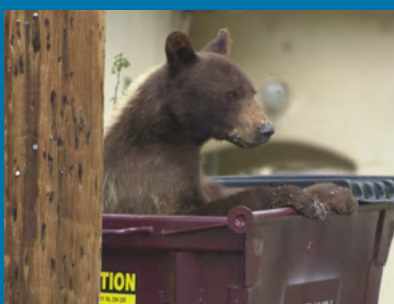

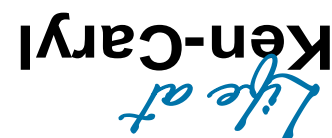

## Let Sleeping Fawns Lie as Summer Arrives

The Rangers often receive calls about “abandoned” deer fawns, but fawns are often left alone, sometimes for several hours, by their mother and are not actually abandoned. Fawns that are truly abandoned will show signs of distress such as crying. Do not approach, touch or handle young animals.

By design, deer fawns and elk calves are born with natural camouflage and a lack of scent. In the first few days of their lives, the newborns are not mobile enough to travel with their mothers. As a defensive tactic to keep nearby predators away from the newborns’ location, the mothers will often leave the young animals alone for long periods of time. During this crucial period, the mothers will visit the newborns at least twice a day to feed them. After a few days, the fawns and calves are usually strong enough to join their mothers and the herd, where there’s more protection.

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## Benefits of the Colorado Lottery for Ken-Caryl Ranch

Did you know the Colorado Lottery benefits park and recreation agencies across the state, including the KCRMD? Lottery proceeds are divided up into three main funding sources for these agencies: The Conservation Trust Fund (CTF), Great Outdoors Colorado (GOCO), and Colorado Parks & Wildlife (CPW).

The CTF disperses funding to local governments and special districts quarterly to be used on capital improvements for park and recreation amenities. KCRMD receives approximately \$50,000 each year. We often use this funding as a match for grant applications for larger projects. For example, we used CTF funds as a grant match for the Community Park playground and received additional grant funds from Jefferson County Open Space. Over the last few years, we have leveraged CTF funds to complete the following projects around KCR:

- New irrigation controllers to help with water conservation
  - Community Park playground renovation
  - Park Pavilion and new picnic tables at Community Center
  - New playground at Community Center
  - Splash pad and new features at Community Center
  - New playground and park renovation at Dakota Lodge
  - Wildlife displays in Dakota Lodge lobby
  - Improvements to the Cathy Johnson Trail – scheduled for this summer
- Many of these larger projects would not have been possible without this funding.



Additionally, as I mentioned above, the rest of the lottery proceeds benefit GOCO and CPW. GOCO has a variety of grant opportunities for local park and recreation agencies. Did you know our very own Community Garden was funded by a GOCO grant we received, and CTF dollars were used as our match? GOCO also funds partner projects for school playgrounds and environmental education programs around the state.

CPW receives the smallest portion of the lottery proceeds, but it is still critical funding to keep our state parks open. We are fortunate to live in a state that values outdoor recreation in this capacity. The Colorado Lottery and, especially, the CTF are wonderful resources to KCR and help us provide great outdoor recreation experiences to the community.

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## Metropolitan District Board

On June 27, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors and discussed the following items and took the following actions:

- Gina Writz, a volunteer prairie dog relocater, presented a proposal for the Board's consideration to take additional dogs outside of Ken-Caryl Ranch onto the relocation site at the South Hogback. The Board also heard public comment on the proposal later in the meeting. A motion on the proposal will be set on the July Regular Business Meeting agenda.
- The Board discussed setting allocation limits for the three recreation amenities identified in the Plains Metropolitan District Settlement in order to ensure funding is available for each.
- The Board discussed the Ranch House Pool renovation and received an update from staff on preliminary stakeholder feedback. Additional discussion will take place with the Master Association Board at the next Joint Study Session.
- Staff provided an update that the draft audit will be presented by the auditor at the August meeting. The Board subsequently passed a motion to request an extension from the State Auditor to file the Metropolitan District audit.
- The Board and staff discussed setting goals for various committees to ensure efficient and effective use of the committees.
- Director Esbenshade requested that the Metropolitan District's mission statement be reviewed. District Manager Daruna agreed and will work with Director Esbenshade and staff to draft options for the Board's review at future meetings.

