**Protecting the Night Sky**

Most of us have been out camping or driving through a desert at night and have seen just how bright and beautiful the night sky really is. In our densely-populated cities, you can't see much more than blackness. Did you know light pollution also affects wildlife and delicate ecosystems?

Ken-Caryl Ranch residents know the value in protecting the night skies in our community and are committed to doing so in partnership with the International Dark-Sky Association. There are

rules in effect that help us manage this commitment we've made as a community. As the weather warms and we start using or installing landscape lighting, it's important to keep this commitment in mind when creating or maintaining our designs. It is always recommended to go over any details of covenants with any contractor. Sometimes a contractor will look to another residence for guidance and end up following something that is out of compliance, creating a potentially costly error. Here are the rules for lighting as outlined in the Home Improvement Rules and Regulations:

**3.25 Lights and Lighting.** Exterior. Committee approval is not required for exterior lighting if installed in accordance with the following: Exterior lights must be conservative in design and be as small in size as is reasonably practical. Exterior lighting shall be directed down and toward the house and shall be of low wattage to minimize glare to adjacent properties. If using CFL or LED lighting, a warm white 2700-3000k is recommended. Lighting for walkways should be directed to the ground. Lighting fixtures should be dark colored so as to be less obtrusive. Low-voltage lighting offers safety advantages over conventional house voltage systems. Any variance or use of high wattage spotlights or flood lights requires Committee approval. **Holiday Decorations and Lights (Exterior):** Committee approval is not required for the display of holiday decorations or lights if these are installed in accordance with the following: With the exception of traditional December holidays, decorations and lighting may be put up no earlier than one month in advance of the holiday and must be taken down within one week following the holiday. For traditional December holidays, decorations and lighting shall not be put up before Nov. 1 and shall be taken down by Feb. 1.

**Trash and Recycling Information**

Waste Connections is the trash and recycling service provider for Ken-Caryl Ranch. Service is included as part of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association monthly dues. Waste Connections can be reached at 303-288-2100 or [www.wcdenver.com](http://www.wcdenver.com).

**Trash and Recycling Totes:** Residents have the option of using their own trash and recycling containers/bags or using 96-gallon totes provided at no charge by Waste Connections. The totes have wheels and are 42 inches tall, the top measures 30x34 inches, and the bottom is 24x24 inches. To order totes, send an email to [kencarylco@wasteconnections.com](mailto:kencarylco@wasteconnections.com), say that you want to sign up for totes, and provide your name, address, email address, and phone number. You can request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.

**Holiday Trash Delays:** Waste Connections observes the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, unless they fall on a weekend. If your normal pickup day falls on or after a holiday, your collection schedule will run one day late that week.

**Auto-Dial Service:** Waste Connections offers an auto-dial service called Call Fire to notify customers of any changes in trash pickup days. You can sign up to receive a phone call online at [www.wcdenver.com/contact/](http://www.wcdenver.com/contact/). Complete the required information, click on Residential Trash Service, then in the comment section say you are a Ken-Caryl resident seeking to sign up for the Call Fire service.

## Master Association Board

The following is a summary of items from the May 16 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- Allen Gallamore, Colorado State Forest Service, gave a report on Ken-Caryl Ranch's plan for addressing forestry and wildfire management. The Firewise Committee was recognized by the State Forest Service, and Allen presented the committee members with an award.
- Dan Hatlestad from the Firewise Committee presented information about the committee's work in the community. He discussed Ken-Caryl Ranch's risk for wildfire and asked for the Board's continued financial support for Firewise education and wildfire reduction efforts.
- West Metro has offered a fire danger sign for the entrance to the Valley. There is concern about the appearance of the sign. The Board discussed the pros and cons of having a fire danger sign and directed staff to pursue options.
- John Brant, Trail Club president, presented the Annual Trail Club report.
- Staff notified the Board about the Kiln Trail re-route plans.
- Open Space Manager Sean Warren presented design options for the Brannon-Gearhart Trail crossing improvement project.
- The Board discussed the possibility of issuing an open space trail bracelet in exchange for professional services.
- The Board discussed the Master Association's policy regarding wetlands. There is currently not a policy. Staff will research the wetlands policy of other open space departments.
- Staff gave an overview of the 2016 Reserve Study.
- Chris Pacetti updated the Board on the Deer Creek Golf Course rezoning. The Planning Commission hearing was continued to June 14.
- A motion passed authorizing staff to allow the use of class 1 pedal-assist e-bikes as Other Power-Driven Mobility Devices on Ken-Caryl Ranch private open space and directing staff to write an amendment to the Open Space Rules to be approved at the next Board meeting.
- A motion passed adopting the amended Policy Regarding the

- Adoption and Amendment of Policies.
- A motion passed authorizing an expenditure of \$7,000 to complete Cougar Trail construction. Funding source is the 2017 contingency fund.
- A motion passed authorizing \$78,000 for replacement footing at the three riding arenas at the Equestrian Center. Funding source is the Reserve fund.

