Board members personally. In a subsequent email, I asked for proof of these allegations, and none have been received as of May 21. This, to me, shows the lack of respect by the Board when we voice our opinions.

One good example is the Manzanita Connector Trail. They have three options for this trail: 1 and 2) create paths with different locations through the field, both include building a bridge over the wetlands, and 3) use the existing sidewalk while not constructing anything. Option 3 seems, in my and others' opinion, to make the most sense, since we all have been living without this trail for 25 + years and have had no issue using the existing sidewalks. However, the Board has applied for a permit to build over the wetlands. Pros and cons are listed on the KC website under Open Space/ Plans & Studies/East Plum Thicket/Manzanita Trail/ to the Segment 7 page, carefully reading the Discussion section. Note the "minuses."

Cost is also a discussion note and has been left out in that section, with the only mention being at the bottom of the page reading: "Other physical resource costs would be budgeted in the Open Space budget." Reading this should shed some light on who the Board is seemingly listening to (which appears it's not the residents who have protested preservation in the past).

Board members are elected to represent all KC residents; however, these seem to be just words, not an actual commitment on their part. We all need to demand the Board live up to their stated commitment to represent all residents.