If you have been outside recreating on the trails, you may have come across one of our Volunteer Patrollers. These individuals are residents and may even be your next-door neighbor! Each are wearing a vest with the Ken-Caryl Ranch logo and "Volunteer Patrol" printed on the front. An ID will also be displayed to indicate they are working on behalf of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers. Mountain bike volunteers will also have a placard visible on their handlebars.

This program is in its sixth year and recently the annual training was attended by six new volunteers bringing the total number of patrollers to 24. In 2016 the volunteers performed 67 patrols, covering 115 trails and 109.5 hours! We appreciate each of them in donating their time to educate trail users about Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and the rules.

Remember to please be courteous to these volunteers as they will be stopping each trail user to check membership unless a user is displaying an approved bracelet.

A great alternative to avoid this issue is to obtain your own ID bracelet. Visit the Recreation Department at the Ranch House at 7676 South Continental Divide Road, Community Center at 1 Club Drive or the Dakota Lodge at 14422 W. Ken Caryl Ave. You will need to complete a simple registration form and provide one of the items below for proof of membership:

- Colorado Driver's License: Valid with current KCR address
- Colorado ID: Valid with current KCR address
- Property Tax Statement: Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address
- Warranty Deed: Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address
- Lease/Rental Agreement: Valid with the applicant's name for the current KCR address.

There is no cost, and bracelets are issued two per household and can be temporarily used by house guests when not accompanied by the member in the open space. All GREEN bracelets expire on Dec. 31, 2018, at which point a newly designed colored bracelet will be available. Most importantly, it is not mandatory to have an ID bracelet when using Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space, but if you have one easily displayed on your wrist, bike handlebars, or your dog leash you can enjoy your activity without answering questions about membership from the Volunteer Patrollers or Park Rangers. Any trail user viewed with an expired tag will be stopped and membership checked by the Rangers. If you have any questions, please call the Rangers at 303-979-1876, ext. 170.

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## Bears Active On Ken-Caryl Ranch

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers have recently received several reports of a bear feeding on garbage found in cans, birdfeeders and inside a garage as the door was left open by the owners. As a friendly reminder, remember to remove all ATTRACTANTS:

- Remove birdfeeders until winter when bears are not active.
- Place secured garbage cans outside for pick-up in the morning only.
- Burn food off barbeque grills and clean after each use.
- Clean garbage cans with ammonia to discourage bears and other wildlife.
- Don't leave food, trash, coolers, air fresheners or anything that smells in your vehicle.
- Lock bear-accessible doors and windows in the house, garage and car at night.
- Remove any ripened fruit that has fallen to the ground on your property.

Bears that get too comfortable around people can destroy property or even become a threat to human safety. Habituated bears must often be destroyed. Please don't let bears die needlessly. Do your part to bear-proof your home and property, and help keep bears alive and wild.

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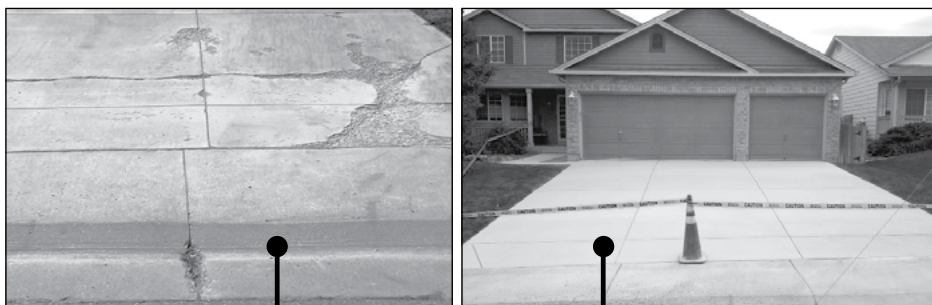
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## Local Veterinarian Sings His Way Into Millions of Hearts

Born and raised on Ken-Caryl Ranch, singer, songwriter and veterinarian Ross Henderson quickly gained international attention when a video of him singing and playing his guitar to calm an anxious dog at his family's Fox Hollow Animal Hospital went viral. The video became an international hit and captured the hearts and minds of more than six million people in less than a week.

