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



Digesting the Community Survey

We received great feedback and data with the 2017 Resident Survey. The Community Planning Committee is in the process of digesting this data and information and formatting it into articles that will appear in later issues of the paper. As you may have noticed, we are also addressing some Frequently Asked Questions from the survey in each Life at Ken-Caryl issue.

I serve as the Metropolitan District staff liaison for the CPC and have been diving deeper into some of the feedback and concerns.

We are always striving to do and be better, to provide better service, greater value to the community, more cost-effective processes and more diverse offerings. As I began reading written comments, a common theme came through about subsidizing, or rather not subsidizing, specialized areas of programming. I realized that more can be done on our part to educate the community on the services and programs that are self-sustaining from fees and those that are paid for wholly or in part by taxes or dues. We will address this in detail in a future Frequently Asked Question and hopefully clarify some information.

As the District focuses on financial sustainability, we are working on creating tools that will help uniformly conduct a cost benefit analysis for individual programs and program areas. We will be gathering additional data in the form of participant surveys for certain program areas, focus group feedback and enrollment statistics. Our intent is to identify the programs that we know are self-sustaining and find out what makes them successful. Could this formula work with other areas of programming or are there certain services or programs that taxes should help cover? Creating a consistent process that all programs and District services can be evaluated by will help us plan for future funding or redirect funding as needed to better fit the community.

The point of letting you know all of this is really to say thank you. Thank you for taking time to respond to the survey and stay engaged in your community. It has given us a great jumping off point for program and service planning, and we want you to know that the data is helpful and will be put to good use. Please stay tuned for more FAQs and articles about the details of the survey results.

Trash and Recycling Totes: Residents have the option of using their own trash and recycling

containers/bags or using 96-gallon totes provided at no charge by Waste Connections. To order totes, send an email to kencarylco@wasteconnections.com, say that you want to sign up for totes, and provide your name, address, email address, and phone number. You can request both trash and recycling totes, just a trash tote, or just a recycling tote.

Holiday Trash Delays: Waste Connections observes the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, unless they fall on a weekend. If your normal pickup day falls on or after a holiday, your collection schedule will run one day late that week.

Auto-Dial Service: Waste Connections offers an auto-dial phone call service called Call Fire to notify customers of any changes in trash pickup days. You can sign up online at www.wcdenver.com/contact/. Complete the required information, and in the comment section say you are a Ken-Caryl resident seeking to sign up for the Call Fire service.

Architectural Approval

This time of year, we emerge from our winter dens and evaluate our spring and summer projects. Before we know it, it's construction season! Perhaps you received a letter late last year about your lawn and want to get ahead with some improvements; maybe you are finally ready to put in that hot tub you've always wanted; perhaps your neighbor installed something cool and you simply can't allow them to be cooler than you; whatever the external home

improvement project you have in mind or for whatever reason, it must be submitted to and approved by your Architectural Committee.

Having an approved submittal on file ensures that your plans have been reviewed and approved by the Master Association. A submittal records your work plan and can be accessed in part by future owners of your property. This is very helpful for maintenance and in some cases the sale of a property. Neighbors who admire the work done may ask for the colors or products you've used. They can contact us, and in many cases, we can get that information for them from the recorded submittals. Having unapproved external work on your property can delay the closing of a sale, or could result in costly re-work if the work is found to be out of compliance with the Architectural Rules and Regulations. If your neighbor has a complaint about the work you are doing or have done, an approved submittal on file can neutralize any concern they may have.

We will soon be making it even easier for you to submit your projects. Starting May 1, you can access information specific to the most common projects at the touch of a button! You will find rules, requirements and supporting documentation needed and you can submit your request straight from the website! We will still provide a paper form and manual submittals upon request. We want you to be able to make improvements to your home. This process through the website will help you get the approval you need as quickly as possible so you can get to work!

If you have any questions about a project you are planning, feel free to contact me for more information about submittals, approvals and timeframes.

North Ranch, Manor Ridge, Mountain Gate I, II, III, Sunset Ridge, The Enclave, and Settlement neighborhoods are subassociations with their own Architectural Committees and processes. Please reach out to those admins for details.

Inoperable Vehicle Clarification

You can report inoperable vehicles to either your association/subassociation admin or Jefferson County. If you suspect a vehicle on the street has been abandoned, you should contact Jefferson County Sherriff at their non-emergency line, 303-277-0211. If the vehicle is stolen or involved in illegal activity, Jeffco Sherriff is the appropriate agency to follow up. It's important that the reporting party contact the sheriff as opposed to the Master Association. The deputy will likely have additional questions that we cannot answer on your behalf.

Reporting to your association management will result in a curbside inspection to verify the report and assess the appropriate action. If the vehicle is found to be in violation, the property where the vehicle is parked will receive a letter, which begins the Violation Policy.

In some cases, both options may be prescribed. If you're not sure, please contact Jenny Bernal at jennyb@ kcranch.org or 303-979-1876, ext. 113, or your neighborhood's property management company.

