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Docmann Trail Update

At the March 20 business meeting of the Master Association Board, Open Space Manager Sean Warren gave a presentation about the Eagle Incidental Take Permit (EITP) for Docmann Loop Trail. After considering this new information from staff, the Board decided pursuing an EITP was not in the Master Association's best interest and that the chances of construction activity for the trail project causing a violation of the Bald and Golden Eagle Protection Act are very low due to the following reasons: The trail alignment is outside Colorado Parks and Wildlife's recommended nest buffer for Golden Eagles, sightlines between the trail and nest are blocked by intervening topography for a majority of the trail's alignment, and the construction schedule for the project starts in late summer, outside the nesting season for golden eagles using the South Valley Park nest site. The Master Association is applying for a Natural Surface Trails permit with Jefferson County prior to construction, which is anticipated to begin in August pending permit approval. Resident Survey FAQs

What is the Metropolitan District and What Do My Taxes Cover?

The next Frequently Asked Question from the 2017 Resident Survey comments is related to the Metropolitan District and taxes. Ken-Caryl Ranch is governed by two distinct entities: the Master Association (MA) and the Metropolitan District (MD). These two entities work together to ensure sustainable success for the entire community. This issue will give an overview of the MD.

- The MD is organized as a Special District under Title 32 of the Constitution of the State of Colorado. This system of local government combines the political leadership of elected officials (in the form of a five-member Board of Directors) with the managerial experience of a professional manager and staff.
- The MD was formed in 1988 by a vote of Ken-Caryl Ranch residents, thereby creating a mill levy (property tax) as a means to enhance recreational activities for the community.
- Having an MD saves residents money because of the tax-exempt status. It has enabled additional funding from the state lottery dollars and Jefferson County Local Park and Recreation grants.



- The MD's revenues are derived from property taxes, grants and user fees.
- Property tax revenue the MD receives helps cover the maintenance of the paths, greenbelts, parks, playgrounds, and facilities and supports some areas of programming.
- The MD also provides recreational activities for the enjoyment of the community. The recreational facilities provide opportunities for residents of all ages to enjoy the swimming pools, tennis courts, disc golf course, fitness facilities and sports fields. Users pay fees for most programs including swim lessons, guest pool passes, fitness memberships, tennis lessons, enrichment classes, before and after school programs, camps, and preschool.
- MD Parks crews plow the parking lots at Ranch facilities during the winter but are not responsible for plowing public streets or private driveways.
- The South Hogback Open Space is owned by the MD and is open to the public.
- The MD also established the Ken-Caryl Ranch Foundation, a 501(c)3 organization. The Foundation has raised thousands of dollars helping to purchase the South Hogback, providing scholarships, supporting community events like Outdoor Movie Nights, and helping to pay for other projects like the Community Garden.

Inoperable Vehicles

Submitted by Community Standards Administrator

A big part of what sets a covenant community apart from a non-covenant controlled community is its Parking Rules. KCR manages rules for Parking on Ken-Caryl Property, including streets, parking lots and driveways with few exceptions and with regard to campers, RVs and inoperable vehicles among others.

Lately, we have experienced numerous reports of inoperable vehicles. Storage of your inoperable vehicle in a public rightof-way or in public view is not permitted on Ken-Caryl Ranch (see excerpt from the rules below) and could be enforceable through the Violation Policy where applicable. Furthermore, a vehicle with expired tags parked on the street can be managed by the County, which could result in fines and/or towing.

Ken-Caryl Ranch is a beautiful community with gorgeous views; you and your neighbors pay dues to maintain that. If you ever wondered why we don't permit these vehicles or think the rule is arbitrary, take a drive through a non-covenant controlled community and count the number of trailers, RVs, boats, damaged cars, etc., and you will see a significant

As always, if you have an extenuating circumstance, such as extended maintenance or insurance processing, etc., please call so that we can work together and agree on a cure date that is appropriate for the community while reasonably accommodating your circumstances.

Abandoned or Inoperable Vehicles: No abandoned or inoperable vehicles of any kind shall be stored or parked in the Ken-Caryl community unless fully screened from view in a garage or other structure approved by the KCRMA Architectural Committee. An "abandoned or inoperable vehicle" as used herein is defined as any automobile, truck, motorcycle or other similar vehicle that does not have a current registration and license plate sticker, or which cannot be driven under its own propulsion, or a vehicle which has one or more flat tires.

