Waste Connections is the trash and recycling service provider for Ken-Caryl Ranch. Service is included as part of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association monthly dues. Waste Connections can be reached at 303-288-2100 or www.wcdenver.com.

Trash and Recycling Totes: Residents have the option of using their own trash and recycling containers/bags or using 96-gallon totes provided at no charge by Waste Connections. The totes have wheels and are 42 inches tall, the top measures 30x34 inches, and the bottom is 24x24 inches. To order totes, send an email to kencarylco@wasteconnections.com, say that you want to sign up for totes, and provide your name, address, email address, and phone number. You can request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.

Holiday Trash Delays: Waste Connections observes the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, unless they fall on a weekend. If your normal pickup day falls on or after a holiday, your collection schedule will run one day late that week.

Auto-Dial Service: Waste Connections offers an auto-dial service called Call Fire to notify customers of any changes in trash pickup days. You can sign up to receive a phone call online at www.wcdenver.com/contact/. Complete the required information, then in the comment section say you are a Ken-Caryl resident seeking to sign up for the Call Fire service.

Updates on Lighting and Yard Maintenance

Two of my stories in recent issues, Protecting the Night Sky and Out in the Yard, prompted some responses and some excellent feedback and education. As a result, the Architectural Committee has been reviewing lighting cases, and follow-up letters have gone out to homeowners for lawn maintenance. What was great about the feedback I received was that it was very positive and collaborative. One homeowner asked for advice on approaching his neighbors directly, then he did a little research on his own and shared

those findings with me. I have received a response from almost every lawn maintenance letter we sent in the last two weeks. The resounding message from all of them is that they know, it bothers them more than it bothers anyone else, and they already have a plan in action! So here are some updates based on this feedback.

Exterior illumination has been a much-discussed topic with the Architectural Committee lately. As a result, more research is being done to further clarify our lighting policy and bring it more in line with the commitments we've made as a community and in keeping up with trends and alternative lighting options.

Even compliant lighting can be a nuisance. Take a look at where some of your outside lighting sources are directed and how bright they are. Is there an opportunity to re-direct the fixture or use a bulb with a softer light or lower output, or maybe extinguishing outdoor lighting at a reasonable time in the evening? Your lighting may fall within the guidelines, but there may be other factors involved where a simple adjustment could solve a big problem for your neighbor.

Yards are coming around, and more and more of you are out there doing the work. In the last two weeks I have received complaints about other yards and have even had homeowners "turning themselves in" for lawns that are less than perfect. I feel I owe it to these and other homeowners to acknowledge the work being done that we don't see in a curbside inspection. I've learned recently that many yards have suffered mites and mold. It's not always apparent to me when doing an inspection that there is behind-the-scenes work going on. I extend public gratitude to those homeowners who kindly reached out to let me know what's going on and assure me that there is work in progress. Your efforts are very much appreciated!

Finally, in my effort to address lawns, I neglected to re-iterate the importance of trimming shrubs and trees from public walkways. We continue to receive complaints about the walkways being overgrown with shrubs, or trees hanging over sidewalks where you have to duck down or walk in the street to pass. Please be sure to check those areas of your property regularly for maintenance.

The following is a summary of items from the June 20 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- A resident brought up a complaint raised by her neighbor regarding lights in her backyard. The Board informed the resident that the Architectural Committee will discuss the matter at its next meeting.
• A resident commented on how much he likes the new Cougar Trail.
• The Master Association's new Finance Manager, Elizabeth Modisette, attended the meeting and was introduced to the Board.
• The Board reviewed the design of new fire danger signs that will be attached to the new marquee sign at the entrance to the Valley. Staff will move forward with the new marquee and fire danger signs.
• The Board reviewed the Equestrian Center Status Report and discussed policies at the Center.
• A motion was tabled concerning outdoor speakers and will be discussed at the next meeting.

Fireworks Information

Fire Information Hotline

Citizens wishing to obtain current fire restriction or fire ban information, firework regulations, burn permit information or to report a firework violation can dial the Jeffco Sheriff's Fire Information Hotline at 303-271-8200.

It is Unlawful

- For anyone to possess or discharge any fireworks, other than permissible fireworks, anywhere in the state.
- For anyone to sell fireworks unless that person is licensed as a retailer, wholesaler or exporter.
- For anyone to knowingly provide or sell any fireworks to anyone under 16.
- For anyone under 16 to purchase any fireworks, including permissible fireworks.
- For anyone under 16 to possess and discharge permissible fireworks, unless that person is under adult supervision.