## Metropolitan District Board

On May 23, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors and discussed the following items and took the following actions:

- Staff updated the Board on new staff in the Youth Programs Department and a vacancy in the Forestry Department.
- The pools are scheduled to open May 27.
- The new play features for the Community Center Splash Pad are ordered and should be installed by the end of June. The Master Association purchased a new heater for the Ranch House Pool, and it is now installed.
- The District Manager presented her findings for an organizational report.
- Staff updated the Board on median landscaping.
- Staff notified the Board about proposed new apartments in the Jefferson Corporate Center south of C-470. The apartments are adjacent to the South Hogback Open Space. The Board directed staff to meet with KCR and Jefferson County Open Space to discuss open space access and trails in the area.
- The Board discussed Plains litigation settlement projects. The District will use the settlement proceeds to reimburse the MA and MD for the expense of tennis courts 1 & 2 at the Community Center. Board also directed staff to

- begin planning for a Ranch House pool renovation.
- Staff presented to the Board about a Special Event Liquor License for the Barn BrewHa.
- Staff reported about the final Bond Project wrap-up. Final detail work on the sidewalk at the Community Center will take place at the end of summer.
- The Board discussed the Gallagher projections for the Metro District's property tax revenue.

**Beacon-Tincup Phase II – Fuel Mitigation Project**

Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and the Colorado State Forest Service will be continuing work on the fuels reduction project between Beacon Hill and Tin Cup. Work will begin by a private contractor in mid-June when appropriate conditions occur, with completion by June 30. The project will maintain the 29-acre fuel break that was established in 2016. The contractor will be treating previously cut oak brush by spraying a woody vegetation-specific herbicide that will suppress the re-sprouting from residual root systems. The objectives of this project are to maintain wildfire suppression opportunities, overall forest health and aesthetics of the Open Space property. During forestry operations, there will be signs posted giving trail-users advanced warning that contractor equipment operations are active. Trail closures may be needed occasionally to accommodate equipment use and to provide safety to the public. Any closures will be coordinated by Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Rangers. **Plague Found in Valley Fox**

Open Space Staff were recently contacted by the Jefferson County Public Health Department to report that a dead fox, which was collected from a residence in the Valley in late April, has tested positive for plague. Plague is a highly infectious bacterial disease carried by various types of wild rodents and is transmitted primarily by flea bites. Squirrels, rodents, prairie dogs and other mammals, such as rabbits and cats are susceptible to plague because they carry fleas.

The risk of residents contracting plague is extremely low, but people should be aware that summer marks the beginning of the plague season and just a few simple precautions will further reduce that risk. When plague appears in an area, there is usually a die-off of the rodents and rabbits. When the animal dies, the fleas leave to find another host thus spreading the disease. Most human plague cases result from infected flea bites. Less commonly, people are infected by direct contact (i.e. through a bite) with blood or tissues of infected animals.

The best way to prevent plague is to control the presence of rodents and fleas in and around the home. In addition, people should avoid contact with any species of wild rodents, especially sick or dead rodents. If a dead rodent is found, do not handle the animal directly. Use gloves and place it in a plastic bag.

Dogs and cats should be confined so they cannot prey on infected rodents and then bring the disease home with them. Pet owners who live close to rodent populations should use flea control products recommended by their veterinarian. Controlling fleas on pets will prevent the transfer of fleas to humans. If these reasonable precautions are taken, the probability of contracting plague is extremely low.

The following precautions should be taken to protect yourself and your pets from plague:

- Do not handle or feed squirrels and/or wild animals.
- If a sick or dead pet is found, contact Animal Control immediately at 303-384-8045.
- People and pets should avoid contact with sick or dead wild animals and rodents.
- Eliminate all sources of food, shelter and access for wild animals around the home.
- Maintain a litter and trash-free yard to reduce wild animal habitat.
- Consult with your veterinarian about flea and tick control for your pets.
- Keep pets from roaming freely outside the home where they may prey on wild animals and bring the disease home with them.



Plague is easily treated in humans with antibiotics when recognized early. Two to six days after being infected with plague, people become ill with the following symptoms:

- Sudden onset of high fever
- Muscle pain
- Malaise or a general feeling of being ill
- Nausea and vomiting


Anyone experiencing these symptoms should consult a physician immediately.

Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Staff will continue its plague surveillance of rodent populations in open space. Citizens are requested to report any unusual rodent die-offs to Jefferson County Animal Control at 303-271-5070. ## Informational Open House for New Trail Project: East Plum Thicket-Manzanita Social Trail Conversion

An open house will be held on June 8 from 6-8 p.m. at Dakota Lodge to view plans and answer questions about a new trail project located in the interior open space areas around the neighborhoods immediately north of Bradford K-8 North School (formerly called Bradford Intermediate School). Existing social trails, or unofficial trails, will be modified and in some cases relocated, to create a sustainable trail network that will be included in the open space maintenance program.

Volunteer Trail Coordinators Jeff Lyslo and Dan Mullins have developed a detailed plan, which can be seen on the community website at [www.ken-caryl-ranch.org](http://www.ken-caryl-ranch.org) (Open Space tab, then Plans & Studies) that looks at current conditions, analyzes design

options and provides recommendations for multiple existing social trail segments between Deerwood Drive and Valley Parkway and between Woodruff and Mountain Laurel Drive (see map). The plans will also be on display at the open house, and staff will be on hand to answer questions and take community comments.

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee would like to review community input on the project as they form their recommendation to the Board of Directors. If the board decides to move forward on the project, the earliest construction start date would be spring/summer of 2018. ## Items Hauled Away for Free

The Recycling Event is over. The Community Garage Sale will be over June 3. Still got some stuff hanging around the house that you have been meaning to get rid of? Didn't get around to organizing that garage sale or summon the energy to get rid of that '80s sleeper sofa? What if there was a company that would come pick up almost anything you want to get rid of and haul it away? There is!

Gone for Good is an eco-friendly local company that will pick up most everything from trash to furniture, large or small, haul it away and do everything they can to find it a new home or recycle it. Reid Husmer, owner and originator of the concept, and his crew work hard to resell items, donate items to charity, or break them down and recycle. Reduce/Resell/Recycle is the mission at Gone for Good.

The only items Gone for Good is not able to take are household hazardous chemicals. They typically charge \$150 to pick up 1-3 items, \$300 for a quarter truck pickup, \$450 for a half truck, \$550

for three-quarters truck and \$650 for a full truck (16-foot box truck, 39 cubic yards). You will also receive a tax donation receipt and a discount on your haul-away fee if there are any reusable items in the pickup.

As residents in the Ken-Caryl community, two agents at Colorado Home Realty are sponsoring a pickup of one to three items on June 9 and 10 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. on both days. For most items this service will be FREE, however, there will be charges for electronic items as follows: 31-inch or smaller TV or monitor \$25, 32-42-inch TV or monitor \$50, 43-inch or larger TV or monitor \$75, console or rear projection TV \$100. Printers are \$10.

The guys from Gone for Good will do the lifting and hauling. The normal minimum cost to pick up one to three items is \$150, so this is a valuable service offered by these realtors! Just call to let them know what you would like hauled away.

The Metropolitan District Board passed a similar motion for the Ken-Caryl Ranch Public Open Space at its April Board meeting.





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


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## Garage Sale/Miscellaneous Signage Policy

The purpose of this signage policy is to maintain an aesthetically pleasing neighborhood while offering an opportunity for residents to advertise garage sales, etc. We appreciate your cooperation by adhering to the guidelines, which were adopted by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Architectural Committee.

Signs may be purchased Monday through Friday, 7:30 a.m. - 5 p.m. at the Ranch House business office, 7676 South Continental Divide Road (holidays excluded). A fee of \$5.00 will be charged for each sign. Only these architecturally approved (white 24" wide by 18" high) signs may be used. Signs cannot be posted sooner than the evening before the sale and must be removed no later than the evening of the last day of the sale.

### Acceptable uses for signs:

- Sample/Garage/Yard Sale and Lost Pets
- Temporary signs posted by MA or MD for various community notices may be approved by staff
- Police Station, Fire Station, Schools and Churches may post one sign on their property only.
- Marquee signs – for purpose of KCR Foundation, KCRMA and KCRMD sponsored events and activities. Additional announcements from governmental agencies will be posted on a space available basis following approval by the Executive Director.
- Contractor signs on private property for hired improvements while work is on-going.
- Ovarian Cancer Awareness signs on private property during September have Committee approval.
- Youth activity signs on private property.
- One sign on day of event at event location.

### Sample/Garage/Yard Sale Policy

Garage sales cannot exceed 3 sales per calendar year and shall not be held for more than 4 consecutive days per sale (per County regulation Section 8 - orig. 6-23-81).


