The summer of 2016 is now in full swing on Ken-Caryl Ranch. The pools are open, and the busy summer activities are all taking place. While the major construction activities at the Ranch House, the Community Center and Dakota Lodge will be wrapping up later in June, please be aware of ongoing work as you access the facilities for swimming and other programs. We are now in the home stretch of completing the major part of all of the construction at the facilities so they can be turned back over to residents for use and operation. While there will be many follow-up items on the construction punch list, which will be taking place throughout the summer, the vast majority of the construction is nearing completion within the next several weeks.

The construction manager and contractor on the projects, Adolfson & Peterson Construction, has begun the process of demobilizing its construction trailers and compounds at each of the facilities. This means that residents will notice that portions of the parking lots that have been set aside for construction parking and storage throughout the projects are being dismantled and cleared for use for parking once again by patrons. The construction trailers and compounds at Dakota Lodge and the Community Center are the first to be demobilized with the Ranch House to be the final remaining construction material storage area.

While the bond facility projects are nearing completion this month, two other bond construction projects are just beginning. The park improvement and playground projects at both Heirloom Park and Saddlewood Park are just beginning. The contractors for these projects are now on site at each of the parks and have begun the process of preparing the parks for the upcoming improvements. The old playgrounds at each park have been dismantled in preparation for new playgrounds to be constructed. In addition, each of the parks will be receiving new irrigation systems and landscaping as part of the improvement packages. The Saddlewood Park playground will be a community build process with a build date to be announced soon. Both parks are planned for an August completion.

Hot Topics

Some household items, garden plots and recreational accoutrements are typically associated with warm weather, but please submit for architectural approval before purchasing or installing them. Nothing puts a damper on a prized new acquisition like having me contact you after a complaint or a review because the submittal process was overlooked.

Air conditioners or evaporative coolers cannot be installed on roofs or on the fronts of homes. Evaporative coolers must be installed either on the ground or in a first floor opening.

Vegetable gardens also make seasonal appearances in the late spring and early summer. These must be located in a side or back yard, and protective fenced enclosures cannot exceed 7 1/2 feet in height using black metal posts and black mesh, which can only be installed during the growing season.

Sports and recreational activities are in full gear with the sunny, warm days and long evenings. Trampolines cannot be olaced within a 5-foot setback, and the noise factor and neighbors' views should be taken into consideration when proposing the placement site. Standard size fixed free-standing basketball goals must receive committee approval before being installed, but standard size backboards mounted on the house do not need approval. While no architectural submittal is needed for portable basketball goals, the rule states they need to be stored upright at least halfway up the driveway when not in use.

Outdoor activities involving more elaborate equipment and larger spaces have much appeal this time of year. Tennis courts, in-ground pools and sports courts have specific rules for location, lot size, setbacks, fencing, grading, lighting and landscaping. Planning and submittal for these proposed improvements should take place well before the season begins. Please note that aboveground pools having a filtering system and a height greater than a wading pool are not permitted.

I hope everyone gets many opportunities to enjoy their outdoor space this summer, and that these examples provided some clarification and awareness to make improvements successful and

Bond Projects Construction Update

The Bond Projects are nearing completion – most of the work will be completed in June with site work and additional scope of work trickling into July. As with most construction projects, there have been challenges that the team has encountered along the way.

These challenges started with a permitting process that was much longer than anticipated. In addition to permitting, the utility companies have been inundated with service and easement change requests due to the construction boom in the area. Unfortunately both of these issues caused the site work to be started later in the construction season, which was then impacted by the heavy spring snows and rain.

Although the bond projects have been complex occupied renovations at three separate sites in the middle of one of the largest construction booms the Denver metro area has seen in decades, the design and construction team has kept the project within budget, completing additional work that has added value to the project, with minimal schedule delays. Joint Study Session

On June 7, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards held a Joint Study Session at the Ranch House and discussed the following

- The Boards received comments from residents in attendance concerning: Heirloom Park landscaping/trees/ playground, maintenance of the medians, and a question about the budget.
- Cheryl Humann of Vanir Construction, our owner's representative, presented an update on the status of the Bond Projects (see article on this page).
- The Parks Advisory Committee (PAC)
 reported on the status of their review of
 the irrigation/turf reduction program.
 Then several comments/questions were
 received from members in attendance
 about this plan. Comments included
 expressions of disappointment in the
 areas selected. The PAC will schedule
 another meeting to discuss this
 feedback.
- Staff presented an update on the neighborhood signs. The Territory neighborhood has not expressed an interest in assuming responsibility for keeping the sign. Staff was directed to develop a landscape plan including costs for the area around the Territory sign before removing the sign.
- The Boards continued the initial budget discussions from the May 18 Budget Summit.