What are Permissible Fireworks?

Cylindrical or cone fountains, wheels and ground spinners, illuminating torches and colored fire, dipped sticks and sparklers, toy propellant or toy smoke devices, trick noise makers and snake or glow worms are all permissible when a fire restriction or ban is not in effect.

What are Illegal Fireworks?

Any devices or components that, when used or ignited, project or disburse any metal, glass or brittle plastic fragments. Cherry bombs, roman candles, firecrackers, bottle rockets, shells and rockets, M-80s and M-100s, and helicopters are all examples of illegal fireworks.

A good rule of thumb: anything that explodes or leaves the ground is most likely illegal in Colorado.

What's the Penalty?

Any person who violates the laws pertaining to the sale, possession and use of fireworks commits a class 3 misdemeanor and faces up to \$750 in fines, six months in prison or both.

Check for Fire Bans or Fire Restrictions

Before you light a fuse, check to make sure your area isn't under a fire ban or fire restriction. A fire ban can be enacted by your county sheriff and/or the U.S. Forest Service when there is high risk of wildfire. Even permissible fireworks are prohibited when Jefferson County is under a fire restriction or ban. Violating the ban can result in a fine.

If you are in Jeffco's vulnerable foothills or mountain communities, please consider the lives and property of your neighbors. In 2005, teens playing with fireworks on North Table Mountain ignited a 200-acre wildfire that threatened homes and horse barns, and required the services of over 100 firefighters. One errant bottle rocket or firecracker is all it takes.

Tips for Safe Fireworks Use

- Always read and follow label instructions
- Have an adult present when children are involved
- Use outdoors only
- Always have water and a fire extinguisher handy
- Never experiment with or make your own fireworks
- Never give fireworks to small children
- Never throw or point fireworks at other people
- Always wear eye protection

Protect Your Pets

According to Jeffco's Animal Control officers, more dogs get lost around July 4 than any other time of the year. Keep your pets properly confined to avoid escape due to fear of fireworks. Have your dog's license and identification up to date so that in the event your pet does escape, Animal Control can facilitate a quick return.

Better Yet ...

Leave the fireworks to the professionals – attend a public fireworks display. Check the local papers for information about public celebrations in your area.

Flag Etiquette Dos and Don'ts

With Fourth of July just around the corner, here are a few quick Dos and Don'ts from www.military.com regarding flag etiquette for the Stars and Stripes.

When displaying the flag, DO the following:

- When a patriotic effect is desired, the flag may be displayed 24 hours a day if properly illuminated during the hours of darkness.
- When placed on a single staff or lanyard, place the U.S. Flag above all other flags.
- When placed on a podium, the flag should be placed on the speaker's right on the staging area. Other flags should be placed to the left.
- When displayed either horizontally or vertically against a wall (or other flat surface), the union (blue field of stars) should be uppermost and to the flag's

own right, that is, to the observer's left.

- When displayed in a window it should be displayed with the union or blue field to the left of the observer in the street.
 - When the flag is displayed on a car, the staff shall be fixed firmly to the chassis or clamped to the right fender.
- Flag Etiquette Don'ts:**
- Don't dip the U.S. Flag for any person, flag or vessel.
 - Don't let the flag touch the ground.
 - Don't fly flag upside down unless there is an emergency.
 - Don't carry the flag flat or carry things in it.
 - Don't use the flag as clothing.
 - Don't store the flag where it can get dirty.
 - Don't use it as a cover.
 - Don't fasten it or tie it back. Always allow it to fall free.
 - Don't draw on or otherwise mark the flag.
 - Don't use the flag for decoration. Use bunting with the blue on top, then white, then red.