Dr. Ross is a practicing veterinarian at his family's animal hospital and has always had a love for animals and a strong passion for music. He began by playing piano at a very young age and picked up the guitar soon after. He sings, writes and produces all his own music.

He has had the privilege of getting exposed to various music cultures by playing private shows in Colorado as well as internationally when he spent four years living in Edinburgh, Scotland, best known for their international arts festival.

Dr. Ross is a consummate performer, loves to engage the crowd and has a fun sense a humor that often comes out in his music, videos, in person and on stage. His song "Slip Away" is a light-hearted homage to the influence that animals have had in his life and how they continue to give to us more than we could ever give back to them.

Dr. Ross and his brother, Ryan Henderson, and father, Tony Henderson, have also signed a contract for a pilot TV reality show. This would feature special cases that the veterinarians on staff deal with each day from knee surgeries to emergency abdominal surgery, maybe a little "singing" to the animals, too.

Dr. Tony, the owner of Fox Hollow Animal Hospital, has been serving the west Denver area for over 35 years. The staff is comprised of five veterinarians: Tony; his two sons, Ryan and Ross; Brian Boyle (also a Ken-Caryl resident); and the latest addition to the team, Timothy Bills. Darcy Holloway, the office manager, has been working at Fox Hollow for over 12 years. She is just as passionate about animals and has been a longtime foster care provider to orphaned pets. When you come to Fox Hollow you can feel the family bond that takes place. It truly is a "Family Affair!"



Dr. Ross Henderson calms an anxious dog with music.

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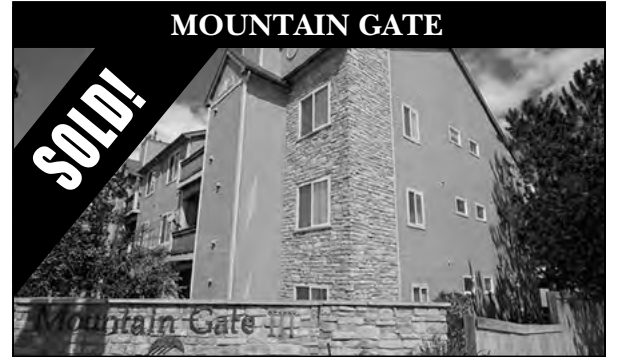


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## WOW Carwash

WOW Carwash recently opened in the King Soopers parking lot. While the car wash opened in mid-June, there will be a Grand Opening Celebration event on July 20. WOW Carwash is an express exterior wash that is fully automated. Customers can purchase washes individually or take advantage of Wash Book discounts or unlimited wash memberships starting at just \$14.95 per month. WOW also offers free vacuums and a free mat cleaner that are available 24 hours a day.

"The idea for Wow Carwash originally came from my dad," said Julie. "He loves cars and likes to keep his own vehicles meticulously clean. With all of the salt and dust that accumulates on our roads and the intense Colorado sun, he saw a need for a high-quality carwash that could keep cars looking nicer for longer."

WOW Carwash is also very focused on the environment and recycles most of the water used in the carwash.

"As we learned more about car washing, I was surprised to learn of the negative environmental impact of washing a car at home," said Julie. "Because WOW recycles most of our water and traps the oils and harmful contaminants that come off of the cars we wash, we provide a safer solution for our earth than washing at home.

Washing at home can consume 80 to 140 gallons of water, while our recycling system allows us to use fewer than 30 gallons to wash a car at WOW—a little less than the water used to take a 15-minute shower. To take our environmental focus further, we

offer recycling cans on our site and recently began conversations with the locally-based Institute for Environmental Solutions to learn other ways we can positively impact our community's water health."