A new entrance is being added to the Recreation area on the south end of the Ranch House. The entrance features a concrete pathway leading from the parking lot to a new wooden deck and French doors. This new entrance is anticipated to open in late June, barring any weather or construction delays.

Wildlife Trapped in Window Wells

Every year the Park Rangers experience several calls from residents regarding wildlife accidently falling into open window wells. This may seem like an unusual occurrence, but it happens more than you think. The hard part is trying to remove the wild animal when it is confined to a small area, possibly injured and scared as their survival instinct makes them unpredictable.

Some window wells at homes may be only a few feet deep to as much as 8 feet. This means the average animal that falls into the well cannot easily remove themselves. The problem is the window well texture itself. The metal that is used in the construction is ribbed but smooth, and an animal's claws cannot grip the metal. In addition, the angle is so extreme that the animals slip while trying to escape and stay inside. If the animal cannot exit the well on its own, it can become exhausted and eventually starve to death.

There have also been several examples on Ken-Caryl Ranch over the years in which deer have fallen into window wells, thrash around breaking glass trying to escape, and injure themselves while running around the basement looking for an exit!

I, along with other Park Rangers, have in the past removed yearling deer from window wells. A few times Park Rangers have had to lower themselves down into the well to capture the animal for release,



which can be dangerous both for the animal and the Park Ranger. One of the easy methods to assist an animal trapped in a window well is to place a long board or two (best with rope/grips attached) inside the well at an easy angle. This allows the animal to gain a grip and climb outside to ground level. For removing snakes, a long pole or shovel with a bag on the end in addition to a board will help to catch and release them.

A great way to end any future concerns regarding wildlife and your open window well is to spend the extra money and install grate covers. The grate cover serves two purposes: one is allowing wildlife to pass safely over and around your home and two it is equally safe for young children who could accidently fall into the window well and injure themselves. Safety Tips

Slow Down While Driving!

Several residents have commented recently about cars speeding throughout the neighborhood. Now that school is out for summer, there are more children playing in the community. Please SLOW DOWN, particularly when driving through the residential areas.

Here are some speeding and safety statistics provided by Jefferson County's Transportation & Engineering Department:

- 1. The speed at which a vehicle is traveling directly impacts the likelihood of death for pedestrians or bicyclists who are struck. Someone struck by a vehicle going 25 mph is half as likely to die as someone struck at 30 mph. If crashes do occur, the severity of injuries goes down with lower speeds.
- Driving the speed limit gives the driver more time to react to pedestrians entering the roadway unexpectedly. It also reduces the chance of fatal and

serious injuries to the pedestrian if the motorist is unable to avoid the collision.

 Save gas! According to a report on Edmunds.com, the best ways to save gas (besides driving less or driving a fuel-efficient vehicle) are to avoid excessive idling, drive with more gradual accelerating and decelerating, and drive slower.



It's Back... Items Hauled Away For Free!

Clearing up clutter? Need to make room for that new furniture? Too much stuff in your way? What if there was a friendly and efficient service that would come take away just about anything you want to get rid of and haul it away? There is!


Gone For Good is a local eco-friendly company that will pick up most everything from trash to old electronics to furniture of all shapes and sizes, haul it away, and do everything they can to find it a new home or recycle it. But more than that, Reid Husmer, owner/originator of the concept and his crew will work hard to resell items, donate them to charity, or recycle what's recovered to ensure that as little as possible is thrown away. Hazardous household items are the only things that Gone for Good can't take.

The company typically charges \$150 for a quarter truck, \$300 for a half truck and \$500 for a full, 14-foot box truck (22 cubic yard) pickup. You will receive a taxdonation receipt and a discount on the haul-away fee if there are any reusable items in the pickup. The team will do an

evaluation of the all items and give an estimated value of the resale. They will give you a 30 percent discount from the total of the estimated value. For example, if they think they can resell a couch for \$100, then you will get \$30 off your haul-away fee.