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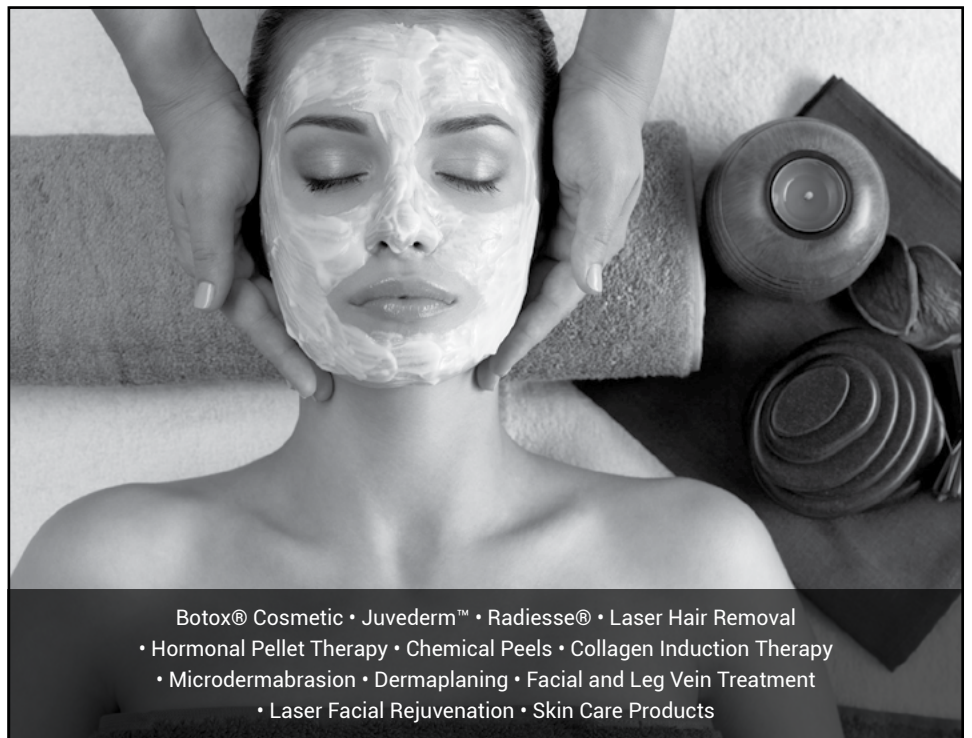
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Newborn Wildlife Usually Better Off Left Alone

Editor's Note: The following article has been re-printed from Colorado Parks and Wildlife. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Ranger staff receives several calls this time of year about "abandoned" baby deer and birds. The information in the article is applicable to our situation on Ken-Caryl Ranch. Most of the time when you find a fawn or fledgling on the ground, it is not orphaned, and the watchful eyes of the parents are nearby. If, however, baby wildlife have been unattended for a long period of time (12-24 hours), please contact the Rangers at 303-979-1876, ext. 170.

With spring and early summer comes a rebirth of Colorado's wildlife. From robins and jays to elk and deer, newborn wildlife can be found throughout the state at this time of the year. Colorado Parks and Wildlife asks Colorado residents and visitors to please refrain from touching or approaching

the newborns so that they have a chance to thrive in their natural habitat.

"In almost every instance when somebody finds a baby chick, fawn or calf, the best course of action is to leave the newborn animal alone," said Rick Spowart, District Wildlife Manager in the Estes Park

area. "Most newborn wildlife are typically left alone for long periods of time by their mothers on purpose."

By design, deer fawns and elk calves are born with natural camouflage and a lack of scent. In the first few days of their lives, the newborns are not mobile enough to travel with their mothers. As a defensive tactic to keep nearby predators away from the newborns' location, the mothers will often leave the young animals alone for long periods of time. During this crucial period, the mothers will visit the newborns at least twice a day to feed them. After a few days, the fawns and calves are usually strong enough to join their mothers and the herd, where there's more protection.

Spowart asks people who find a newborn deer, elk or antelope to leave the animal alone for at least 12 hours before calling – unless they are absolutely sure the parent animal is dead (hit by a car, for example).

Oftentimes, people will find young birds that appear to have fallen from their nests. Sometimes the birds have actually fallen and other times they're in the process of learning to fly. If the birds can safely be put back in the nest or on a high branch, it's okay to do so.

One of the best things residents and visitors can do to protect Colorado's newborn wildlife is to keep their pets under control. Countless numbers of baby rabbits, squirrels, birds and other wildlife fall prey to domestic dogs and cats every year. Owners of dogs that chase or injure big game animals – including newborns – can be held liable by law for their dog's actions.

"By nature, dogs and cats are predators. You can't really blame them for what they do naturally," said Steve Yamashita, Northeast Region Manager for Colorado Parks and Wildlife. "But you can blame their

owners. It's up to pet owners to contain their animals if they care about local wildlife."

According to Yamashita, dogs that chase wildlife without actually catching an animal still do harm, either causing the animal to expend critical energy or running it away from its newborn. However, dogs aren't the only dangerous pets.

