With the record-setting rainy May on the Front Range this year, the opening of the outdoor pools on Ken-Caryl Ranch seemed to come suddenly this year. However, in spite of the weather, the pools did open for business on Saturday, May 23. Both the Ranch House and Bradford pools will be open until school starts in August with the Community Center pool scheduled to stay open through Labor Day, the first weekend in September.

With the temperatures beginning to warm up, summer is now in full swing. Check out the 2015 issue of the Metropolitan District's annual recreation brochure, District Dimensions, for a listing of the activities and events scheduled

during our busy upcoming summer. There is something to interest every age group for the summer to get you out and about in your community. You can find the current issue of District Dimensions on our website at www.ken-carylranch.org under the Programs & Activities tab.

Planning for the bond projects continued in May as the design team met with the District and Master Association Boards in early May to present the latest plans and estimated costs for both the building and site plans for the Ranch House, the Community Center and Dakota Lodge. Unfortunately, we cannot afford all of the improvements we would like to incorporate into the projects. Current construction costs continue to escalate with the improving economy. As a result, the design team is making modifications to the plans for each facility with a goal of bringing the costs back into line with the amounts approved in the bond election of May 2014.

Updated cost estimates and building plans were presented to both the District and Master Association Boards at the June 2 Joint Study Session. At this meeting, the Boards made some decisions on the improvements that are planned and how they will be paid for. These decisions will allow the design team to proceed with the development of detailed design plans and construction drawings to initiate the process of soliciting bids from contractors to perform the actual work. Construction is planned to begin on many of the projects this fall following the closing of the outdoor pools for the season. #### • Bond and Improvement Projects

#### New Community Entrance Signs

The first project using bond funds is moving forward. This project is to replace the main entrance signs around Ken-Caryl. Some initial sign design concepts were presented to residents in April 2014, and feedback was gathered and reviewed. Based on the feedback, a new sign design, shown on the right, was developed and approved by the Boards.

While several of the community entrance signs will be replaced around Ken-Caryl, the first sign replacement is scheduled for the



entrance to the Valley. Weather dependent, the Valley sign installation was scheduled to begin the week of May 25. The second sign that will be installed is near the intersection of Gore Range Road and Simms by the entrance to the Territory neighborhood. Several other signs will be installed at a later date. #### • Board Meeting Summaries

#### **Master Association Board**

The following is a summary of items from the May 19 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- The Board reviewed a request for a remediation plan in Massey Draw and referred it to the Open Space Committee for further review.
- The Board received a staff report on some trail erosion adjacent to 93 North Ranch Road.
- The Board reviewed the Alternative Dispute Resolution Policy with no changes suggested or made.
- Manager's Report: A written report was included in the Board package.
- Committees: Board member committee liaisons reported on the activities that their committees have been engaged in for the past month.
- A motion adopting the Forest Stewardship Plan and Wildfire Mitigation Plan as recommended by the Open Space Committee was approved.
- · A motion not to accept the Towerpointe proposal was approved.
- A motion accepting the Survey of Critical Biological Resources, Cougar Trail Alignments was approved.
- Resolution 15-02 authorizing staff to open a new bank account at Key Bank was approved.

#### **Metropolitan District Board**

On May 26, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors and discussed the following items and took the following actions:

- The Board received an update on the construction of the Veterans Monument at Community Park. Construction is under way with site excavation nearly completed. Due to delays from the rainy weather in May, the construction is scheduled to be completed by early June.
- The Board received an update from staff on the 2015 aquatics program. Despite the cool and rainy weather, all outdoor pools opened for the season on Saturday, May 23.
- The Board received an update on the 2014 District audit. The auditor for the District began fieldwork in May with a presentation of the audit to the District Board scheduled for June.
- The Board reviewed a regular monthly report of expenditures for the bond projects.
- The Board took action to appoint Lauri Lehan-Milano as the new President of the Board of Directors. Director Bob Generoli moved from President to Vice-President of the Board.
- The Board took action to approve the contract with Adolfson & Peterson Construction as Construction Manager/General Contractor for the bond improvement projects at the Ranch House, the Community Center and Dakota Lodge.

#### Sign, Sign, Everywhere a Sign

The title for this issue's topic was put to music by the Five Man Electrical Band over 40 years ago. Earworms aside, summer is unofficially here, school is out, and the level of activity has increased exponentially. Let's refresh awareness of the guidelines for signage that accompanies some of those events.

There is typically an upswing of real estate activity when the school year ends, and signs are an important part of successful home sales. The solitary sign placed at a property for sale or rent cannot exceed 6 square feet, must be fixed upright and freestanding, and cannot be displayed from a window (except in Mountain Gate). Most frequently, realtor sign infractions take place with open house events. The Real Estate Signage Guidelines give specific instructions for placement of open house temporary signage, tasking homeowners and realtors with a careful review so that noncompliant signs are not removed, impacting the effectiveness of the open house.