• Board Meeting Summary

Joint Study Session

On April 3, the Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards held a Joint Study Session and discussed the following items:

- · Staff provided an update on the Ranch House Pool project. The Boards reviewed an initial updated concept design and rough cost estimates. The Board discussed additional information they would like to see tracked moving forward. This information will help advise the community on the cost of certain amenities so the Boards and residents can make final decisions on what to include. Staff also provided an update on recruiting a builder. An RFQ was issued at the end of March and submittals are due April 11. Staff are hoping to have recommendations for both Boards later in April and at the May Joint Study Session.
- The Boards received copies of and reviewed the Volunteer Trail Coordinator Program 2018 Planned Projects Summary.



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



What Is the Process for Covenant **Enforcement?**

Living in a covenant community means that residents agree to maintain their properties to standards as established by the governing documents for the Master Association. The Master Association oversees covenant enforcement for most neighborhoods on Ken-Caryl Ranch. However, if a neighborhood has a subassociation (Enclave, Manor Ridge, Mountain Gate, North Ranch, Settlement, Sunset Ridge), then covenant enforcement is relinquished to that subassociation.

The Community Standards Administrator, Jenny Bernal, and a helper conduct drive-by, curbside inspections in each neighborhood at least once per month during the winter months and twice during the summer. Each neighborhood is visited at least one more time throughout the month during random audits, follow-up inspections, complaints, status, etc. When staff reviews the neighborhoods, it is a drive-by, curbside inspection. The intent behind these inspections is to proactively monitor the neighborhoods for aesthetics.

If there is a violation, a first letter is sent. The first letter in the violation process notifies the homeowner and tenant, if applicable, that a violation was observed on their property with a 10-day cure date (cure times can vary depending on the violation) and to open up the discussion to determine a reasonable cure date. In some cases, a courtesy contact email is sent prior to the first violation notice. Staff is reasonable and understanding, and a quick email or phone call from the resident explaining the situation (plan to cure, timeline, extenuating circumstances, etc.) is usually all that is needed.

When staff comes back around again and there doesn't appear to be improvement, a follow-up letter is sent. The second letter indicates what action may be taken by the MA if the violation persists. The third letter is a notice that if the violation is not cured by the

hearing date, the violation will be presented to the Covenant Control Committee, who will then determine what further action will be necessary. The Covenant Committee has the authority to impose a special monthly charge of \$50 (which may result in a lien on the property if the fine is not paid), suspend the right of the owner and family, etc. to use Association property, cause the violation to be cured at the owner's expense, or obtain injunctive relief. The Covenant Committee discusses and determines which actions are appropriate to prescribe based on the circumstances.



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Ranger Field Notes

Calling Rangers with Wildlife Concerns

Ken-Caryl Ranch Park Rangers have received a few injured wildlife calls in the past few weeks. When a wildlife injury call is received, Rangers may investigate as time allows or determine over the phone if

the animal should be left alone to let nature take its course. If the injury is minor for a small mammal or bird, our advice may also be to take it to a licensed rehabilitator.

The Rangers use the same policy as Colorado Parks and Wildlife. If a deer/elk is injured but can still feed and walk on its own, then we let nature take its course. However, if the deer/elk is injured to the point it cannot feed or walk on its own, listing to one side, head/ears lowered, then Rangers will respond to euthanize the animal (if on duty) or direct the caller to contact Colorado Parks and Wildlife.

PARK RANGERS (303-979-1876, ext. 170) will only handle deer/elk. As time allows, a report of an injured or sick deer will be reviewed and any dead deer will be removed as soon as possible depending on the time of day and

availability of a Park Ranger on duty. Many factors play into the response time including where the Ranger is on duty, trails, proximity to a truck, time of day, etc.

JEFFERSON COUNTY ANIMAL CONTROL (303-271-5070) will remove

any dead animals and advise on any other injured animals, for example, rabbits, squirrels, raccoons, etc.

Park Rangers keep a call log when reports come in referencing sightings and/or concerns about animals in the open space and private property. The log assists the Rangers in detecting a pattern of behavior or injured activity of a certain animal and can report that information to follow-up calls with staff, Colorado Parks and Wildlife officers, or residents.

Due to infectious diseases and calls in the past, Park Rangers will advise the resident to contact Jefferson County Animal Control, and they may assist with any concerns and/or advise to call to the Jefferson County Health Department or Colorado Parks and Wildlife, too. • Resident Survey

Community Planning Committee to **Highlight Resident Survey Results**

In addition to the Resident Survey Frequently Asked Questions that have been in the last few issues of the paper, the Community Planning Committee will feature survey results for the various sections of the 2017 Resident Survey. The information is intended to highlight some key results from the survey. This issue will give an overview of the survey methodology and response rates, and the next issue of the paper will highlight community demographics and reasons moved to Ken-Caryl Ranch.

The purpose of the Resident Survey was to gather public feedback on Ken-Caryl Ranch's facilities, amenities, services, programs and community appearance. This survey effort served as a follow-up to the 2012 survey. The 2017 survey provides measures of improvement over the past five years, as well as areas that warrant further attention in order to meet resident expectations.