"This time of the year, we have all of our young birds hatching out, and they're easy prey for cats," he said. "In my neighborhood alone, I've witnessed the cat population decimate a covey of quail."

Keeping your pets restrained or indoors as much as possible will protect newborn wildlife, as will respecting the many seasonal wildlife closures that are in place during this time of the year on various municipal, county, state and federal properties to protect young animals.

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Some Additional Notes on the Plains Metropolitan District Lawsuit

Did you know that the Plains Metropolitan District lawsuit and settlement is precedent-setting case law in the state of Colorado?

There has been feedback and concern that Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District spent \$1.1 million in legal fees and 13 years of time to get to the settlement. The settlement, for \$3.5 million, only allows KCRMD to spend those proceeds on tennis courts, a pool and ballfields. To some this may not seem like a big win. Throughout the years, however, the various KCRMD Boards have felt that it was important to follow through so that the Ken-Caryl Ranch community received the recreation amenities it was promised in the original Plains Metropolitan District service plan.

Ah, the service plan. A term that has been talked about through the years but not always understood. Prior to this lawsuit, a service plan was just a thought on what a developer would likely provide for a planned community. Today, because of this lawsuit and the judgement in favor of KCRMD, a service plan is a legal document that requires the developer or subsequent special district to provide the community what it has promised. In this case, that means that when Plains Metropolitan District formed and stated in their service plan that they would provide the Ken-Caryl Ranch community with tennis courts, a pool and ballfields, some level of those or compensation for them must be realized by the community.

Throughout the years of settlement negotiations, there were varying opinions

on land available for building these amenities and whether the community needed more or just needed upgrades to what we have. As a result, both parties agreed to the cash settlement of \$3.5 million. The KCRMD Board has identified the remodel of tennis courts 1 & 2 at the Community Center as satisfying the tennis court part of the settlement. Next will be the Ranch House Pool, and then, if funding is available, the Board may consider something to satisfy the ballfields portion of the plan in the future.

Thank you to the KCRMD Board for their countless volunteer hours related to the lawsuit. Current Board members are Lauri Lehan-Milano, Bob Generoli, David Banning, Jami Jensen and Jeff Esbenshade. Also thank you to the previous KCRMD Board members and to residents Pat Lynch, Jan Rousselot and Ruth Sundberg who devoted time to the lawsuit. If their labor was not a donation, the value of the settlement would be greatly reduced.

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Slow Down While Driving!

Residents often comment about cars speeding throughout the neighborhood. Now that school is out for summer, there are more children playing in the community. Please SLOW DOWN, particularly when driving through the residential areas.

Here are some speeding and safety statistics provided by Jefferson County's Transportation & Engineering Department:

1. The speed at which a vehicle is traveling directly impacts the likelihood of death for pedestrians or bicyclists who are struck. Someone struck by a vehicle going 25 mph is half as likely to die as someone struck at 30 mph. If crashes do occur, the severity of injuries goes down with lower speeds.
2. Driving the speed limit gives the driver more time to react to pedestrians entering the roadway unexpectedly. It also reduces the chance of fatal and serious injuries to the pedestrian if the motorist is unable to avoid the collision.
3. Save gas! According to a report on Edmunds.com, the best ways to save gas (besides driving less or driving a fuel-efficient vehicle) are to avoid excessive idling, drive with more gradual accelerating and decelerating, and drive slower.

