The program pairs a student with a special needs student during PE. Often these relationships last throughout high school and transcend into different high school activities.

Morgan has been working with the same Unified student since her freshman year. In

her junior year they planned a Trick or Treat room together, incorporating the Unified student's passion about endangered species. This year she organized the campaign "Spread the Word to End the Word" at Chatfield intended to educate and eradicate offensive language aimed at challenged students. Morgan also is involved in Alliance at Chatfield as well as one of the Varsity Cheer captains. Morgan is attending Colorado Christian University this fall.

With the exciting passage of the 5A Bond Issue, many usage and design needs for our facilities and amenities must be closely assessed in a short period of time. Volunteers are needed to work in Project Groups to develop input in the planning stages for improvements to the various facilities, playgrounds, landscaping and more. The Project Groups will work with the Community Planning Committee, which will obtain community input, refine the findings, prioritize and report to the Boards. All recommendations will be publicly communicated. The Metro District will review the bond project recommendations and community feedback and direct the work of the architect(s). **Please email your specific area(s) of interest and your area(s) of expertise to District Manager Darrell Windes at darrellw@kcranch.org.** All help is welcome.

The Community Planning Committee, a joint committee of the Master Association and Metro District, may soon be expanded and has potential openings. **Applications are due Monday, June 23.** The committee develops and monitors implementation of the long-range Community Master Plan, which includes the bond-financed project concepts recently approved. It solicits, analyzes and communicates community feedback for the MD and MA Boards' use in decision-making. It meets up to two times monthly and 75 percent participation is expected. 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Manager's Column

It's hard to believe that we are already halfway through the year. Summer is off to a great start on Ken-Caryl Ranch, and you will see many dues-funded projects in the works. As part of our routine maintenance, the Ranch House parking lot was seal-coated and striped at the end of May. A new concrete surface was poured for the basketball court by the Ranch House, making it a great place for a pickup game with your neighbors. The 2014 asphalt to concrete path conversion will be completed in June. These are just a few examples of projects that are happening.

There is some development activity in the Business Center. The Embry Apartments and Come Sit Stay Pet Resort are both under construction. The first units of the apartments are scheduled for occupancy in early 2015, and Come Sit Stay Pet Resort should be open later this summer. GarageTown's first site is nearing completion, and the company has purchased additional land next to their current facility for a second site. Land across from the apartments is under contract with the intent to build a senior/assisted-living facility. The vacant land south of Sonic and KeyBank is planned to become a small shopping strip center.

All three Ken-Caryl Ranch Pools are open, and I encourage everyone to come out and enjoy a swim with your neighbors. This summer's first pool-side special event is the Music a la Mode concert on Wednesday, June 11 from 6-8 p.m. at the Ranch House Pool. This fun family event will feature music by the Jay and Neil Show, face painting, balloon sculptures, bounce houses, ice-cream and much more.

The annual "Not Just Electronics" Recycling Event was held May 10 at the Ranch House. More than 600 cars came through the parking lot, bringing 10,517 pounds of paper, 5,980 pounds of metal, 18,840 pounds of electronics, 1,670 gallons of paint, 61 tires and 7,695 cubic feet of trash. The event wouldn't be possible without our partners: R2 Stewardship, Waste Connections, GreenSheen and Eagle Automotive. Huge thanks go out to volunteer coordinator Cath Perrone and all of the other resident volunteers who helped the event run smoothly.

Important Reminders From Waste Connections

Auto Dial Service: Waste Connections, the trash and recycling services provider for Ken-Caryl Ranch offers an auto dial service to notify customers of any changes in trash pickup days. If you are interested in being notified through this service, you can sign up online by visiting www.wcdenver.com. Once you are at www.wcdenver.com, please click on contact tab. Complete the required information, click on Residential Trash Service, then in the comment section at the bottom

of the page explain that you are a Ken-Caryl resident seeking to sign up for the Call Fire service.

Delayed Trash Days: Waste Connections observes the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, unless they fall on a weekend day. If your normal pick-up day falls on a holiday or after a holiday, your collection schedule will run one day late that week.

Recycling Notes: Please remember to have your trash and recycling curbside by 7 a.m. on your collection day. Trash and recycling should be placed four feet apart from each other at the curb. Waste Connections will pick up individual bags or service totes/cans which homeowners have individually purchased. Recycling containers need to be clearly marked as recycling. Waste Connections has provided recycling stickers which can be placed on any purchased container. If you need a sticker please visit the Ranch House or Community Center. Single Stream Recycling means that glass, plastic, tin, and aluminum and paper products may all be placed in the same container.

Coyotes Active On Ken-Caryl Ranch

It has been a quiet March and April regarding reported coyote sightings from residents. In years past, activity was usually in full swing and coyotes could be observed anywhere in the open space or on private property by now.