Board Meeting Summaries

Master Association Board

On March 20, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following

- A resident asked if the dues will go down next year, and the Board explained that the 2019 budget will be voted on in the fall. The same resident also inquired about analyzation of resident survey results, and the Board reported that the CPC is working on analyzing the results.
- A resident expressed concerns about maintenance of Heirloom Park.
- A resident read his letter to the editor from the March 21, 2018 Life at Ken-Caryl.
- The Board decided to change the regular Board meetings to 6 p.m. instead of 6:30 p.m. The meetings will still be on the third Tuesday of each month at the Ranch House.
- Trail Club President Dennie McGarry presented the Trail Club Annual Report, which was included in the Board Packet.
- The Board discussed the Cooperative Agreement RE: Identification and Definition of the Ongoing Internal Relationships and Responsibilities. The attorneys for the Master Association and Metropolitan District will review the document, and the Board will vote on the proposed changes at a future meeting.
- The Board discussed financial responsibility of the cluster mailboxes around the community. The Board will discuss the issue again in April.
- The Board discussed the overpayment of dues by a commercial property and supports refunding six years' worth of overage. The Board will vote on the action in April.
- Open Space Manager Sean Warren requested \$500-\$1,000 to hire ERO Resources Corporation to complete follow-up work on environmental compliance issues related to the East Plum Thicket-Manzanita Social Trail Conversion Project. The Board supported using contingency funds for this work.
- Open Space Manager Sean Warren gave an overview of Docmann Trail and the Eagle Incidental Take Permit process with U.S. Fish and Wildlife. The presentation was posted online after the meeting. The Board supports proceeding with the contract for building Docmann Trail. - A motion passed appointing Master Association officers for 2018. Seth Murphy will continue as the Board President.
- A motion passed authorizing staff to enter into a modified agreement for operation of the new gate at the Manor
- A motion passed indemnifying former Board members Dan Mullins and Angela

- A motion passed authorizing staff to enter into a contract for \$23,490 with Standard Fence for Bradford ornamental iron fence replacement.
- The Ranch House Pool committee is proceeding with the pool project and gathering public comments.
- The Equestrian Center Task Force has assigned tasks based on the goals in its job description.
- An Urban Drainage open house is tentatively planned for April 12 to discuss the redesign of a drainage pipe off Ken Caryl Ave. near the Equestrian

Metropolitan District Board

On March 27, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District Board held a regular meeting and discussed the following


- Staff provided an update on the 2018 MD Election. Because there were two candidates for two open positions, the Board passed a Resolution to cancel the May 8 election and declare Kayla Kirkpatrick and John Huggins elected to the MD Board by acclamation.
- Staff gave an update on the Ranch House Pool renovation. A public meeting was held March 14, and the concept designs were also posted online. Staff gathered all of the feedback and presented it to the architect, Ohlson Lavoie Collaborative, for incorporation into the plans. More information and designs will be presented to both Boards at the April 3 Joint Study Session.
- The Board discussed the draft update to the MA/MD Reorganization Agreement, in particular the proposed changes to irrigation water cost responsibility. Both Boards will vote on the agreement at a future meeting.
- The Board reviewed plans for a new sign at the Community Center and gave staff direction to move forward with the project this spring. The new sign will match the family of community and entrance signs.
- The Board discussed the future of the Mill Levy for the MD. Discussion circulated about strategies to build an operational reserve and capital reserve for the District and ensure financial sustainability. Information was provided by the District's legal counsel on the potential for another Gallagher adjustment to the assessed value rate in 2019. Staff will be working on financial projects to better understand the impact to the District's finances should that adjustment take place. The Board will discuss big picture strategies and the potential need for a mill levy increase at future meetings.



Open Space Weed Management

Spring is here and along with warmer temperatures and longer days weeds are starting to appear in lawns, parks and open space areas. As part of an integrated management approach, herbicide applications and mowing are used to combat weed infestations in the open space. This year's herbicide applications will be conducted from approximately April to July depending on weather and growing conditions. Mowing operations are usually performed in late summer to prevent seed production. Some follow-up spraying in fall may occur if there is re-growth after the summer mowing operations.

Bare-ground areas like picnic pads, hardsurface trails and kiosk pads are treated first with a pre-emergent herbicide. Applications can be conducted before weeds emerge, and these herbicides prevent weeds from germinating in the area throughout the growing season.