A perennial problem persists with contractor signage. Simply put, a contractor's sign may be placed in the yard of a home only as long as the work is actively being done. No contractor may place signs on Master Association property or road right-of-ways. There are companies that frequently violate this policy, so staff time (and homeowners' dollars) is needed to remove and dispose of those signs. There are many competent lawn aerators, window washers or house painters who respect our community's appearance by not littering with tacky signage. You may wish to re-consider if a company you are contemplating hiring uses this polluting form of advertising.

Finally, there are garage or sample sale signs that need to be the white 24" by 18" signs on the wire supports that are abundantly on display during the warmer months. Very specific allowable locations are listed on the signage policy given to anyone who purchases signs at the Ranch House. If you obtain signs elsewhere, the policy is on our website under the "Resident" tab, where you will find the "Signage Policies" link. The intent is to have the signs be purposeful (placed where a turn is required) and of as little visual impact as possible (no signs on medians or at busy traffic intersections). I wish you a successful sale, but please do not compromise your chances by poor placement of signs that end up being removed.

Please remember that updated rules address issues as they surface. Ken-Caryl Ranch documents are available at the Ranch House and on our website at www. ken-carylranch.org. 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#### New Trail Design to be Reviewed by Board

Staff and volunteers have been working collaboratively on a design for the Cougar Trail Complex since 2012 and will be presenting a final design for a portion of the project to the MA Board at their June 16 meeting. The conceptual design for the entire trail complex includes nearly five miles of new natural surface, multi-purpose, backcountry trail west of the Manor Ridge and Eagle's Pointe neighborhoods and south of Massey Draw and is one of the recommended new trail projects cited in the Trails Master Plan (TMP).

The design team for the project includes members of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee and the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board and was tasked by the Board with developing the final design for the project. The team's goal for the project is to create an enjoyable trail experience for hikers, bikers and equestrians while "avoiding impacts and protecting habitat for rare or sensitive species" in accordance with the TMP. The team also seeks to mitigate potential impacts to neighboring properties. This is the typical procedure for finalizing new trail projects, and like other trail projects, the design alignment can change several times during this process while the team works to find the right balance.

The team decided to break the project up into two parts: Upper and Lower Cougar Trails. The final design for Lower Cougar Trail (see map) is complete and will be presented to the Board on June 16. Lower Cougar Trail will be accessed from Massey Draw Trail just east of its intersection with Colorow Trail and from

the Valley Parkway just south of Amaranth Drive. The trail creates a loop of moderate to easy difficulty along the rolling, grassy toe slopes of the foothills. This project will establish a new open space access/ trailhead to neighborhoods in the south part of the Valley.

Subject to Board approval, construction of this project, along with Lower Question Mark Peak Loop (construction of this project began in spring 2014) could be completed this summer. The Board approved \$25,000 for contract trail construction in 2015. In addition, \$28,000 is budgeted in 2015 for staff labor on trail construction and trail permitting. Other in-house trail construction related costs covered in other areas of the Open Space Department budget include equipment, supplies and fuel. Another significant source of trail construction labor is provided by Ken-Caryl Ranch Trail Club members and other volunteers.

Surveys of critical biological resources along the conceptual alignments for the Cougar Trail Complex were completed in 2012 and 2014. The surveys were completed by professional field biologists under contract with the Master Association. The biologists' findings and recommendations, provided in the survey reports, can be found on the community website; go to Open Space Administration and look under Plans and Studies. You will also find on this page biological reports for other trail projects and the Trails Master Plan.


The biological surveys are an important factor of the design process and concerns over findings along the alignment for Upper Cougar Trail have made the task of finalizing the design for this portion of the project more challenging. The team will continue its work in this area and notify the community of its progress.

The Master Association would also like to thank the volunteers on the design team for being so generous with their time and for providing valuable input on how to make our trail system enjoyable and sustainable. Volunteers have contributed thousands of hours to designing, building and maintaining trails throughout Ken-Caryl Ranch open space and are an essential force in attaining all major trail work accomplishments over the past several years. Their stewardship and commitment has made our trail system the best it can be!

# Sisters Honoring Their Mother's Memory by Promoting Ovarian Cancer Awareness

Lindsay Abrams and Laura Brzezicki will be among the hundreds of runners and walkers in Denver's City Park Saturday, June 6 for the sixth annual Jodi's Race for Awareness benefitting the Colorado Ovarian Cancer Alliance (COCA). This year, however, the sisters won't be participating alongside their mom, Joyce Swanson. She passed away in September 2014 of ovarian cancer.