Residents were either sent a postcard or email invitation to complete the survey online. All households were given the option to complete a paper version of the survey if preferred. Of the combined 4,400 invitations sent, 1,814 respondents completed the survey (396 from the postcard invitation and 1,418 from the email invitation), for a response rate of 41

Chris Cares with RRC & Associates, the survey contractor, had the following to say about the response rate, "With respect to response rates, the responses from residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch are among the highest we ever see from community surveys. While I don't have an overall average response level, I would say 12 to 15 percent is more typical for community surveys at the present time. Response rates have gone down, and community involvement has declined in recent years in many areas. These shifts are in response to a proliferation of surveys and many competing demands on household time. Therefore, I conclude that you have a high level of community participation and interest in KC Ranch, and a large enough sample to provide broad representation of community opinions."





Community **Recycling & Cleanup Event May 5**

The Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association is pleased to offer the annual Community Recycling & Cleanup Event on May 5 from 8:30 a.m. to 2 p.m. in the Ranch House Parking Lot.

Who Can Bring Items to the Event?

The event is for Ken-Caryl residents and businesses only.

How Much Does It Cost to Recycle Items?

The event is FREE except for a \$10 cashonly fee for hard-drive destruction.

What are the Details on Paper Shredding?

Paper shredding is limited to three file boxes or one trash bag. Cross-cut shredding will be done on-site by Shred-It. It is offered for free to residents this year thanks to Eva Stadelmaier with Re/ Max Professionals.

Are There Items That Can't Go in the Chipper?

- No branches larger in diameter than 10
- No junipers they just shred and do not produce useable mulch
- No wood products such as fence boards, posts, plywood, signs, etc. Most end up having nails or other hardware, and it becomes a danger to the operators and will damage the equipment.

What Type of Paint Can I Recycle?

Our paint recycling partner, GreenSheen, can accept latex or water-based paint and stain in original containers only. Oil-based paint will not be accepted. The company can't take paint or stain that is not in the original container.



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

Fueling the Fire: Fuels in Wildfire

Fuel is any organic material that is living or dead that can ignite and burn. Fuels are found in almost infinite combinations of kind, amount, size, shape, position and arrangement.

The fuel on a given acre may vary from a few hundred pounds of sparse grass to 100 or more tons of trees and houses. Fuels may consist of dense conifer crown, deep litter and duff, moss layers and underground peat, or a mixture of any of these, forming a fuel complex. We can estimate potential fire behavior in Ken-Caryl by analyzing the density and physical characteristics of the fuels which surround us.

Vegetation as Fuel

Different kinds of vegetation burn in different ways. Fires in fine fuels (such as grasses, leaf litter and pine needles) ignite easily and burn through quickly, but with low to moderate intensity. Fires in heavy fuels (such as brush, timber and houses), though they may not ignite as readily, burn with much greater intensity and for longer duration. Regardless of the species, areas where large amounts of dead and down woody material that have built up will burn with greater intensity and cause the fire to spread more rapidly.

The density of the vegetation also has a large influence on wildfire. In general, the denser the vegetation, the greater the intensity of the fire and the greater the rate of spread. Arrangement of the fuel is another key factor. If fuels are continuous (i.e. the vegetation extends across an area more or less uninterrupted by topography such as rocks), the fire can spread relatively unchecked. Areas that have several layers of fuels generally burn with more intensity than areas with less fuel continuity.

Fuel Levels and Components


A systematic approach to looking at wildfire fuels is to divide it into three broad groups or levels—ground, surface and aerial fuels.


Aerial Fuels: All green and dead materials located in the upper tree canopy, including tree branches and crowns, and tall shrubs. When aerial fuels are present, we are concerned with crown or canopy closure (branches in contact with other trees), which allows the rapid movement of the flame front through an area. Strong winds may drive the wildfire across the tops of trees, rapidly expanding the fire. Closed canopy stands that are greater than six feet in height, whether timber or tall shrubs, offer the best opportunity for a running crown fire.

Surface Fuels: All materials lying on or immediately above the ground, including needles or leaves, duff, grass, small dead wood, downed logs, stumps, large limbs, low shrubs, and landscaping around our homes. Surface fuels are less compact than ground fuels and have other characteristics more favorable for faster rates of spread. Surface fuels include litter, grass and shrubs to about six feet in height. If no aerial fuels are present, surface fuels have an open environment subject to stronger winds and more heating and drying by the heat of the

Ground Fuels: All combustible materials lying beneath the surface, including deep duff, roots, rotten buried logs and other woody fuels. Ground fuels are important to firefighters due to persistent fires burning below the surface.

The three major factors that have the greatest influence on the behavior of wildfire are weather, topography and the fuels presented here. Weather is a variable we cannot control; the wind will blow, dry periods will occur, and wildfire conditions can occur year-round. Topography can only be controlled to a limited extent. The fuels around our homes in Ken-Caryl can be easily mitigated in many ways to reduce the potential for wildfire in our neighborhoods.

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


