FACTUAL SUMMARY NOVEMBER 6, 2018 ELECTION FOR VOTER AUTHORIZATION TO INCREASE PROPERTY TAX REVENUE

THE DISTRICT. Since 1988 Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District has provided a wide range of park and recreation services and amenities to the community. The District is responsible for maintaining and operating three pools, sports fields, parks, greenbelts, the Community Center, Dakota Lodge, Ranch House and tennis courts. In addition, the District provides youth and adult programing, and an environmental education program. Property taxes make up 60% of the District's total annual revenue.

SUMMARY OF THE ISSUE. In the past 5 years, the District's operating costs have exceeded the revenues it generates through property taxes and program fees. As the costs of operating the District continue to increase, so must the revenues generated by property taxes and program fees; however, the Gallagher Amendment to the Colorado Constitution is reducing the District's property tax revenue. The Gallagher Amendment requires residential property owners to pay 45% of the total property taxes paid. In every odd year, the Colorado Legislature is required to set the residential assessment rate ("RAR") at a level that will maintain the 45% tax share. Due to the steady increase in residential property values across the State, since 1982 the RAR has been reduced from 21% to 7.96%. Then, in 2017, the Colorado Legislature further reduced the RAR to 7.2%. This approximately 9% decrease in the RAR resulted in the District losing \$210,000 in revenue in 2018. Preliminary projections indicate the Colorado Legislature will further reduce the RAR to 6.11% in 2019, which will result in another 15% decrease and another approximately \$375,000 loss in property tax revenue.

THE BALLOT ISSUE. During its meeting on August 21, 2018, the District's Board of Directors adopted a Resolution calling for an election on November 6, 2018 to seek voter approval of a property tax increase through the following Ballot Issue:

SHALL KEN-CARYL RANCH METROPOLITAN DISTRICT TAXES BE INCREASED \$1,530,556 (FIRST FULL FISCAL YEAR DOLLAR INCREASE) ANNUALLY, BEGINNING IN LEVY YEAR 2018 (FOR COLLECTION IN CALENDAR YEAR 2019) BY INCREASING THE DISTRICT'S EXISTING PROPERTY TAX BY 8.0 MILLS, AND SHALL ALL REVENUE AND ANY EARNINGS ON THIS TAX CONSTITUTE A PERMANENT VOTER-APPROVED REVENUE CHANGE WITHIN THE MEANING OF ARTICLE X, SECTION 20 OF THE COLORADO CONSTITUTION AND AN EXCEPTION TO THE LIMITATIONS SET FORTH IN SECTION 29-1-301 OF THE COLORADO REVISED STATUTES, AND ANY OTHER LAW?

ARGUMENTS AGAINST THE PROPOSAL. The property tax increase will increase the amount of taxes the District assesses against taxable property within its boundaries. For voters who support less and smaller government, the District's increase in tax revenues may be contrary to this objective. Based upon the District's current assessed valuation, a property tax increase of 8 mills would result in the following projected increases in property taxes to homeowners:

\$400,000 Residence = \$19 per month \$600,000 Residence = \$29 per month \$800,000 Residence = \$38 per month

ARGUMENTS FOR THE PROPOSAL. Without additional tax revenue, the District Board must look at reducing services and increasing fees. The revenue lost from the Gallagher Amendment is impairing the District's ability to continue operating at its current service level. In addition, the District must build reserve funds that allow for capital improvements and expanded services in the future. Without a mill levy increase, the Board must look at reducing services and increase program fees, including eliminating free community events, reducing parks maintenance such as watering, mowing, landscaping, and tree care, eliminating capital expenses such as additional shade at the pools, playground replacements and paved trail repairs, charging for resident pool access, reducing pool hours, closing Bradford pool.

KCRMD Board Votes to Place Mill Levy on November 2018 Ballot

At the Aug. 21 Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board Meeting, the Board voted to place a mill levy ballot initiative on the November 2018 ballot.

The Board is seeking voter approval to increase its mill levy by 8 mills in order to continue offering services at current levels, increase services where needed, create operational and capital reserves, and offset the impacts of the Gallagher Amendment. In the next few issues of the paper, staff will answer some Frequently Asked Questions about the Mill Levy:

What is the approximate increase in taxes per home?

The 8 mill increase is equivalent to an increase of approximately \$4.75/month per \$100,000 of property value. Here are a few examples:

\$400,000 Residence = \$19 per month \$600,000 Residence = \$29 per month \$800,000 Residence = \$38 per month

What is the difference between a mill levy and a bond?