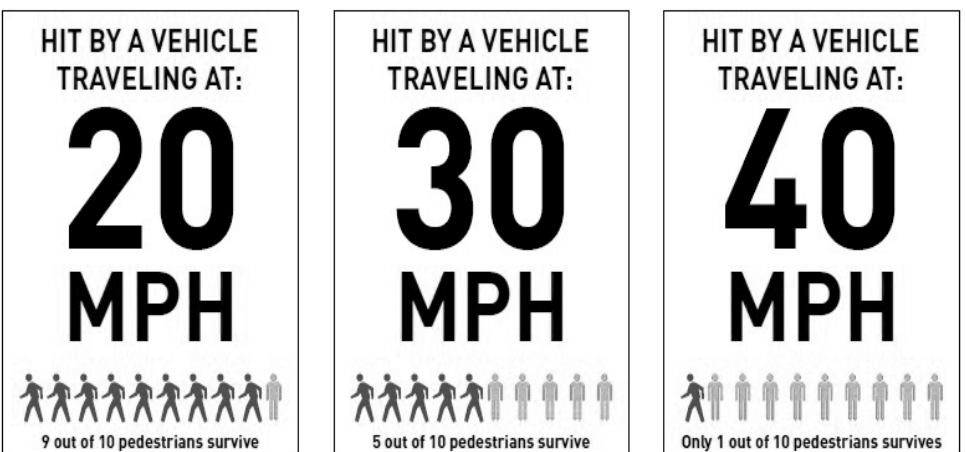

Speed is especially lethal for vulnerable users like pedestrians and people biking. The risk of injury and death increases as speed increases.

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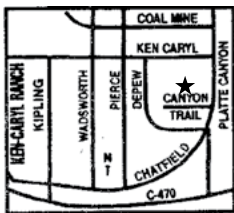
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Cougar Trail Now Open

- Lock your car doors. Even if you are leaving it unattended for a few minutes, it is necessary to protect your valuables at all times.
- Double check that you have locked your vehicles before going to bed, especially

if you are unsure.

- Never leave a spare key hidden in a vehicle.
- Always remove your garage door opener from your vehicle at the end of the day.
- Lock your entry door between your house and the garage.

We also think it's important to say that if you see what you believe to be a vehicle break-in in progress, please do NOT confront the person, but call us immediately at 911 so we can catch them in the act. We want you to be safe and to be a good witness by getting a clothing description of the suspect, their exact location, their direction of travel if they leave the area and if they left on foot or by vehicle.

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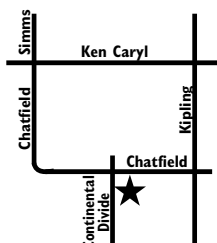

Rules for Outdoor Water Use

REGLAS DE RIEGO EN EXTERIORES



Water connects us all. Denver Water's summer watering rules ensure we have enough water now and in the future. Water belongs to everyone, and we are all responsible for using it wisely.

Summer watering rules are enforced May 1 to Oct. 1.

- ⊕ Water during cooler times of the day — lawn watering is NOT allowed between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m.
- ⊕ Water no more than three days per week.
- ⊕ Do not allow water to pool in gutters, streets and alleys.
- ⊕ Do not waste water by letting it spray on concrete and asphalt.
- ⊕ Repair leaking sprinkler systems within 10 days.
- ⊕ Do not irrigate while it is raining or during high winds.
- ⊕ Use a hose nozzle with a shut-off valve when washing your car.

Rules for watering new seed and sod

Denver Water customers with newly planted seed or sod may water new turf as necessary, for up to 21 days. After 21 days, routine watering is limited to no more than three days per week and not between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. To submit your request for a 21-day watering exemption, call 303-893-2444 or email customer-care@denverwater.org.

Report water waste

If you see water waste that does not meet these rules, call Denver Water at 303-893-2444, or report it online at denverwater.org. These rules are mandatory. Repeat offenders may be fined.

Use this chart as a starting point to determine the number of minutes to water each zone on the days you water. These times are averages. Adjust your watering minutes based on rainfall, type of grass or plants, sunny or shady locations and other characteristics.

Watering two days a week should be sufficient during most of the summer. If needed, water a third day during extreme heat or dry periods. Water trees and shrubs as needed, but not between 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Shrubs and perennials need half as much water as lawns.

There are no assigned watering days, but never water a zone more than three days a week.

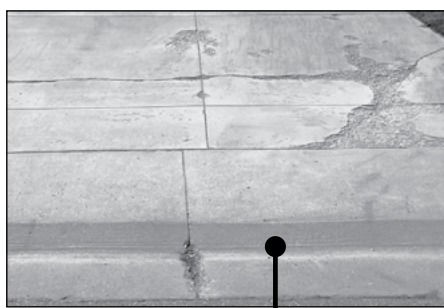

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Firewise and the Ken-Caryl Community

The Wildland Urban Interface (WUI) is where developed areas such as Ken-Caryl Ranch intermingle with undeveloped areas. The WUI includes our open space, lawns, trees, shrubbery and homes. The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee has worked for the past two years to increase community awareness of wildfire risks and improve resident preparation for a wildfire which could move rapidly through the Plains and Valley.