The next weeds managed are the biennial weed species like Musk thistle and Mullein. Mullein and Musk thistle are on the Colorado noxious weed list, which

mandates that landowners make attempts to control and stop the spread of these weed species. The first year and early spring growth forms for these weeds is a rosette of basal leaves lying close to the ground. At this stage they are most vulnerable to chemical application because of their increased uptake of water and nutrients. Even though mullein and musk thistle can be effectively treated all the way up to the budding stages, we have found that spring and fall spraying in the rosette stage is most effective.

As spring turns into summer, management efforts shift to deeply rooted perennial weeds like Canada thistle. Spraying Canada thistle and other deeply rooted perennials is more effective when the plants have bolted and grown to approximately 10 inches in height. At this point, they are still transporting nutrients to the root system, which will allow for more herbicide uptake. Mowing is also an effective way to make the perennials use more energy as they attempt to recover from the mowing. Mowed perennials are also more susceptible to fall herbicide applications.

The weeds being managed this season are very aggressive invaders that have the potential to take over native plant communities. Priority was given to areas where infestations pose the worst threat to native plant communities and where they are bordering home lots. A contract herbicide applicator and the in-house open space crew will be performing the herbicide applications.



North Tributary to Massey Draw Bank Stabilization Project at Ken Caryl Ave.

You are invited to attend an Open House regarding the proposed improvements for the North Tributary to Massey Draw south of the Equestrian Center. The Open House will be held on April 12 from 5-7 p.m. at the Dakota Lodge. Plans showing proposed improvements will be on display, and a brief presentation describing the project will be given at 6 p.m. The Project Team will be available to answer questions.

Purpose and Need: The North

Tributary to Massey Draw below the Equestrian Center has severely eroded the embankment on the west side of Ken Caryl Ave. In order to preserve the integrity of the roadway embankment, Jefferson County has requested the assistance of Urban Drainage and Flood Control District (UDFCD). UDFCD has hired a Consulting Engineer to design and a Contractor to construct improvements that will stop the erosion of this roadway embankment.

Project Scope: This project will provide improvements that will repair the existing erosion and minimize future erosion of this section of this drainageway. These improvements will include:

• Stacked boulder walls to stabilize the drainageway bank and protect the

- roadway embankment
- Minor channel regrading
- Three boulder drop structures
- Rip rap channel protection

Project Impact: All efforts will be employed to minimize disturbance to existing vegetation. Upon project completion, all areas disturbed by construction activities will be reseeded. UDFCD will maintain this project for Jefferson County and monitor revegetated areas to assure a good vegetative cover. Existing trees and brush that shield this area from nearby residences will remain undisturbed.

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Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee Wins NFPA Grant for Mitigation Demonstration Project

Nature is both beautiful and dangerous. As more and more people choose to live in and around the Wildland Urban Interface (WUI), the challenge of preparing communities for the devastation of wildfire becomes more complex. To help communities prepare residents for the possibility of a wildfire, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) grants monetary awards to support and implement wildfire risk reduction projects. Ken-Caryl was selected by the NFPA to receive one of the \$500 grants for 2018.

The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee will undertake this project to raise awareness and demonstrate effective fire mitigation in our neighborhood with special emphasis on our conditions and risks. We will select two fire mitigation sites, one on adjacent open space and one on a resident property. We will encourage residents to nominate their individual properties for this demonstration treatment through a future Life at Ken Caryl newspaper notification. After reviewing the volunteer submissions, we will make the selection, do assessments, and develop mitigation action plans.

The grant would be used to support volunteer work on these two properties during a Firewise project work day and subsequent development and onsite demonstrations of these illustrative examples of before and after mitigation on these properties. The illustrations would be used to develop a series of posters, brochures and website photos that would be the cornerstone of the Ken-Caryl Firewise Board's participation in two community events, the Spring Fling



on April 29 and the Community Recycling & Cleanup Event in conjunction with Wildfire Preparedness Day on May 5.

The Ken-Caryl Firewise Committee will focus on wildfire education on the first nationwide Wildfire Community Preparedness Day, slated to take place May 5 in conjunction the with Recycling & Cleanup Event at the Ranch House. The national Preparedness Day gives people of all ages a chance to participate in a risk reduction or wildfire preparedness activity that makes Ken-Caryl a safer place to live. The goal of Firewise is public education to empower residents to take action with regard to fire safety.