A mill levy is the tax rate that is applied to the assessed value of a property to determine the property taxes due from property owners to state and local governments. Operational mill levy

dollars fund operations for things like parks and greenbelts maintenance, facility maintenance, supplies, capital repairs, equipment, administrative costs, etc. Bonds are issued by state and local governments to fund major capital projects like renovating existing buildings/parks, new buildings, etc. Debt service mill levy dollars fund the government's repayment of the bonds issued.

When is the last time a mill levy or bond issue were passed for KCRMD?

Voters in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District last passed an operational mill levy increase in 2009. On May 6, 2014, voters in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District passed Bond Issue 5A, authorizing \$7.9 million in municipal bonds to finance facility, park and recreation improvements for the community. The bond projects are now complete. The current property tax mill levy is 15.209 mills for operations and 5.46 mills for repayment of the general obligation bonds approved by voters in 2014. The mill levy associated with the general obligation bonds can only be used for the payments on the bonds. These bonds will be paid off by the end of 2024 at which time the mill levy associated with these bonds will go away.

Board Meeting Summaries

Master Association

On Aug. 21, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association held a regular meeting and discussed the following topics:

- Board Member Erlinda Stafford read a thank-you letter and passed out honey samples from Ed Galisewski, who maintains beehives in Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space.
- Resident James Fodor requested that one
 of his letters to the editor in Life at KenCaryl not count toward his total of eight
 allowed letters per year. He also requested
 that the Board increase the number of
 allowed letters to the editor per year from
 eight to twelve. He also requested more
 transparency regarding trail accidents.
- Resident Cheryl Mouton requested that the Board dismiss the foreclosure against

her property. She will put together a timeline of events regarding her property, as will the Master Association staff, so the Board can review the information and make a decision.

- Resident Elizabeth Allison asked the Board if the Master Association is being sued, and the Board said no. She wants information about serious accidents published in the paper and wants procedures in place.
- Bruce Heise provided clarification on some misinformation regarding Docmann Trail and the Trails Master Plan.
- Joe McCabe recommended a book called Factfulness and said all elected officials should read the book.
- The Board discussed the current status of the Docmann Trail Permit. Jefferson County issued a Natural Surface Trail

Permit to the Master Association in July 2018. A group of residents filed an appeal with the County in August 2018. The Jefferson County Board of Adjustment will hear the appeal on Sept. 5 at 9 a.m. at the County Administration Building.

- Resident Dale Grau stated issues with the pond aerator at Brannon Gearhart Pond and asked that the Board consider dredging the pond as part of the 2019 budget. Staff is working with a contractor to address the aerator and will solicit a cost to dredge for discussion.
- Staff provided an update on the 2018 one-time project list.
- Chris Pacetti presented the budget planning schedule to the Board. The Board reviewed a list of potential onetime expenses and discussed allotting \$250,000 toward the water bill. A draft of the budget and updated budget yellow sheet of potential one-time projects will be presented for discussion at the Sept. 18 Board meeting.
- Open Space Manager Sean Warren discussed some rare plants in a section of the Metropolitan District's open space near the new Westerly Apartments. The Board discussed the possibility of updating the Trails Master Plan, and Sean Warren discussed the potential for a Protected Habitat Plan.
- The Board supports staying with insurance broker John Archer for the 2019 insurance renewal.
- Board President Seth Murphy discussed an interaction he had with the Chatfield Mountain Biking Team in the Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space. He was concerned that members of the team were riding out of control and going too fast. Seth talked to the coach and asked him to talk to the students. Chatfield said they may not use our trails in the future.

Brannon Gearhart Trail and Drainageway Project Back on Track

The trail and drainageway improvements in Brannon Gearhart Park, which started last December, have been delayed for several weeks due to scheduling conflicts with the contractor. While a portion of the project was completed, most of the work remains unfinished. The good news is that the Master Association has found a replacement contractor that will be able to move onto the project and still meet the original contract completion date.

Valles Construction, out of Milliken, Colorado, is estimated to begin work in September 2018 and should finish the project in two-three months. Valles Construction is currently working in the open space for Urban Drainage and Flood Control District on a project to protect Ken-Caryl Ave. from stream bank erosion on North Massey Draw. Valles Construction will work both projects simultaneously using the same construction access on the east end of the project.