It was during the inaugural Race for Awareness in 2010 that Joyce learned about the symptoms of ovarian cancer (bloating, pelvic or abdominal pain, difficulty eating or feeling full quickly, and urinary urgency or frequency). Just over a year later, in August 2011, Joyce recalled that information and became aware of the possibility that the fifth most common cancer in females in the United States – and the deadliest gynecologic cancer – was impacting her life, too. The following month she was diagnosed with Stage III ovarian cancer.

Lindsay said the one thing that bothered her mother, an active woman who taught aerobics and was a Jazzercise instructor for 25 years, was trying to figure out, "What did I do wrong?" Her eating habits were healthy ones, she stayed fit, and there was no family history of ovarian cancer.

All women are at risk of developing ovarian cancer regardless of age, according to the Ovarian Cancer National Alliance (OCNA). An annual gynecological exam does not check for this cancer, and there is no specific screening test for ovarian cancer so being able to recognize the symptoms, leading to early detection, is critical to saving lives.

In addition to participating in the 2015 Jodi's Race, Lindsay, a full-time mother of 2-year-old twin girls, and Laura, a nurse at Children's Hospital Colorado, are co-chairs of the Expo at this year's event. "We want to help COCA promote ovarian cancer awareness in any way we can," said Abrams. "It's a good outlet for grief and a way to honor our mother. We want to spread awareness so that women recognize the symptoms earlier rather than later."

All money collected during the annual fundraiser remains in Colorado and is used for programs that support women with ovarian cancer, including COCA.Cares Financial Assistance, Nicki's Circle Support Groups, Ovarian Cancer Resource Manual, Comfort Kits for the newly diagnosed, the annual Raise Awareness campaign, and Survivors Teaching Students: Saving Women's Lives®, a national program of the OCNA.

Lindsay was the first-grade teacher at Bradford Primary of Ken-Caryl resident Meghan Brammeier, whose mother Jodi inspired the Race for Awareness. Laura's best friend from college lost her mother to ovarian cancer.

"Even though Lindsay and I had experiences with ovarian cancer before it so closely touched our lives, I think I speak for both of us when I say we never thought it could happen to us," Laura said. "That is why we want to be involved in raising awareness about ovarian cancer in our community. This has been the most devastating experience of our lives, and we don't want anyone else to have to experience this awful disease."

Built around you."

"Our mother was such a generous, caring person; she would do anything for anyone," Lindsay said. "She made so many lives better. I hope that by spreading awareness about ovarian cancer I can make someone else's life better. I would like to touch their lives and be able to give them strength and courage. The women who are battling ovarian cancer are such fighters."



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

#### **Reporting Crimes** Online

Whether it's shopping, banking, communicating with family, or even sending an email to a colleague down the hall, the Internet has been incorporated into nearly every aspect of our daily lives. It is only logical then that citizens see the Internet as a resource and a tool for interacting with law enforcement. As such, the Sheriff's Office has integrated it into our service offerings.

The benefits of online reporting can be seen from both perspectives. The Sheriff's Office realizes that online reporting allows deputies to serve citizens as they normally would with the benefit of keeping more deputies available for emergent calls. Online reporting ensures that lesser priority calls still receive a response in a timely manner. Online reports have gradually replaced telephone reports and decreased lobby visits that are managed by a desk deputy. In 2014 alone the system generated 281 online reports.

The monetary savings are secondary to the convenience this service enhancement offers citizens. Reports can be logged from the comfort of homes, offices or from a handheld device. There is no longer a concern for citizens with long commutes, family obligations or other appointments that require postponing in order to file reports in a traditional way.

The JCSO is proud to be among the early pioneers providing this service. Online reporting is not a fad that will disappear in the near future, but rather an enhancement of police service that is here to stay. Online reporting is an extension of our face-to-face customer service and furthers our commitment to the community we serve.

#### How does online reporting work?

While not all crimes can be reported on our website, some can. Currently, the JCSO allows citizens to file online police reports for crimes that occurred in unincorporated Jefferson County when there is no known suspect information. Report types can be for lost property, theft, vandalism and graffiti, vehicle tampering, vehicle burglary and harassing phone calls.

When citizens file a report they are greeted with a screen outlining the process and requirements for submitting a report online. Upon completion of the report, citizens have the option to modify any portion of the report and print out a temporary police report. Citizens have the opportunity to file supplemental information to their original reports at a later date.

Once an online report has been submitted, it is then sent to a reviewer's inbox. The reviewer is responsible for reviewing, approving, rejecting, modifying or following up on reports. Upon approval, reports are treated and viewed in the same way as an officer-initiated report.