The owners of WOW are very interested in knowing what their customers like and don't like about the carwash. They encourage customers to share suggestions, concerns and positive feedback.

"Regular communication with our customers makes us a better carwash," said Julie. "The carwash also invested in state-of-the-art automation and equipment to produce a cleaner, drier car. The belt conveyor that carries cars through the wash is simpler to load and safer for cars than the older chain conveyor systems found in most other washes."

Julie said the vast majority of customers so far have been Ken-Caryl residents. "Karl and I love interacting with our neighbors. We've met so many wonderful people who have been encouraging about our business and appreciative of the carwash service we have brought to the bustling shopping plaza."

WOW looks forward to getting to know the neighbors and investing in the community. They will have regular charity washes to support community causes. They have already committed to supporting the Ute Meadows Elementary Read-a-Thon this September and look forward to hearing about other educational or charity organizations they can support.

WOW offers unlimited wash club memberships. Starting at just \$14.95 per month, customers can wash as often as they like all month—the club membership pays for itself in fewer than two washes. Additional family members can join the same wash club level at a discounted monthly price. They also offer Wash Books, which are 5-packs and 10-packs of washes at a discounted price. WOW will also offer specials from time to time via Facebook

and at the carwash. And, of course, all Ken-Caryl residents should take advantage of the free carwashes during the Grand Opening Celebration.

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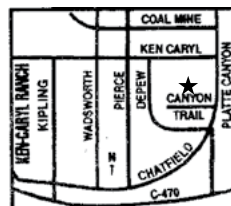
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## Fourth of July Event

The latest article indicates it is not a pet peeve but is something the Architectural Committee (AC) has taken under consideration.

It seems the residents of KC Ranch are being asked to sacrifice safety in order to make a miniscule improvement to night sky viewing. President Trump keeps saying he is responsible for my safety, but I strongly believe I am responsible for the safety of myself and my property. Therefore, one way I try to improve my safety is to have a light fixture on my garage that I leave on all night and a motion detector fixture above my front door. I firmly believe these lights improve the safety of my family and my property, and I am not willing to "extinguish outdoor lighting at a reasonable time in the evening" as suggested in the latest article. As for my lighting creating a "big problem for my neighbor" I've never had a complaint in the 10 years I have lived at my address. If any of my neighbors have a problem with my light I would hope they will contact me and we can work something out.

The primary responsibility of the AC is to ensure the area is well maintained and retains its aesthetic appearance. I believe nighttime lighting does not detract from aesthetics, and I recommend the AC discusses the improved safety provided by night lighting with the Sheriff's Department before coming to any conclusions.

## Dear Editor:

To say that I am greatly upset and angered by actions that occurred at the June 27 Ken-Caryl Metro District Board meeting would be a fundamental understatement. But please allow me to chronicle what led up to writing this letter....

There are numerous artificial prairie dog burrows on the Hogback that were ploughed for relocating the Manor House prairie dog colony, an effort approved by the Board a few years ago. But it turned out that there were fewer prairie dogs than estimated primarily because residents took it upon themselves to shoot and kill upwards of 100 dogs. Infuriating as that was, it meant there were extra burrows that could become homes for other prairie dogs.

At the meeting, Gina Writz submitted a proposal that sought to relocate 50-75 prairie dogs living at Kipling and Coal Mine, but who are in danger of losing their lives to planned development. Gina's proposal included a \$5,000 stipend (but which was poo-pooed by one Board member).

Toward the end of the meeting, visitors expressed their concerns. Many talked, myself included. We reminded the Board that prairie dogs sustain nearly 200 other species (large and small mammals [including the highly endangered black footed ferret], birds, reptiles, and amphibians) by providing food or habitat. There are nine species that are completely dependent on prairie dogs for survival.

I had to leave the meeting early so it wasn't until the following day when I learned the Board had snubbed Gina's proposal. In other words, they just swept it under the rug with the expectation that Gina would just go away. One Board member said it probably won't ever come up for a vote.