There are three distinct parts to the project (see map); one, re-build low-water crossings at the west end of project; two, re-route the main trail between Canyon Cedar and Wood Sorrel; three, re-route the neighborhood access trail from Wood Sorrel/Buckthorn Dr.


At the low-water crossings, the existing small culverts will be replaced with a

larger culvert that will elevate the trail surface and shorten the slope going in and out of the crossing. The trail re-routes will move the main trail out of the shade and the narrow corridor between Massey Draw and adjacent home lots, while the neighborhood access trail will be built at a flatter gradient. The project will address problems with winter ice buildup due to poor drainage and will improve access for maintenance and emergency vehicles. One of the low-water crossings was completed by the original contractor in June.

The Master Association's consultant, Mueller Engineering Company, began engineering and design work in 2014. In September 2016, staff presented a preliminary design to the community and gathered input on the project. In 2017 the Board approved the final design, selected the original contractor and directed staff to secure permits for the project.

Construction cost is estimated at \$280,000. Funding for the project will come from the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Annual Fund for drainage repairs and from the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Reserve Study for converting asphalt trail paving to concrete. While there will be a slight overall increase in cost with the transition of contractors, the project should remain on budget.

Trail users should expect detours around construction zones, but the bulk of the trail system in Brannon Gearhart will remain open during construction. If you have any questions, please contact Sean Warren at 303-979-1876, ext. 463, or seanw@kcranch.org.

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Forest Bathing: The Healing Powers of Nature

We enjoy nature in myriad ways. Maybe it's heading down a dirt path before breakfast, breathing in crisp morning air, watching the silhouettes of magpies against the dawn. Or maybe it's roaming with an animal companion, hooves and paws pairing alongside boot tracks. Or maybe you're like me, enjoying the golden hours just before sunset in a private patch of forest, absorbed in the rustle of leaves and boughs that wave and bend to greet the solo traveler who simply wants to take it all in...who wants the wholeness of nature to wash over the senses...who wants to bathe in the forest.

Wait... what? Bathe in the forest? This notion of "taking in the forest atmosphere" or "forest bathing" is a Japanese practice called Shinrin-yoku. Developed in the 1980s, the practice is simple: visit a natural area, walk in a relaxed manner and reap the restorative benefits (mind you, this is the very simplified version). Decades of study have correlated time spent in the forest to better overall health. Seems reasonable, right? Exercise has been shown to improve overall health, so why wouldn't exercise in a beautiful forested area be even better?

There are numerous studies and articles from Japan and South Korea (and more recently, the United States) highlighting the many ways time spent in the forest improves the human body, like reducing cortisol (a stress hormone) and boosting immunity through an increase in levels of natural killer cells (the body's disease-fighting agents). There is a study observing

a group of Outward Bound individuals performing 50 percent better on creative problem-solving tasks after a three-day back-country backpacking trip. There is even a study from 2008, performed by the world's leader in forest medicine, Dr. Li, suggesting potential anti-cancer benefits linked to time spent in the woods.

A group of nurses, after a three-day trip, produced anti-cancer proteins and other benefits which lasted over a week after the trip had concluded. And the list goes on! While more research does need to be done, especially in regard to cancer-fighting benefits, this large body of information and study has created a viable platform that should encourage everyone to stand up and get out into the forest more often (that is, if you even need a reason, fellow adventurer).





Resident Uses "Rejection Goal" as Pathway to Success

Life-long resident Sarah Birkhaeuser is currently finishing her degree at the University of Denver, interning at Pugh-Bellmar Financial and packing her bags for a semester abroad in Spain studying at one of the best literature and translation schools in the Spanish-speaking world. The secret to her success: a collection of rejection letters that inspires her to take risks.

"I credit (my mom) with my strong work ethic and my ability to work through difficult situations of all sorts on my own."

Sarah grew up speaking Spanish and English in her single-parent home. Speaking another language at home felt isolating as a child, but as Sarah grew she began to take pride in her heritage and to value the diversity that shaped her life. Her early experiences with her family's Costa Rican culture led her to study International Political Economy, Economics and Spanish Literature.

In addition to her financial planning internship, Sarah has also interned at a hospital emergency department, worked as a legal assistant at a law firm, cleaned cages at the International Bird Rescue, waited tables and volunteered with an "English as a Second

Language" program. Her experiences are leading her toward a career in finance or economics research. She would like to "use numbers to improve people's quality of life"

She faces the challenges ahead armed with a collection of rejection letters.