As residents in the Ken-Caryl community and agents at Colorado Home Realty, Brian Lee and Greg Milano are sponsoring a pick-up of one to three items on Friday, July 8 and Saturday, July 9 from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. both days. The crew from Gone for Good will do all the lifting and hauling and for most items this service will be FREE! However, there will be a nominal charge for electronic items as follows: small TV/PC monitor \$10, medium TV/PC monitor \$25 and large TV/PC monitor \$50. The normal minimum fee to pick up one to three items is \$150, so this is a valuable service offered by these local realtors!

Please be courteous to these volunteers as they will be stopping each trail user to check residency unless a user is displaying an approved ID Bracelet.


A great alternative to avoiding this issue is to obtain your own ID Bracelet. Visit the Recreation Department at the Ranch House at 7676 South Continental Divide Road or the Community Center at 1 Club Drive. You will need to complete a simple registration form and provide one of these below for proof of membership:

- COLORADO DRIVER'S LICENSE Valid with current KCR address.
- COLORADO ID Valid with current KCR address.
- PROPERTY TAX STATEMENT Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- WARRANTY DEED Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.
- LEASE/RENTAL AGREEMENT Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.

There is no cost and bracelets are issued two per household and can be temporarily used by house guests when not accompanied by the member. All bracelets expire at the end of 2018 at which point new bracelets will be issued. Most importantly, it is not mandatory to have an ID Bracelet when using Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space, but if you have one easily displayed on your wrist, bike handlebars, or your dog leash, you can enjoy your activity without answering questions about membership from the Volunteer Patrollers or Park Rangers.

Some states even offer residents state income tax benefits on contributions and withdrawals. If you use 529 savings for non-qualified expenses, however, the earnings portion of your withdrawal may be subject to taxes and

Gives you flexibility

With a 529 plan, you can save for higher education costs for just about anyone in your life — your children, grandchildren, other relatives or even yourself if you decide to go back to school. There are generally no age limits for the account beneficiary and, unlike other tax-deferred investment programs, your ability to contribute is not phased out at higher income levels. Most important, the money you save in a 529 plan can be used at any eligible college, university or vocational school.

What if your child decides to skip

The money you save in a 529 plan can be transferred to another family member, or even yourself, for higher-education costs, although taxes and penalties may apply. Please consult the specific state's plan document for details on transferring a 529 plan.


Residents Commemorate 150th Anniversary of Memorial Day at Veterans Monument

Prevent Animal-Borne Diseases This Summer

Jefferson County Public Health (JCPH) is reminding residents that along with warm weather this summer, residents may be exposed to wild animals and insects that carry the following diseases: Rabies, West Nile Virus, Western Equine Encephalitis, Zika Virus, Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome, Bubonic Plague, Tularemia and Colorado Tick Fever. These diseases can be carried by wild animals and insects and then transmitted to humans.

JCPH encourages everyone to protect their family and pets by taking the following precautions: Always wear insect repellant and appropriate clothing when enjoying outdoor activities. Control the presence of rodents and mosquitoes around their home by sealing all openings and removing standing water. Vaccinate all of your pet cats, dogs, ferrets and valuable livestock for rabies, and provide flea and tick protection. Do not to handle sick or dead animals or animal waste, and contact your local animal control agency for assistance in dealing with domestic or wildlife encounters.

Rabies

Rabies is an infectious viral disease that affects the nervous system of humans and other mammals. People and domestic pets can get rabies from the bite of a rabies-infected animal (rabid animal). Any wild mammal, such as raccoon, skunk, fox, coyote or bat can have rabies and transmit it to people through a bite. It is also possible, although rare, for persons to get rabies when infectious material, such as saliva from a rabid animal, gets into an individual's eyes, nose, mouth or open

It's important to vaccinate your pets even if they stay indoors because rabid bats have been found inside homes as well as outdoors. Protect your home from wildlife and insects by making sure all windows, doors or other openings are always closed and have screens that are in good condition. Keep your home and yard clutter free and seal any openings.

If bitten by a bat, dog, cat, raccoon or other mammal, wash the affected area thoroughly and seek medical advice immediately. Contact your local animal control agency with the location of the animal so the animal can be collected to undergo appropriate testing or quarantine. If your pet comes into contact with a wild mammal and is unvaccinated (and the wild animal is not available for rabies testing to rule out rabies) your pet is subject to euthanasia or a strict fourmonth quarantine at a secure facility such as an animal boarding facility or veterinarian clinic.

