



Metro District **Continues South Hogback Planning**

The Ken-Caryl Metropolitan District Board is continuing the process of collecting information from the community leading to the development of a formal resource management plan for a special area in the Ken-Caryl Ranch known as the "South Hogback Open Space."

While much of the open space in Ken-Caryl Ranch is owned and managed by the Ken-Caryl Master Association as private property, the South Hogback – 895 acres of open space located south and west of the junction of Interstate C-470 and Ken Caryl Avenue – is owned by the Metropolitan District. The Ken-Caryl Foundation deeded the property to the Metro District in 2003 due to the District's public entity status and ability to conserve and manage the property in the long-term.

The South Hogback is one of only three areas in Jefferson County designated as a natural area by the Colorado Natural Areas Program based on unique geological, archaeological and biological features. In 2019, the Board commissioned two studies of the cultural and biological resources present at the South Hogback in order to assist the Board in managing this unique property and ultimately developing a resource management plan.

The Board intended to determine next steps for the South Hogback Open Space at its regular meeting in March. However, the COVID pandemic prevented anything but critical operational discussions to occur, so the South Hogback discussion was delayed until June, when the Metro District Board voted to formally close access to the eastern side of the South Hogback (all areas east of the Cathy Johnson Trail to C-470) to protect sensitive open space resources until an official plan can be developed. Signage for that closure will be in place in September.

The District has been entrusted with stewardship of this special area and takes that responsibility seriously. Over the summer, the board reached out to the Ken-Caryl Master Association Open Space Committee, asking for the committee to provide assistance this fall in answering more questions about the best ways to protect this sensitive area. In the coming months, we'll look for the best ways to gather input from all stakeholders in our community prior to the formulation of a formal plan.

As two of your five Metro District Board members, we encourage you to reach out to staff or any of your board members personally to share your thoughts or concerns. We'll be reaching out to you in the coming months with more opportunities for input.

Covenant Update

Architectural Committee to Review Current **Temporary Signage Policy**

It has been requested by several residents that the Architectural Committee amend and update the Temporary Signage Posting Rules. Signs reflecting current social issues such as "Black Lives Matter" and multi-message signs such as "Love is Love. Water is Life. No Human Is Illegal." have been requested for approval. These signs are not allowed per the Temporary Signage Rule. They are a violation of the current rule not because of the message, but because they are a temporary sign. The current rule states that no sign of any kind shall be displayed to the public view without the approval of the Architectural Committee. The purpose of the rule is to avoid clutter and maintain

uniformity throughout the community public spaces.

Additionally, the Committee will be reviewing the need to update the Rules to include home security signs, no soliciting signs and the parameters surrounding posting said signs. The Committee will be discussing this at the Sept. 10 Architectural Committee Meeting at 7:30 a.m. at the Ranch House. It is not necessary to attend the meeting to submit feedback. MA Board Summary

On Aug. 18, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following items:

- The Board reviewed the draft annual audit and would like to review a redlined version before approving in September.
- Victoria DeSair reported on the proposed safety re-route for the Lyons and Mastodon Trails, the projected completion of the Ranch House pool construction in mid-September, the proposed location for American Furniture Warehouse near Ken-Caryl Ranch, and the temporary signage policy being reviewed by the Architectural Committee. There is no additional information currently available regarding the new land development scheduled to close at the end of September.
- Resident Jim Fodor expressed concerns about bicycle safety on the proposed trail re-routes in the North Hogback.
- Resident Barry Wiebe discussed trail etiquette and the impact of the Avout Racing Juniors Bicycle Team on the Ken-Caryl Ranch trails and Open Space.
- Resident Chris Figge proposed that the Board develop a plan to address fence replacement and water conservation.
- The Brannon Gearhart Park Task Force presented short- and long-term recommendations for the future of the park's infrastructure and amenities.
- The Master Association and the pool contractor will contribute funds to purchase a replacement shed for the swim team at the Ranch House pool.
- A motion passed approving \$8,000 of exploratory work on foundation issues at two historical barns at the Equestrian