Overview

Over the past century, America's population has nearly tripled, with much of the growth flowing into traditionally natural areas. This trend has created an extremely complex landscape that has come to be known as the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI). Unfortunately, once a wildfire ignites, firefighters are limited in what they can do to protect the homes in its path, as the winds may drive the fire through neighborhoods. The National Firewise Communities Program is a national agenda that encourages partnerships among communities, homeowners, private industry, and public agencies to develop and implement local solutions for wildfire preparedness – before a fire starts. It is the vision of Firewise Communities that, with adequate planning and cooperation among varying interests, wildfires can occur without disastrous loss of life, property and resources.

Firewise Approach

The best approach to wildfire preparedness involves utilizing the wide range of Firewise practices. The Ken-Caryl Firewise Program offers a series of practical educational steps (landscaping, mitigation, community planning, evacuation preparation and communication) that families can take to reduce their vulnerability to wildfire. Using at least one element recommended by the National Firewise Communities Program and adding other elements over time will begin to protect against the risk of fire in the wildland/urban interface.

Firewise Landscaping from Firewise.org

1. Home Ignition Zone - Keep leaves and needles off your roof and deck. Create a fuel-free area within 3-5 feet of your home's perimeter. From 5 feet

to a minimum of 30 feet out, thin and space vegetation, remove dead leaves and needles, prune shrubs and tree limbs. Keep areas around decks, sheds, fences, and swing sets clear of debris and vegetation.

2. Landscaping and Firewise Plants - To prevent fire spread, trim back branches that overhang structures and prune branches of large trees up to 6 to 10 feet from the ground. Remove plants containing resins, oils and waxes; make sure organic mulch is at least 5 feet from structures. Choose Firewise plants – find lists at www.firewise.org.

Be Prepared

3. Disaster Plan - Develop, discuss and practice an emergency action plan with everyone in your home. Include details for pets, large animals and livestock. Program cell phones with emergency numbers. Identify two ways out of your neighborhood and have a predesignated meeting place. Have tools such as a shovel, rake, axe, handsaw or chainsaw available, and maintain an emergency water source. Always leave if you feel unsafe – don't wait to be notified.

4. Emergency Responder Access - Identify your home and neighborhood with legible, clearly marked street names and numbers. Make your driveway at least 12 feet wide with a vertical clearance of 15 feet and a slope of less than 5 percent to provide access to emergency vehicles.

5. Fire-Resistant Roof Construction - Use fire-rated shingles such as asphalt, metal, slate, clay tile or concrete products. A fire-resistant sub-roof adds protection. Box in eaves, but provide adequate ventilation to prevent condensation and mildew. Roof and attic vents should be screened to prevent ember entry.

6. Fire-Resistant Attachments - Any attachments to your home such as decks, porches and fences must be fire-resistant. If not, your entire home is vulnerable to ignition.

7. Fire-Resistant Walls and Windows - Embers can collect in small nooks and crannies and ignite combustible materials; radiant heat from flames can crack windows. Use fire-resistant siding such as brick, fiber-cement, plaster or stucco, and tempered or double-paned glass windows to protect your home.

Neighbors Helping Neighbors

Caryl's Firewise Communities program can provide you with information on how to adapt to living with wildfire and encourages neighbors to work together and take action now to prevent losses. We all have a role to play in protecting ourselves and each other from the risk of wildfire.



CodeRED

CodeRED Emergency Notifications



In Jefferson County, the CodeRED system (sometimes called "Reverse 911") allows the county to call citizens to warn them of danger. With it, the county can simultaneously call multiple phones within a designated area to warn residents of flood, fire, tornadoes, chemical spills or dangerous suspects. Within moments, calls reach the affected community to deliver warnings and critical safety instructions.

If you receive a CodeRED call, the voice on the line will let you know it's a message from the Sheriff's Office. Also, your caller ID should display our agency's name and a call-back number. The CodeRED system works with all phones that have a TDD line (for the hearing impaired). If you have a telephone zapper used to block out telemarketers, or if your phone is blocked to unknown callers, you will not receive CodeRED calls.

The CodeRED system calls numbers from two databases. One is the county's 911 database, with all listed and unlisted landlines. If you have a landline, it is

automatically included in this database.

The second is a database of mobile phone and VoIP numbers whose owners have opted in to receive the calls. If you don't have a traditional landline phone, or would like to receive a cell phone call in addition to the call on your landline phone, please register for this free service at <http://jeffco.us/sheriff/emergencies/code-red/>.