"I find that saving them helps me get over my fear of rejection, and instead encourages me to try out for things that I might otherwise be timid about applying for. Next January, my New Year's Resolution is going to be to get 100 rejection letters by the end of the year. I'm setting this goal for myself just as I graduate college, so that I am ready for any bumps in my road as I head into the



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

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Finding Your Voice

Peri Charlifu returns to the Ken-Caryl Art Guild with a second installment of his popular marketing workshop, this one about "Establishing and Maintaining a Workflow."

With a degree in psychology and art therapy, he has developed many successful

techniques for marketing and selling his work. He's always eager to pass on his knowledge to other artists.

Of this session, Peri said, "The more product you can make, the better your bottom line will be. Even if you're not selling your work, we can all be more productive. This workshop demonstrates how to increase productivity and streamline workflow and production time."

Peri certainly knows what he's talking about. He's been selling his work for 37 years, producing over 37,000 pieces. He has won dozens of awards and is founder and guild master of the Arts and Artisans of Colorado. Peri uses a high-density mix of porcelain and white stoneware and mixes his own glazes, stains and colors. Each piece comes with its own story.

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Murphy Gulch Fire **Anniversary Nears**

Ken-Caryl residents who hike or bike up into the foothills on Ranch property encounter the sight of fallen timber and standing dead trees tattooed with burn scars. What they and others who have not been on those trails may not know is that these are the remnants of a large forest fire that burned thousands of acres of Ken-Caryl Ranch property 40 years ago this month. They serve as a reminder that we live in the Wildland Urban Interface and must be aware of the associated risks and take precautions to protect ourselves and our property.

The Murphy Gulch fire started in the morning of Sunday, Sept. 10, 1978 south of Ken-Caryl property when two children (7and 10-years old) were building a campfire in their backyard that got out of control. It quickly spread to the nearby dry grass and then northeasterly to Ken-Caryl property.


At 10:40 a.m. a security guard at the recently-completed Johns Manville World Headquarters (now Lockheed Martin) noticed smoke in the foothills above the building and contacted authorities. The Inter-Canyon and Bancroft Fire Departments were quickly on the scene as well as the Johns Manville fire brigade. Eventually members of 40 fire departments from as far away as Silver Plume and Forest Service firefighters from Wyoming, Idaho and California arrived to help. A group of about 100 Lowry Air Force Base personnel arrived by Sunday evening.

The Johns Manville World Headquarters became the fire headquarters. Volunteers reported there, were given picks and shovels, and joined the fire line. Food for the firefighters was made available there. Denver media arrived.

The next day winds picked up and the fire extended farther into the Ken-Caryl Valley. Newly built homes in the West Ranch

This graphic was created by Johns Manville showing the extent of the fire. The WHQ label in the graphic refers to the Johns Manville World Headquarters.


were threatened. The fire reached the parking lot of the Johns Manville building. The Manor House became the firefighting headquarters, where helicopters with water buckets shuttled between the helipad and the fire line, and the American Red Cross set up an aid station. Two Forest Service slurry bombers from Jefferson County Airport dropped fire retardant. Ken-Caryl Ranch bulldozers were used to dredge fire lines on the hillsides.

The firefighting continued for about a week. The fire eventually encompassed about 3,300 acres, extending as far north as Willowbrook, where residents hosed down their rooftops, and as far east as the grassy areas near the Manor House. The only structure lost was a guest house on a nearby ranch. Homes in the Ken-Caryl Valley had not yet been built and the Equestrian Center (then still a cattle operation) was not damaged, although herds of cattle needed to be moved. The Johns Manville World Headquarters suffered smoke damage.


Thanks to the efforts of all the professional firefighters and hundreds of volunteers (including many Johns Manville employees) no lives were lost and property damage was kept to a minimum. The dead trees, some of which can be seen silhouetted against the sky from the valley floor, serve as an important reminder to the residents: Enjoy the beautiful place in which we live and be vigilant about the associated risks.




Firefighters worked to control the Murphy Gulch fire. Photo by Denver Post.

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Reflections from the Fire Line!

I wanted to take a minute to share some thoughts and a few pictures from my time on the Silver Creek Fire near Kremmling. I hope the photos are exciting enough to get everyone to read this, because honestly, I feel like very few neighbors care to listen. I share this info because of what I have seen and experienced. I don't want you to have to experience the horrors I have witnessed through the years.