In June of 2020, the Metropolitan District Board approved a temporary closure of the eastern side of the South Hogback Open Space (SHOS). The closure, which is necessary to protect rare and sensitive plant and animal species and cultural sites, will extend west to east from Cathy Johnson Trail to highway C-470 and north to south from Massey Draw to Deer Creek Canyon (see map). The landowner, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board of Directors, approved the temporary closure until a management plan for the area is approved. Cathy Johnson Trail, Columbine Trail and the Pass Trail connection to South Valley Park will remain open. The signage for this new closure will be in place in the coming weeks. Existing area closures along the western edge of this parcel will remain in place at this time.

The Board began the process of developing a management plan in 2019 when they hired private ecological consultants to complete biological and cultural surveys of the SHOS and to provide recommendations for protecting resources highlighted in the survey reports. Not surprisingly, the survey work revealed several significant findings that add further evidence to the ecological and cultural importance of the area recognized for years by organizations such as Colorado Natural Areas Program and Colorado Archaeological Society.

At the request of the Board, The Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space Committee will continue work on the plan that will include robust community participation and is also faithful to the overall goal at Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space of balancing resource protection and access. This work is likely to occur over the next several months. Interested individuals should monitor Board and OSC meeting agendas and attend meetings to provide input and monitor progress.

Unauthorized Tin Cup Fire **Investigation Update**

On Aug. 9, an unauthorized fire, located approximately 30' west of the Tin Cup campsite marker, was reported by a trail user and found to be smoldering on the morning of Aug. 10. When investigated by KCRMA Ranger Matt Oven, it was determined that the fire was still hot and there was broken glass, cans and rocks in the fire. The trail user also reported that the site's picnic table was moved from its original site on the Tin Cup summit, which is normally located on a pad approximately 150' west of the campsite. This was verified by Ranger Oven upon investigation. The trail user also reported having seen a group of young kids traversing the lower Manor House Trail earlier, equipped with little overnight gear.

As part of Ranger Oven's investigation, he was able to verify that there were no permitted campers registered to use the Tin Cup campsite the evening prior to the incident. He then proceeded to drive to the Manor House Trail shelter and continued to the campsite summit on his bike. At that time, Ranger Oven confirmed that the picnic table was missing and that was when he also discovered the smoldering camp fire.

As a result of the dutiful trail user's report, in addition to Ranger Oven's quick actions and prompt attention to this matter, the fire was quickly doused, along with the potential for the fire to spread.

We are thankful to Ranger Oven and all of the KCRMA Rangers who so dutifully monitor Ken-Caryl's open space for the safety of our community's residents and

If you see something, say something. As a result of this report, a potentially dangerous situation was ultimately avoided.


Ranger Oven has completed his investigation and it was determined that there were seven teenagers, ages 17 and 18 involved in the incident. Information obtained by Ranger Oven was submitted to the Jeffco Sheriff for further followup. The parents of all Ken-Caryl Ranch teenagers involved will be sent a hearing letter to address this incident before the Master Association Board.

Wildfires Increasing Across Colorado

As of the printing of this paper, Colorado is in the midst of battling four major wildfires across the state. A thick, smokey pall has blanketed Colorado, serving as a reminder of the devasting effects these conflagrations have on our beautiful state. Many long-time Ken-Caryl residents have experienced this smoke in their own backyards with hazy, emberfilled skies. Ken-Caryl resides within the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI), where homes are now placed in the forest and fuels. In fact, about half of Colorado's residents now live in a wildfire-prone area.

According to Colorado State University, wildfires in Colorado have worsened over the last 60+ years. In the 1960s and 1970s, wildfire destroyed less than 100,000 acres per decade in Colorado. That number of acres lost to fires increased to over 200,000 acres per decade during the 1980s and 1990s. For the 2000s, the total was approximately 1 million acres and there's little indication that this upward trend will turn around any time soon.

Why Is Wildfire Intensity Getting Worse?