West Nile Virus and Western Equine Encephalitis (WEE)

These diseases are carried by mosquitoes and can be passed on to humans through a mosquito bite. Both diseases can also cause encephalitis or inflammation of the brain and lining of the brain and spinal cord. Encephalitis can be life threatening for anyone and is particularly serious for those whose ability to fight off infections is compromised.

The best way to prevent mosquitoborne disease is to mosquito-proof your home and backyard. Prevent mosquito bites by wearing appropriate clothing and wear insect repellent. This is especially important during dawn or dusk, when Culex mosquitoes are active.

Culex mosquitoes breed in almost any source of standing water, including old tires, irrigated fields, flowerpots, tree holes or any puddle of water that lasts for more than a few days.

Although most people who are infected with mosquito-borne viruses do not become ill and have no symptoms, others may develop symptoms between three and 14 days after being bitten. Symptoms may include fever, headache and tiredness lasting about two to seven days.

Zika Virus


Zika virus is spread to people primarily through the bite of an infected Aedes species mosquito (Ae. aegypti and Ae. albopictus). The Zika virus can also be spread during sex by a man infected with Zika to his male or female partners. Some non-travelers in the United States have become infected with Zika through sex with a traveler.

Most people infected with Zika virus won't even know they have the disease because they won't have symptoms. The most common symptoms of Zika are fever, rash, joint pain, or conjunctivitis (red eyes). Other common symptoms include muscle pain and headache.

Bubonic Plague

Bubonic Plague is a disease caused by a bacterium named Yersinia pestis. These bacteria can be transmitted to humans by the bites of infected fleas or by direct contact with infected animals. Plague is frequently detected in rock squirrels, prairie dogs, wood rats, and other species of ground squirrels and chipmunks.

The incubation period for plague is usually two to six days. Typical symptoms include sudden onset of fever and chills, severe headache, muscle aches, nausea, vomiting and a general feeling of systemic illness. Lymph node pain and swelling is a suggestive symptom of bubonic plague. Treatment with antibiotics is effective during the early stages of disease.



The best way to prevent plague is to control the presence of rodents and fleas in and around the home. In addition, people should avoid contact with any species of wild rodents, especially sick or dead rodents. Dogs and cats should be confined so they cannot prey on infected rodents and then bring the disease home with them. Pet owners who live close to rodent populations should use flea control products recommended by their veterinarian.

If a dead rabbit, squirrel, prairie dog or other rodent is found, do not directly handle the animal. Use gloves and place in a plastic bag. Large die-offs of dead squirrels, prairie dogs, other rodents and rabbits should be reported to JCPH Environmental Health Services at 303-232-6301.

Hantavirus Pulmonary Syndrome

Hantavirus pulmonary syndrome (HPS) is a serious respiratory disease caused by a virus (hantavirus). Hantavirus is carried by wild rodents, particularly deer mice, and is present in their droppings (feces), urine and saliva. These dried droppings or urine can be stirred up in dust and breathed in by people. People may get hantavirus when they breathe in air contaminated by the virus. The disease is not contagious and does not spread from human to human.

The incubation period varies widely, but ranges from one to six weeks, with an average of two to three weeks. First symptoms of HPS include fever, headache, muscle pain, severe abdominal pain, joint and lower back pain, nausea, and vomiting. A cough and shortness of breath usually develops one to five days after the onset of symptoms. The primary symptom of HPS is difficulty in breathing due to fluid build-up in the lungs.

The best way to prevent the risk of hantavirus infection is to control the presence of rodents in and around the home. This includes sealing up rodent entry holes or gaps; trapping mice and rats; and being careful not to create food sources for the rodents. Hantavirus is often encountered when cleaning vacated sheds, cabins or other enclosed areas, so it is especially important that areas where rodents have been are cleaned cautiously and carefully.

Colorado Tick Fever

Colorado tick fever is caused by a virus that thrives in the environment through a rodent-tick-rodent cycle. The virus can be transmitted to humans by the bite of an infected Rocky Mountain wood tick.

Colorado tick fever is the most common tick-borne disease in Colorado. However, it is believed that most cases go unrecognized. This viral illness is characterized by fever, headache, body aches, nausea, abdominal pain and lethargy. Symptoms usually last four to five days, followed by an apparent recovery,

and then a relapse with symptoms for two to three more days. The disease is not life threatening and infection results in lifelong immunity.

Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever

Rocky Mountain spotted fever is a rare disease caused by a bacterium, rickettsia, and transmitted to humans through the bite of the Rocky Mountain wood tick and American dog tick. Ticks can carry spotted fever organisms and infect humans via a bite at any time during the year.