For those of you that don't know, I am a Captain for the Red, White & Blue Fire Protection District in Breckenridge. When not responding to emergencies, I run the voluntary fire mitigation program for our residents and property owners. When requested, we meet with homeowners to develop a personalized plan to make structures more resilient to wildfires. Last year we met with 71 concerned families who wanted to take steps to make their homes more Firewise. This year we received 75 requests for assessments in July alone.

What do you think was the reason for the sudden interest? Yup, big fires threatening the neighborhood. Now this is great news

for our mitigation program, but what people don't understand is that this is our busiest time of year for fighting fires. Needless to say, we are struggling to keep up with the influx of requests for assistance.

So, what does this mean for Ken-Caryl Ranch? Well it means now is the time to get prepared! Whether you believe in climate change or not, I am here to tell you that our forests and our open space do! Ken-Caryl Ranch is on the border of moderate drought and moving toward the severe category. Currently, we are not under any water restrictions, but that could all change as waterrights battles increase in the west.

So, what can we do? Well first, let me say that Ken-Caryl Ranch is considered to have a moderate threat for wildfire. That is great news but should not give a false sense of security. Studies are showing that the number one thing that burns homes down is not the wall of fire seen on the nightly news; it is an ember landing in the wrong place.

This leads me to address a couple common misconceptions about fire mitigation. Being Firewise doesn't mean clear cutting all your landscaping. It means being thoughtful about the vegetation around your home and practicing good housekeeping to be Ember Aware! Also, just because we are a Firewise Neighborhood, doesn't mean we are ready for a wildfire. It means we are taking steps to prepare for one.

Here are some steps you as a responsible homeowner can take to improve the chances you and your family are not severely impacted by a wildfire.

- Register your family's mobile devices to receive emergency alerts. https:// public.coderedweb.com/CNE/en-US/655AC5D55998
- Refer to the infographic on this page titled "7 Ways Residents Can Reduce the Risk that Their Homes and Property Will Become Fuel for a Wildfire."
- Contact the Colorado State Forest Service to schedule a free personalized assessment. Ken-Caryl Ranch has a contract to offer this service, free to all residents.
- If you back to open space, take advantage of the new rule allowing you to mow 10 feet into open space for a personal fire break.
- Follow Firewise of Ken-Caryl Ranch on Facebook with other concerned homeowners.
- Talk to your neighbors! One Firewise home is good, a cluster of Firewise homes is great, and a whole neighborhood of Firewise homes is best!
- Invite our Firewise Committee to come speak at one of your neighborhood groups: book club, play group, political organization, wine club, etc. Especially Wine Clubs! Kudos to the residents of Summit Ash and the Seniors Group for taking advantage of this!
- Develop a family plan for evacuations! During an emergency is not the time! The stress can cause us to not think clearly. Visit www.wildlandfirersg.org for help and ideas.
- Support the MA and MD budget and ballot requests. Budget cuts could affect greenbelt watering and strategic mowing operations. Yes, mowing is also purposeful for fire breaks.
- 10. Support any future ballot initiatives for West Metro Fire Rescue.







7 Ways Residents Can Reduce the Risk that their Homes & Property Will Become Fuel for a Wildfire

Clear

Clear off pine needles, dead leaves 8 anything that can burn from your rooflines, gutters, decks, porches, patios 8 along fence lines. Falling embers will have nothing to burn.

Screen & Seal

Wind-borne embers can get into homes easily through vents 8 other openings and burn the home from the inside out. Walk around your house to see what openings you can screen or temporarily seal up.

Trim back any shrubs or tree feet to the house and attachments, and any overhanging branches.

If ordered to evacuate, make sure all windows & doors are closed tightly, and seal up any pet doors. Many homes are destroyed by embers entering these openings and burning the house from the inside out.

NFPA has many more tips and safety recommendations on its websites, including www.firewise.org.

Store Away

Store away furniture cushions, rattan mats, potted plants & other decorations from decks, porches & patios. These items catch embers and help ignite your home if you leave them outside.

Embers landing in mulch that touches your house, deck or fence is a big fire hazard. Rake out any landscaping mulch to at least five feet away.

Kemove

Walk around your house and remove anything within 30 feet that could burn, such as woodpiles, spare lumber, vehicles and boats – anything that can act as a large fuel source.