Fire suppression has served to make forests denser and less tolerant of drought, pests and wildfires. Before 1910, low-severity forest fires occurred frequently and played a key role in keeping forests more open. With fewer trees and less competition for resources, trees such as ponderosa pine survived for centuries, withstanding drought, fire, insects and more.

In 1910, following major fires in the western United States, fire suppression

became mandated under federal policy. That, combined with land-use changes, completely changed the fuels in our dry mountain forests. Shade-tolerant (understory) and fire-intolerant tree species have moved in, creating crowded conditions where trees compete for limited resources. As a result, there's less water reaching deep into the soil and trees are showing signs of drought stress and becoming more susceptible to bark beetle outbreaks.

Scientists have also shown that higherdensity forests reduce snowpack across our mountain ranges. With less snow, these denser forests don't receive the water needed to keep them healthy. The younger, drought-sensitive trees that have grown since fire suppression started are more likely to die, creating fuel for wildfires. Older trees are weaker and so are more vulnerable to fire damage.

These factors combine to create a continuously escalating risk of severe wildfires in the dry mountain forests of Colorado. According to the Colorado Wildfire Risk Assessment Portal (CO-WRAP), the area surrounding Ken-Carvl has a high to very-high fire intensity rating. This includes the forested areas immediately to the west and southwest of Ken-Carvl, from which we can expect a wind-driven fire to emerge at our doors. We can expect large (up to 30 ft) to very large (up to 150 ft.) flames that generally cannot be effectively and safely attacked by firefighters, engines or dozers. Those types of fires have significant potential for harm or damage to life and property and extensive preparedness measures are needed to protect your home and

Visit the CO-WRAP web portal to get an indication of the wildfire risk surrounding Ken-Caryl. Visit the website at www. ColoradoWildfireRisk.com to generate a map showing details such as the likelihood of an acre burning, potential fire intensity, historic fire occurrence and values at risk from wildfire.

Both the frequency and severity of forest fires are growing across the western states, especially here in Colorado. The best things you can do are to be aware of wildfire alerts (https://www.jeffco. us/473/Emergency-Notifications) and take steps to protect your family and home with mitigation, preparation and early evacuation.





Remote Learning Tips for a Successful School Year

For many families, going 'back to school' this year looks very different, with many opting for remote learning and starting the year off at home. For families embarking on this new educational journey, Sal Khan, founder and CEO of Khan Academy, a nonprofit educational organization that provides free online lessons, gave the following tips for a successful remote learning experience:

Don't set expectations too high

"The key is not to set expectations too high because that will just set everyone up for stress and disappointment, and this is a time where we have enough things to



stress about, especially for parents. If parents are stressed out, kids are going to feel stressed out, and they're going to have a harder time learning," Khan said.

Khan said to focus on the basics first.

"Obviously, everyone's school is supporting them to different degrees," he said. "If your kids can get their math, their reading, their writing, depending on the age of the student, it can be anywhere from 20 minutes a day up to maybe two sessions or three sessions of 20 or 30 minutes a day. If you can get that under your belt and then you get your legs under you, then you can think about layering on more subjects."

Optimize connections for young kids

"A lot of times when we talk about distance school, we imagine school is first and foremost about learning the academic standards," Khan said. "School is also about the connections, the social emotional learning, the connection with the teacher, and so, everything you do for your child, or if you're a teacher, for the student, is try to optimize those connections."

Khan recommended young kids use the Khan Academy early learning app with their parents.

"Kids can work on that for 20 minutes a day. Ideally, they're doing that next to a parent. They're able to still stay connected while they're doing distance learning," he said. "Hopefully their teachers are able to do a couple of 20-minute Zoom sessions or video conference sessions every day, and then those should be pulling the students out of the screen as much as possible, getting them to do interactive things, especially for the younger age group, getting them to move around even."

Set goals for older kids

"Try to understand what's achievable in a day. A lot of the teachers who are doing this well are doing exactly that. They're setting goals for the day; they're setting goals for the week. They're doing regular check-ins," Khan said.