Wildland fires are a serious threat to lives and property. The National Association of State Foresters (NASF) cites more than 72,000 U.S. communities are now at risk from wildfire. The combination of drought, mild temperatures, high winds and an excess of dried vegetation in forests and grasslands has made fire seasons progressively worse over the past 50 years. Funding for the NFPA wildfire grant is provided by State Farm Insurance. Presentation on Prehistoric Archaeology of Ken-Caryl Ranch

Join Us for an Educational Presentation by Archaeologist Jack Warner

Long before the first modern homes were built on Ken-Caryl Ranch, families of early Americans selected this place to live. In fact, people have lived repeatedly in this beautiful area for at least the last 9,000 years!

Families sought the warmth and protection of south-facing rock overhangs for shelter. Water, wood for fuel, animals to hunt, fish to catch and plants for food were all close. These early people had no metal. All their tools were made of stone or bone. The Ken-Caryl area provided natural sources for many of the most useful types of stone to make fine tools. Some of the earliest people to live in the "New World" lived in or near Ken-Caryl.

How do we know this is true? We are very fortunate because before modern development occupied the land, the developers called in teams of archaeologists to study and dig valuable archaeological sites on Ken-Caryl Ranch. Led by the Denver Chapter of the Colorado Archaeological Society, excavations were conducted from 1973-1998. They uncovered many ancient artifacts that the ancient people left behind. Sites were excavated from north of the Bradford House all the way south to Deer Creek. Evidence of occupation by these early Americans are found from as far back as the Paleo-Indian culture dated at over 9,000 years ago, through the early, middle and late Archaic cultures before 1,850 years ago. The more recent Early Ceramic and Woodland cultures occupied Ken-Caryl until the coming of the modern settlers in historic times.

To hear more about the prehistoric people of Ken-Caryl, how they lived, and the archaeological sites, come to the Ranch House at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, April 4 for a talk by Jack Warner on the "Prehistoric Archaeology of Ken-Caryl Ranch." Jack is a member of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Historical Society, the Colorado Archaeological Society, the Center for the Study of the First Americans, and author of the book Eagles and Lions of Land and Sea.

Dear Editor:

I would like to take this opportunity to provide the "thank you" to Sean Warren that he didn't receive at the March 20 MA meeting. Sean had the foresight and took the initiative to explore and initiate an Eagle Incidental Take Permit (EITP) with the Fish and Wildlife Service. In a very impressive and detailed presentation Sean began with, "Because of the proximity of the DLT to the Golden Eagle (GOEA) nest in South Valley Park (SVP), it seemed prudent to apply for an EITP to limit liability to the MA and insure the impacts to the eagles are thoroughly mitigated."

No matter your Docmann persuasion, this was an admirable thing Sean did for the community, especially in light of his concerns to "insure the impacts to the eagle are thoroughly mitigated" given that the onstruction was already approved - so therefore why not minimize impact? His presentation was timely since the Board was still able to exercise its right of rescission to cancel the contract. Sean explained that to continue the application, Fish and Wildlife would require an upfront sum applied to potential future fines associated with an eagle take(s). Furthermore, without the permit, there could be fines if there were a take. (I later learned through correspondence with Sean this would be limited to construction activity.)

Rather than express appreciation for this timely information, Seth Murphy (president) criticized Sean saying he did not understand why this application had been initiated and that Sean should have asked for Board approval. After some passionate public comments including Jim Fodor's reminder to the Board about their fiduciary responsibility to the community, each member agreed with Seth Murphy to 1) not pursue the EITP and; 2) not exercise

the right of rescission. It was surprising that this timely information did not move the Board to pause, take a deep breath, and objectively consider this new information especially in light of potential fines even without the EITP. So, thank you, Sean Warren, for being proactive, looking out for the community's best interests, and presenting this to the Board and those in attendance.

Dear Editor:

Concerns of a Mountain Biker. Watch out for trail agreements (Part Two). In the March 21 issue, I wrote an article about the lopsided agreement with the Willow Springs Community. They get to hike, ride bicycles and ride horses on trails exposed to over 3,000 acres of our foothills open space, and they have less than 300 acres to offer us for only 80 tag permits.

Overall, I think the Editor is great, but: An Editor's Note stated: "There are private and County roads that are adjacent to the Docmann Trail area, but the MA is not building a connection to those roads." My reply: Watch out, not yet? Editor's Note: "No trails extending from Docmann were approved." Again: Not Yet? Who would ever have thought the Docmann Loop Trail would be approved? Evidently, about half of the KCR homeowners didn't think so.