#### How to report a crime online

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#### In-Home Pet Euthanasia: A Personal Story

Pet euthanasia is a tough subject. "When" is the most common decision that we can agonize over, but now we need to consider the "where." In years past, our precious family members had no choice but to get in the car and head to, in many cases, the very place that they had spent time being poked and prodded. Guilt from pet parents having to make that final drive and visit was compounded with the anxiety of the pet and the finality of this decision.

Now there is an option of having your pet stay home and have an in-home euthanasia procedure. Your pet spends their last few hours at home with their families, in their beds and enjoying special moments and spoiling, instead of being fearful and anxious.

The following is an experience in her own words from Distinctive Pet Care's Office Manager, Lanette Schwarz.

"On March 28, we had to do the most difficult thing a pet owner can do, euthanize our beloved 16 year-old dog, Ozzie. Ozzie had been sick with cancer for a long time. We were told that one day his tumor would erupt and the bleeding would be uncontrollable; then it will be time to put him down. We tried to prepare ourselves but this day still caught us by surprise.

A few weeks prior, a friend who knew that Ozzie was sick told me about in-home euthanasia. I was surprised to hear this was possible because my only knowledge of euthanasia was what I saw in movies (i.e. Marley and Me), where the dog is scared, lying on a metal table and the adults say goodbye.

When Ozzie's bleeding was uncontrollable, I got a referral for an inhome euthanasia veterinarian from Dawn with Distinctive Pet Care. I wasn't sure what to expect, I never had to do this before. Through tears I called the veterinarian and explained Ozzie's medical history and that I felt it would be best to euthanize him. She was calm and explained the process over the phone. We discussed the role my children should or could have. Since they are older (ages 8 and 11), it would be okay if they were present but to give them the option to go to another place in the house if they became uncomfortable and didn't want to stay for the whole process.

The vet arrived, and her demeanor was very peaceful and caring. Ozzie greeted her at the door and she explained the process to my husband and children. My daughter asked a lot of questions and the vet patiently answered all of them. Ozzie was lying comfortably on the living room

floor. We sat down next to him and she explained that she was going to give him some medicine that will make him very relaxed and sleepy. To distract him from the needle poke, she had the kids give him some yummy-smelling, chewy treats – they fed him treat after treat. He didn't even notice the poke.

It took several minutes for him to get sleepy. During that time, we gave him a few more treats, petted him, told him how much we loved him, and what a good dog he had been. He fell asleep and was resting peacefully while the final shot was given. A few moments later Ozzie was gone. We had a few quiet minutes with him to say our last goodbyes. We decided to do a clay paw print and inscribe his name. Then he was wrapped in a blanket and taken to be cremated.

I was concerned that having the kids see their dog euthanized would scar them for life. I couldn't have been more wrong. I'm glad the kids had the chance to be there. It was good for them to say goodbye and get closure; it was sad but not scary. Most importantly, being in our home was best for Ozzie, too; he was relaxed and comfortable, surrounded by the people who loved him. It was very peaceful. I would recommend this type of in-home euthanasia for all pets."

It's been a few months since Ozzie passed. Lanette and her family are thinking of getting a dog so the house isn't so empty, but they know they will never replace Ozzie. Euthanasia is a tough subject but for those of us who have pets, it is usually one that we cannot avoid. My advice is to prepare in advance, ask questions, know your options and have a plan for you and your children. The in-home euthanasia service that Lanette used is "A Peaceful Passage" and the veterinarian is Dr. Christine Daigler, DVM. Her info is at www.apeacefulpassage.com



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

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

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

Also, as a dog owner, I've noticed quite a number of other dog owners who use and enjoy our trails, sidewalks and open space. One missing amenity that I would love to see here is a dog park and it looks as if we have enough open space to build one. Sadly, the closest dog park is in Chatfield and is a per-use fee park.

I noticed on the KC Ranch website that public surveys were taken in 2012 concerning what additional amenities KC Ranch residents would like. And it looks as if a "dog park" and "Rec Center with indoor pool and/or gym and fitness center" were two of the more popular choices along with "additional backcountry trails." I can only speak for myself, but the extensive trail system here at KC Ranch doesn't need more trails. In my time here, I've found the trails to be very under-utilized when compared to other JeffCo open spaces. In fact, I can venture out on a weekend morning and not encounter another soul on the trails. I have noticed that the Rec Center isn't as well-appointed as I would like so I don't use the facilities.

It would be great if the Master Association would allow the residents to have a say on the top three or five amenities since the original survey had up to 30 choices. And, since the top choices garnered anywhere from 42%-44% it would seem that each item is important to a large number of KC Ranch residents. Narrowing it down to a smaller number of choices might allow the board to make a more informed decision as to the needs of the community. I, for one, would like to see our community's monies spent on items that are important to many residents rather than a select few.