### Sign Locations

To keep your community safe and to keep high-impact areas free of clutter, the following rules must be followed.

- Signs will only be allowed at intersections where a turn is required to reach the sale, and only one sign per intersection per event. Each sign must

- have left or right turn arrow.
- Signs will not be allowed on Ken Caryl Avenue west of C-470 except at the intersection of the Valley Parkway
- Signs will not be allowed on South Valley Road except at the intersection of the Valley Parkway or Club Drive.
- Signs will not be allowed at the intersection of Ken Caryl Avenue and Continental Divide Road.

- No signs permitted on medians.
  - No banners are allowed.
- It is unacceptable to attach poster board or other material to your sign. Our goal is to have this signage appear neat and uniform.
- Please Note!!! Signs in any of the above-mentioned areas and other non-complying signs will be removed without notification.**

## Completion of Cougar Trail Anticipated in Mid-June

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association's trail construction contractor, Singletrack Trails, continues to work on Cougar Trail. The rain and snow in mid-May halted the project for a few days, but crews are working hard to complete the trail around the second week of June. They have two teams working on the project - one at the bottom (hand crew) and one at the top (machine crew). As of May 21, the upper crew had finished about 4,170 feet of the trail. The crew at the bottom had constructed about 2,335 feet. As of May 21, the project is about 54 percent complete, with approximately 6,505 feet constructed.



**Water connects us all. Denver Water's summer watering rules ensure we have enough water now and in the future. Water belongs to everyone, and we are all responsible for using it wisely.**

Summer watering rules are enforced May 1 to Oct. 1.

- ⊕ Water during cooler times of the day — lawn watering is NOT allowed between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- ⊕ Water no more than three days per week.
- ⊕ Do not allow water to pool in gutters, streets and alleys.
- ⊕ Do not waste water by letting it spray on concrete and asphalt.
- ⊕ Repair leaking sprinkler systems within 10 days.
- ⊕ Do not irrigate while it is raining or during high winds.
- ⊕ Use a hose nozzle with a shut-off valve when washing your car.

**Rules for watering new seed and sod**

Denver Water customers with newly planted seed or sod may water new turf as necessary, for up to 21 days. After 21 days, routine watering is limited to no more than three days per week and not between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. To submit your request for a 21-day watering exemption, call 303-893-2444 or email [customer@denverwater.org](mailto:customer@denverwater.org).

**Report water waste**

If you see water waste that does not meet these rules, call Denver Water at 303-893-2444, or report it online at [denverwater.org](http://denverwater.org). These rules are mandatory. Repeat offenders may be fined.

# Rules for Outdoor Water Use

These times are based on a sprinkler system running at an efficient level. No watering between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.

Use this chart as a starting point to determine the number of minutes to water each zone on the days you water. These times are averages. Adjust your watering minutes based on rainfall, type of grass or plants, sunny or shady locations and other characteristics.

Watering two days a week should be sufficient during most of the summer. If needed, water a third day during extreme heat or dry periods. Water trees and shrubs as needed, but not between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Shrubs and perennials need half as much water as lawns.

There are no assigned watering days, but never water a zone more than three days a week.

## Successful 2017 National Wildfire Community Preparedness Day in Ken-Caryl

The annual national Wildfire Community Preparedness Day event is held across the United States on the first Saturday of May. It was started to help raise wildfire awareness, promote collaboration, and bring neighbors together to work on projects that can help protect homes, neighborhoods, and entire communities from future wildfire risk or current post-fire impacts. The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee used the Recycling Event on May 6 to raise awareness about protecting your family with an early and planned evacuation for an approaching wildfire.

This year the Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee saw Prep Day as an opportunity to continue its education project focusing on preparing your family for a safe evacuation in the event of wildfire. The fuels within all of Ken-Caryl

create an increasing amount of flammable vegetation and materials that can ignite quickly in a fire. Residents who want to increase their wildfire safety received information from Firewise, the Jefferson County Emergency Management Office and the Colorado State Forest Service as they lined up to recycle household goods at the Ranch House. Over 400 information packets were distributed to Ken-Caryl residents during the event.

Preparedness Day is a call to action that gives people of all ages a chance to plan and participate in a risk reduction or wildfire evacuation planning to make Ken-Caryl a safer place to live. Continued drought and hotter temperatures are major contributors to the increased wildfire activity we have experienced across Colorado. Members of the Firewise Committee did hear from several residents, "Oh, we don't need the information – we don't live in the Valley." All areas of Ken-Caryl are at risk of wildfire, and everyone must be prepared. Don't wait until the next Community Wildfire Preparedness Day to prepare. 