I've always trusted the Board to do the right thing. That's why I've never felt the need to attend meetings. But now, the Board has not only spit in our faces, but they've betrayed all of Ken-Caryl's wildlife. Now those prairie dogs will likely suffer long and excruciating poisoning deaths just so development can move forward. Shame on you, Metro District. Shame. On. You. Don't think we'll forget.

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## Stage 1 Fire Restrictions Implemented in Portions of Jefferson County

Effective June 29, the Jefferson County Sheriff implemented temporary Stage 1 Fire Restrictions for portions of Jefferson County. The restrictions apply to the areas west of Highway 93, west of C-470, and south and west of the intersection of CO 121 (Wadsworth) and C-470 to the Platte River. The area includes Ken-Caryl Valley and the North Ranch.

Please note that the Fire Restrictions were in place as of press time. Citizens wishing to obtain current fire restriction or fire ban information, firework regulations, burn permit information or to report a firework violation can dial the Jeffco Sheriff's Fire Information Hotline at 303-271-8200.

These restrictions are being enacted due to current dry conditions favorable for the possibility of a wildfire, and limited availability of fire control resources. Please note the use of all fireworks are prohibited within the restricted area. Conditions will continue to be monitored and restrictions will be adjusted in the coming weeks as necessary.

Pursuant to the Annual Operating Plan regarding the implementation of fire restrictions and fire bans, and due to the continuing high fire danger conditions within Jefferson County, the following activities are prohibited under Stage 1 Fire Restrictions in the restricted portions of the county:

- Building, maintaining, attending, or using any fire or recreational campfire, except a recreational fire within a permanently constructed fire grate in a developed park, campground, private residence, or picnic area.

**NOTE:** Users of private residential recreational campfires exempted as described above are encouraged to contact their local fire agency and advise start and finish times to alleviate smoke check responses.

- Smoking, except within an enclosed vehicle or building, a developed recreation site, or while stopped in an area of at least six feet in diameter that is barren or cleared of all combustible material. (2015 IFC 310.8)
- Open burning, including "bon fires" that require a permit from the fire authority having jurisdiction. (2015 IFC 105.6.30)
- The use of all fireworks are prohibited during fire restrictions.

**NOTE:** Burn permits issued and not executed prior to the effective date of these temporary fire restrictions shall not be authorized unless approved by the issuing agency on the day of execution.

**Exemptions approved under Stage 1 Fire Restrictions:**

- Use of liquid or gas fueled appliances.
- Approved wood-pellet grills.
- Charcoal barbecue grills not closer than 30 feet from an undeveloped area (2015

IFC 308.1.6)

- Portable outdoor fireplaces not closer than 30 feet from an undeveloped area. (2015 IFC 307.4.3)
- Welding and cutting torch appliances, as defined below, may only be operated in an area not closer than 30 feet from an undeveloped area. (2015 IFC 308.1.6)
- Recreational fires not closer than 30 feet from an undeveloped area. (2015 IFC 307.4.2)
- Permitted fires by persons with a permit specifically authorizing a prohibited act such as professional fireworks displays. Contact must be made with the permitting authority to verify the status of permits issued prior to the establishment of burn restrictions.
- Fire department/district training fires.
- Burning of explosive wastes by manufacturers of explosives in areas zoned for industrial use, when the burning is supervised by the fire protection district.
- Open fires or open burning by any federal, state, or local officer in the performance of official fire suppression functions.

Individuals operating under any of the above exemptions shall take adequate measures to prevent uncontrolled fires. Possible measures include, but are not limited to:

- Containers of adequate water or dry soil nearby.
- Shovels, fire extinguishers, or other extinguishing agents nearby.
- Coordination with the local fire department or district to be on scene or standby during an activity.

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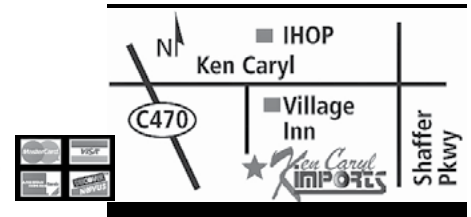
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