The initial symptoms, which follow an incubation period of three to 14 days, are flu-like: sudden onset of high fever, headache, chills and muscle aches. A rash often appears a few days later. This rash spreads rapidly over the entire body and may even be seen on the palms of the hands and soles of the feet. Rocky Mountain spotted fever can be fatal if medical attention and treatment is delayed. The illness can be treated with

When going to the mountains, frequent "tick checks" should be performed every two to three hours especially in key areas such as the back, scalp and behind the ears. Once embedded in the skin, a tick can be removed by using a pair of tweezers to grasp the tick and gently but firmly pull backwards, without crushing the tick or leaving the mouthparts in the skin. Avoid crushing tick between fingers as infection can occur if the rickettsia bacteria enter the skin. Washing hands and applying an antiseptic to the bite after removal is advised.

Tularemia

Tularemia is bacterial disease associated with various animal species, especially rodents, rabbits, hares and beavers. Tularemia is found every year in Jefferson County. Humans can be infected with the bacteria, which is treatable with appropriate antibiotics. People can get tularemia from many different sources including through the bite of an infected insect (usually a tick or deerfly), handling infected animal carcasses, consuming contaminated food or water, or by inhalation of the bacteria. Tularemia is not spread from person to person.

Symptoms of Tularemia disease usually appear three to five days after exposure and can include a sudden high fever, headaches, swollen lymph nodes, muscle and joint pain, and a sore or lesion at the site where the bacteria entered the body.

Rangers appreciate trail users who place dog feces in bags, but remember to also place the bags in a trash can and do not leave them on the side of trails or at intersections.

Dog feces that is not picked up, bagged and disposed of has detrimental consequences to public health and the environment. This does not mean you pick the feces up, bag it and leave it alongside the trail. It needs to be carried out and placed into a trash receptacle that the Rangers have provided in high-use areas. Below are facts about dog feces:

- Dog Poop Doesn't Biodegrade Like Wild **Animal Poop**
- Dog Poop Contains Harmful Bacteria, **Parasites**
- Dog Waste Pollutes Groundwater, Water **Bodies**

Role of Weather in Wildfires

Weather plays a major role in the birth, growth and ability to control a wildfire. Drought leads to extremely favorable conditions for wildfires, and winds aid a wildfire's progress -- weather can spur the fire to move faster and engulf more land and homes. Wind can also make the job of fighting the fire even more difficult. There are three weather ingredients that can affect wildfires:

- Air Temperature
- Wind
- Moisture

Air Temperature

Air temperature has a direct influence on fire behavior because of the heat requirements for ignition and continuing the combustion process. This heat warms up the surface of the earth, and the atmosphere close to the surface is in turn warmed by heat reflecting from the surface. For this reason, wildfires tend to rage in the afternoon, when temperatures are at their hottest.

Forest fuels, which include homes in the Wildland-Urban Interface (WUI), receive heat by radiation from the sun, and less heat is required for ignition. The differential heating of the earth's surface is the driving force behind most of the influences on the atmosphere. When sunlight strikes a solid object such as trees, grass or your home, the fuel is warmed. The surface absorbs some of the heat and reflects some in longwave radiation that is absorbed by the water vapor in the air, thus raising its temperature as well.

Fuel temperatures also affect a wildfire's rate of spread. Warm fuels will ignite and burn faster because less heat energy is used to raise the fuels to their ignition temperature. Fuels exposed to sunlight will be warmer than the fuels in shade. They will also be drier. Look to the foothills immediately west of Ken-Caryl to recognize this effect. The fuels on the north-facing exposure are cooler. A hike up Massey Draw on a hot day provides an immediate lesson on the cooling effects of the shaded areas.

Fires also burn more intensely in the afternoon. The temperature is the highest at that time resulting in higher fuel temperatures. Consequently, less heat is needed to raise the fuel to its ignition temperature. At the same time, rising temperatures result in decreasing relative humidity and fuel moisture.

Wind

Wind has a strong effect on fire behavior due to the fanning effect on the fire. Wind can change direction and intensity throughout the day. Abrupt changes generally occur during the afternoon when atmospheric conditions are most unstable, further increasing safety risks associated with wildfire.

Wind is important to homeowners and firefighters alike because of three influences it has on fire behavior:

- Supplying oxygen for the combustion process.
- Reducing fuel moisture by increasing evaporation.
- Exerting pressure to physically move the fire and heat produced closer to fuel in the path of the fire and carrying burning embers, firebrands, ahead of the fire.

