Feedback for the Rules Document

As so many of you know, neighbor volunteer members of the Master Association Architectural Committee and Covenant Committees have donated their time to reviewing and revising the rules document. Last month, the group submitted a draft to the Master Association Board and made a copy of the draft available to the community to review as well. The document changes were so significant a red-line version was not available, so we sincerely

appreciate the time residents have taken or will take to review both the current rules and the draft documents and to share their thoughts.

We know this is a lot of information to process. It took the Rules Work Group several weeks to review and edit and have done our best to provide ample time for residents to have a look at the document as a whole, check out what changes may have happened on rules most important to them, and have an idea what all the rules will look like going forward.

Some of the differences from the original document include: updated and consistent formatting throughout the document, clarifications of some rules such as Parking and Temporary Sign Posting, rules added to reflect trends in projects such as large-scale demolition and construction projects, rules added to address new trends in products and installations like swim spas, composting equipment, and fire pits. The group updated and refined submittal requirements for Home Improvement Rules and policies, and best practices for procedures and enforcement were added. The group improved formatting to make the document easier to read and to allow for keyword searches as well as embedded links online.

We continue to gather feedback from the Master Association Board, community members, as well as legal counsel before a final draft is made. The work group will meet again on Aug. 12 at 2 p.m. at the Ranch House to review the compiled messages and prescribe any necessary edits to the document. Once the updates to the draft are completed, the final draft will be submitted to the Master Association Board at their regular business meeting on Aug. 20.

In accordance with the policy recently adopted by the Master Association Board, anonymous communications will not be accepted by the Board. Please submit your comments in writing to me at jennyb@kcranch.org by Aug. 11 for your feedback to be considered in the final draft.

Permit Parking on Noddle Mountain

In an effort to limit traffic and reduce safety concerns, Jefferson County has posted Noddle Mountain in the Quail Ridge neighborhood as a permit parking only zone during school hours. Parking will be restricted to residents only on days when school is in session from 8-10 a.m. and 2:30-4:30 p.m. Residents on the street were mailed parking permit stickers.



Metropolitan District

On July 23, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- The District Manager Hiring Committee provided updates on the District Manager search process. The Committee plans to conduct in-person interviews with five candidates this week and has scheduled a Special Meeting for Aug. 6 to take action on the Finalist List.
- The Board discussed options for funding part of the Unfunded Pool Elements list distributed by the Pool Planning Committee and Master Association staff at the Joint Study Session on July 16. No action was taken on designating funding.
- The Financial Sustainability Committee reported positive progress on a collaborative solution between the MD and MA for funding MD capital projects that are critical but currently unfunded. The Committee intends to present a draft plan at the Aug. 6 Joint Study Session.
- Staff reviewed a recommendation to change current employee benefit policies in the Employee Handbook to address disparities in benefits between exempt and non-exempt full-time staff and provide benefits to full-time workers that do not work the entire calendar year. The recommendation was not taken into formal action.
- Resident James Fodor distributed a handout recommending changes to the KCR Open Space Comprehensive Management Plan. The recommended changes were not applicable for consideration for the MD Board as the Board had not moved to adopt the recent Plan revisions.
- A motion passed naming officers as follows: President John Huggins, Vice President Kayla Kirkpatrick, Secretary/ Treasurer Jeff Esbenshade, and Lauri Lehan-Milano and Jami Jensen Board members at large.
- A motion passed to approve the Candidate List presented by the District Manager Hiring Committee.

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

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New Trailhead Kiosk **Built at Popular Access** to Foothills and Valley **Open Space Areas**

Construction of a new trailhead kiosk is wrapping up at the intersection of Colorow and Manor House Trails. The wood and stone structure is very similar in design to the trailhead kiosks found in Jefferson County Open Space's South Valley Park.

The new structure replaces an older "billboard" type kiosk that is in place at most of our primary trailheads in the Valley. Staff and the Open Space Committee have been working on a new kiosk design for the past couple of years that would be more effective as an information center about the trail system and other open space resources. In addition, the kiosk roof will help extend the life of signage, create safer work conditions for maintenance, and provide shelter and a resting area for trail users.

The new kiosk is a prototype that could replace existing kiosks throughout open space. Community input on the new kiosk will be important in deciding whether to expand to other locations. The Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee would like to hear from you especially in advance of 2020 budget development, which begins in the next few weeks. 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
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Car Wash Fundraiser for the Homeless





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
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Ranch House Pool Project Underway: Code Change Brings Update to Design

By the time this issue of the paper comes out, the old Ranch House Pool will be closed, and the construction team will be moving in their equipment to get started on the new pool.

The design of the new pool was published in the previous issue of the paper. Since then, a modification to the design had to be made as a result of a code change brought up by the Health Department

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during the permitting process. According to Model Aquatic Health Code Section 4.5.4.6.1, "Transitional Areas: Stairs shall not be used underwater to transition between two sections of pool of different depths."

Because of this requirement, the openwater connector, or throat, between the diving well and the lap swim area of the pool had to be changed because stairs were originally planned. The architect looked at the option of a sloped area to connect the two depths, but the code requires a maximum slope of 1:3. In other words, one foot down for every three feet over. In order to do that, it would have been necessary to extend the throat connecting the two areas to roughly 18 feet long to go down six more feet, which is unrealistic for our pool deck size. The most cost-effective solution is to remove the open-water connector and close it in with concrete, effectively creating a separate area for the diving well. Piping will be added to connect the two pools so that they are still on the same filtration system. Staff and the pool design team feel this is the best solution for the community. Thank you for your understanding!


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Kids Take Top Honors at Mountain Bike National Championships

After months of preparation, kids from the Avout Racing Team pedaled their hearts out at the USAC Mountain Bike National Championships July 24-28 in Winter Park.

The bike team, based in Ken-Caryl, has over 40 young riders ages 8 to 16. At mountain bike practices, they divide into smaller groups to develop skills, cultivate trail etiquette, and ride the trails. Henry Walsh, age 12, has been riding with the team for four years.

"I like that the practices are fun and still train us really hard," said Henry. "They accommodate riders that are just getting into biking, which was me just a few years ago, and challenge bikers that have more experience, too."

While racing at the National Championships is a highlight of the year for many of the young cyclists, the team focuses on building relationships, skills, and confidence year-round. Scott Musgrave, one of the coaches, started biking with his own children and continues to coach his daughter, Kaya, along with many other kids on the team.

"I enjoy watching the kids find themselves through biking. They learn a lot about themselves, their abilities, and what is possible," said Scott. "I love the lessons that it brings: to learn to believe in yourself and to rely on yourself. I love watching the kids as they progress in cycling and become young adults."

Seventeen young Avout racers competed with many of the best cyclists in the nation at the 2019 Mountain Bike National Championships. Three riders earned top honors on the podium: Kira Mullins with 1st place in Cross Country 11-12 women, George Poggemeyer with 2nd place in Enduro 15-18 men, and Kaya Musgrave with 4th place in Cross Country 13-14 women.

The joy of racing is the real reward for Henry: "The thrill of being nervous at the beginning, then you hear the whistle blow and you just go super hard. And if you do your best it's always fun."