"When they get in on Google Hangout or Google Meet or they get on Zoom or whatever video conference they're using, instead of it just being about a one-way lecture-based interaction, they've got to really pull them out, ask them questions, ask them to work on video conference breakouts, do some goal setting with them, do some small group sessions."

Give them some social interaction

Khan said it's important for the students to interact with each other.

"If you're not seeing that from your child's school, try to get some of that outside of whatever is being provided. You could do socially distance play dates in the parks, whatever," he said. "I would say all ages, that social interaction, even for us adults, is super important."

Regardless of what learning style is best for your family, here's to a safe and successful school year!

Ken-Caryl Ranks Among the Fittest Cities in Colorado



BarBend.com, the world's leading strength training resource and news outlet, compiled a comprehensive list of the top fittest cities across Colorado, using data backed by studies based on a variety of factors. These were combined to create an overall fitness score out of 100 for each city on the list. 



Colorado is fortunate to have honest government, with citizens limitations. Colorado's Constitution requires a balanced budget. It requires all elected officials, since 1990, to eight-year terms, to any elected Colorado office. The Gallagher Amendment slows the rate of property tax increases, it also sets a ratio of property taxes paid between commercial real

estate and residential. The Amendment was passed in 1982.

The state legislature has approved a November ballot issue, asking taxpayers to overturn Gallagher.

TABOR, The Taxpayer Bill of Rights requires all tax increases to be voted on. The bill also says taxes can grow by rate of inflation and growth of Colorado

If the tax collections exceed those two numbers, taxpayers get a refund. Our politicians have sued to overturn TABOR. When large capital projects were planned in Colorado, voters would pass a bond issue and a tax to service the debt. Our elected officials have substituted bonds for COP's, Certificate of Participation, a lease purchase agreement that is not debt, no vote is required, RTD and Jeffco Court House were built with COP's. COP payments come from the general fund.

As of this writing, signatures have been submitted for a ballot issue to say fees are the same as taxes under TABOR. Colorado fees are not subject to a vote, because Colorado Courts have said fees are not part of TABOR. State park entrance fees, hospital fees, many others, have risen at the legislature request.

Politicians say, we elect them to manage the affairs of state and local government, they say they can't manage government with all these limitations, that's why politicians are always trying to circumvent the amendments. Please have a good understanding of the issues, before you cast your November ballot.

Fellow KC residents, I'm writing about increasing safety on our streets and bike paths/trails. There are many marked pedestrian crossings (bright yellow signs!) in our neighborhoods and many more unmarked curbed street crossings. Colorado State Law reads, if there is a pedestrian in a crosswalk, they have the right of way. Vehicles are to stop and to yield to pedestrians. I have been the recipient of many failures to yield by vehicles and have witnessed other pedestrians that have had the same thing happen to them. Please be aware of pedestrians at all intersections, whether at a major street crossing or at the corner of your neighborhood street. Also, the at major street intersections is not for

vehicles to stop on. I see a lot of vehicles that stop at a traffic light with their wheels covering the white lines, which are a visual "barrier" to keep vehicles from getting too close to the marked pedestrian crosswalks. Please stop before these lines and give pedestrians a little "elbow room".

Colorado State Laws also apply to the road bikers, whether you are yielding to pedestrians, or just riding on the streets. Vehicle laws (stop signs, traffic lights, road speed limits) also apply to road cyclists. On all of our trails - paved or dirt - the yielding rules are: #1 everyone yields to equestrians, #2 hikers/walkers are next, #3 bikers yield to #1 and #2. If you are biking on the trails, please be courteous and call out loudly when approaching a walker/ hiker. Our KC, "Share the Trails the KC Way" document clearly states these rules. There are many courteous resident bikers riding the trails, but also, many that are not. The "nots" give off the arrogant attitude that the trails belong to them, and everyone needs to get out of their way. This can translate into giving all bikers a bad name. Let's all be courteous, follow all the laws and rules for private trails. Show respect for our fellow neighbors by practicing proper trail etiquette and crosswalk courtesy.