Wind increases the supply of oxygen, which results in the fire burning more rapidly. It also removes the surface fuel moisture, which increases the drying of the fuel. Air pressure will push flames, sparks and firebrands into new fuel. By pushing the flames closer to the fuel in front of the fire, the fuel is preheated



quicker because of the increased radiant heat. More of the fuel becomes available for combustion since it is drier and can reach ignition temperature quicker.

Wind may cause the fire to crown into the top of the trees and to jump barriers that would normally stop a fire. Wind can carry sparks and firebrands ahead of the main fire. Wind generally increases evaporation from damp surfaces by carrying away moist air and bringing in drier air. The major fires in Colorado in 2012 – Waldo Canyon and High Park – were driven by extreme winds.

Moisture

Relative humidity (moisture) is the ratio of the amount of moisture in the air (in the form of water vapor) compared to the amount that the air can hold at the same temperature and pressure if it were saturated. A relative humidity of 95 percent (not often seen in Colorado) indicates that the air is nearly saturated with almost all of the water vapor it can hold. The air is much drier when the relative humidity is 30 percent, as compared to 100 percent.

Moisture is exchanged between the air and nearby objects, including dead and live fuels. For example, at low relative humidity the moisture moves out of fuels to the air, and thus, drying occurs. At high relative humidity the dead fuels retain most moisture, i.e., less moisture moves out of the fuel into the air. When a fuel has more moisture, it is harder to ignite and burn. The dry climate of Colorado can dry out fuels on hot, windy days to the level of kiln-dried lumber purchased at a lumber yard.

The relative humidity of the air changes faster than an entire fuel particle can exchange moisture with the air. Fine fuels (such as grasses) can experience significant changes in moisture levels within an hour or two of large changes in relative humidity, whereas coarse fuels (large trees) require longer exposure to change moisture levels.

Ken-Caryl Resident Awarded Chatfield Baseball Scholarship


Each year, Chatfield Baseball awards deserving seniors the opportunity to offset the rising costs of higher education with the Chatfield Diamond Club Scholarship.



Bradford-Perley House Tours

With the arrival of spring, tours are once again being offered at the Bradford-Perley House in the North Ranch. The stone house was constructed between 1860 and 1870. A devastating fire destroyed the interior in 1967, leaving only the exterior stone walls we see today.

The Historical Society was formed with the mission of saving the ruins. Stabilization and preservation work began in 1997. The house was declared saved in 2006 and listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2015. More information on the history of the house is available on the Ken-Caryl website under the Community & News tab.

We have already had a few hardy groups visiting the Bradford-Perley House. On April 28, the 2nd-grade class of Bradford Primary School, along with their teachers and parents, braved cold and sleet to learn a bit about the Indians and pioneers who called the Ken-Caryl Valley home. Dear Editor:

I have lived in the Valley for 23 years. When I moved here, it was proud of its award as "Tree City USA". The green space was what attracted me.

We are now witnessing the negative effects of three years of "turf reduction program" initiated by the Metropolitan District. A very large proportion of dead trees along Valley Parkway, untidy and unmanaged roadsides at the Valley Parkway/Ken-Caryl Ave. intersection, Valley Parkway/North Ranch, and along Valley Parkway between North Ranch and Manor House.

I am 100 percent AGAINST any reduction in water usage on our green space, and I am 100 percent AGAINST any turf reduction. If I had wanted to live in a desert scape, I would have moved to Phoenix. If I had wanted a treeless environment here, I would have moved to Highlands Ranch.

When debating how to spend money in a budget, there is never enough to do what everyone wants, thus priorities need to be set. While the cost of water has gone up, its use should not diminish. Landscaping, especially along Valley Parkway, and at the entrances to the development, should be irrigated even more than other areas, yet they are being left to deteriorate. And the number of dead trees, as a result of no water, is something which needs to be rectified.

In terms of money savings, the Metropolitan District could probably save as much money by eliminating the positions of individuals being employed to take out the turf, than the savings in water

I urge all residents to consider what made K-C great in the first place, predominantly the rural feel created by the trees and greenery along the roads. Allowing it to deteriorate will reduce our already low property values, vis a vis the rest of Denver. If you want to see the watering restored to what it was before 2012, please write to the Board members, as it is they, not Darrell or Chris, who determine policy here in Ken-Caryl.