Editor's Note: "The Master Association remains committed to keeping our open space private." Without selling land the MA Board can still give up some important privileges. Someone selling a home in Willow Springs can advertise the KCR trails availability. If they had no agreement, they would be trespassing.

Please watch out for these possible trail proposals:

In the North: A trail which could connect with Jefferson County property between the hogback and C470.

In the North: A trail running up the hogback to Parcel A which the Master Association manages. (Parcel A is Jefferson County property.)

In the South: Trail(s) from the Docmann Loop Trail to Jefferson County property. Overall:

- Any trail agreement between us and Jefferson County.
- Any trail agreement between us and some other community or entity.
- Agreements with outside bicycle groups sanctioned by mountain bike advocates.
- A Willow Springs request for more tags. (They just asked the OSC in February.)
- What if Willow Springs signs an agreement with another community? The Master Association Board has a fiduciary responsibility to us. Trail construction, supervision, maintenance and weed control add to our dues, but probably the largest sacrifice is being made by the wildlife for which we have a commitment of good stewardship.

Dear Editor:

Here's my recap of the March 20 Master Association Board meeting.

Seth Murphy monopolized the discussions with his personal viewpoints (not those of residents), censored who could speak or ask questions when hands were raised, and spoke 90 percent of the time. He attended to his cell phone during Sean Warren's presentation and then inaccurately summarized it. Not a good listener! He initiated an argument with a North Ranch resident over the mailbox pads for no reason. Seth said that conservation residents are a minority, only about 49 percent, implying that our viewpoints don't matter. Wow! It's OK to have different viewpoints, but it's not OK to ignore 49 percent of those different viewpoints from residents that you supposedly represent.

Finally, he said he was "not interested in the fences." I guess that's why this difficult issue has not been resolved over the years. Listen Plains residents, and remember not to vote for him, if he runs for re-election next February.

Erlinda Stafford was also unable to listen and recognize opposing viewpoints from residents. She called all opposing comments on the Docmann Trail as "rhetoric" and said she was tired of listening to it. She inappropriately interrupted a resident speaking at the podium and ran from her seat, confronting her. Scary!

Dave Seagraves listened to residents and initiated action by agreeing to survey Heirloom Park and take photos of mailbox pads.

Sean presented new information that the Eagle Take Permit from U.S. Fish and Wildlife would cost \$22,000 to \$165,000 per year up to five years. The Board decided to withdraw the permit. It is not required. However, without the permit, Ken-Caryl (residents) would be liable for up to a \$250,000 fine, if the eagles leave due to the Docmann construction, disturbance and noise. Seth and Erlinda then questioned how would they know that construction caused the eagles to leave? Add legal fees for defense paid by residents again. The prudent, fiscally responsible, non-risky decision should have been to not build the Docmann. Seagraves was against building the Docmann because of costs. The Board will proceed with building the Docmann anyway.



After a threeyear study, the United Nations issued four new scientific reports about the state of biodiversity in The Americas, Asia-Pacific, Europe and Central Asia and Africa. Not surprisingly, nowhere is doing well.

"What's happening is the side effect of the world getting wealthier and more crowded with people." One thing humans need is more land. "And the way society has tried to achieve that has cut down on biodiversity." The article mentions that "crucial habitat has been cut apart, alien species have invaded places, chemicals have hurt plants and animals..."

Wait! As Ken-Caryl has become more crowded, the Trail Club believes they need more land for their bike trails. We are cutting apart crucial habitat, weeds have invaded our trails, and chemicals are hurting our plants and animals...! Currently, we are developing one of our last bit of undeveloped land not only on our property, but literally for miles to the north and the south. The cumulative effect of our trails is starting to have a noticeable negative effect on the biodiversity of our already imperiled foothills transition zone, but "we continue to borrow from the future to live well today."

We had a chance to make a difference, but the MA Board is still going on with its decision to build the Docmann Trail. This is a bike trail that most of us will never use, but its impact on the environment will be felt by many for generations to come. And, more trails are being planned! "There are 40 percent fewer plants and animals in the Americas than in the early 1700s." Don't let this trend continue here. We still can make a difference. Please voice your concerns to our current Board members now, otherwise the next article may be about us.

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