In fact we have only received two reports since February, but a call in May from a resident stated a coyote was observed in Bran-non-Gearhart Park hunting next to the cement trail. As the user approached the coyote didn't move. This activity is normal, especially this time of year with mating, denning and pups emerging in late May.

Coyotes in populated areas can be less fearful of people, and they have been known to attack pets and approach people too closely. Colorado Parks and Wildlife has put together the following information regarding co-existing with coyotes and hazing techniques.

Hazing is an activity, or series of activities, conducted in an attempt to change the behaviors of habituated coyotes or to establish or maintain a healthy wariness of humans in local coyote populations. Low intensity hazing can be performed by everyone at the community level. Residents should be encouraged to participate when coyotes are on their property or when coyotes approach too closely.

Low Intensity Hazing Can Include:

- Yelling and clapping.
- Banging pots and pans together.
- Throwing rocks and sticks.
- Spraying with garden hoses, water guns and sprinklers.
- Using noise-making devices (air horns, whistles, cans filled with pennies, etc.).
- Installing motion-sensor lights.
- Motion-sensor sprinkler systems.
- Using deterrent sprays.

If A Coyote Approaches You:

- Do not run or turn your back.
- Be as big and loud as possible.
- Wave your arms and throw objects.
- Face the coyote and back away slowly.
- If attacked, fight back.

Protect Your Pets:

- Keep pets on a short leash.
- Use extra caution dusk through dawn.

- Avoid known or potential den sites and thick vegetation.
- Do not allow dogs to interact with coyotes.

If You Have Concerns About An Encounter With a Coyote:

- Recreate during daylight hours.
- Walk with a walking stick.
- Keep a deterrent spray handy.
- Carry noisemakers or rocks to throw.

Avoid Coyote Conflicts In Your Neighborhood:

- Never feed coyotes!
- Remove attractants from your yard, including pet food, water sources, birdfeeders and fallen fruit.
- Secure trash in a container with a locking lid or put trash out on the morning of pickup.
- Never approach wildlife. If a coyote approaches, yell, throw rocks or sticks at it, spray with a hose, or bang pots and pans.

Your Pet & Coyotes:

- Keep pets on a six-foot leash when walking.
- Never allow your pets to "play" with a coyote.
- Pick up small pets if confronted by a coyote.
- Always supervise your pet when outside, especially at dawn or dusk.
- Never leave cats or dogs outside after dark.
- Don't leave pet food outside.
- If you must leave your pet outside, secure it in a fully-enclosed kennel.

Many trails on Ken-Caryl Ranch are private, and only residents and their accompanied guests are allowed to use these trails. To be easily identified as a resident, you can wear an Open Space ID Bracelet. To obtain your own blue ID bracelet, go to the Ranch House Recreation Office or the Community Center. You will need to complete a registration form and provide proof of residency. There is no cost.

Board Summaries

MA Board Meeting

The following is a summary of items from the May 14 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- The Board discussed the investment in the community plan including the processes to implement the successful Bond Issue Ballot question. Further discussion will take place at the June Study Session.
- The Board agreed to allow the Veterans Monument Committee to sell the old flag poles from in front of the Ranch House after they purchase new ones to be installed as part of the Monument.
- The Board received a request to make a donation to the Veterans Monument Committee from the income from the Equestrian Center. The request was not supported.
- The Board discussed a request to allow political party caucus signs to be displayed on Master Association property and then referred the request to the Architectural Committee.
- **Manager's Report:** A written report was included in the Board package.
- **Committees:** Board member committee liaisons reported on the activities that their committees have been engaged in for the past month.
- **Motion:** A motion selecting AGE as our trails grading contractor for 2014, 2015 and 2016 was approved.
- **Motion:** A motion authorizing staff to purchase a Ford F-450 Truck with dump body from AutoNation was approved. The cost is \$41,525, and the Reserves budget is \$40,170.
- **Motion:** A motion appointing members of the Community Planning Committee was tabled.
- **Motion:** A motion authorizing the Board President to sign the Encroachment License Agreement for 36 Mountain Laurel was approved.

MD Board Meeting

On May 27, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District held a Regular Meeting of the Board of Directors and discussed the following items and took the following actions:

- The District Manager reported to the Board that the District has made a formal request to Jefferson County to prepare a new long-term lease for the Community Center. The initial 35-year term of the Community Center lease expires in December of 2026 with a provision in the lease for the renewal for an additional 35 years.
- The Board took action to accept the Canvass Board's Official results from the May 6 election. District voters approved Ballot Issue 5A, which authorizes the District to issue up to \$7.9 million in municipal bonds to finance improvements to the facilities and landscaping on Ken-Caryl Ranch. At the same election, voters elected Directors Bob Generoli and Dave Banning to serve new

four-year terms on the Board and Director Jami Jensen to serve a new two-year term on the Board.

- The Board also took action to appoint new officers for the Board of Directors, as follows: Bob Generoli, President; Lauri Lehan-Milano, Vice-President; Jami Jensen, Treasurer; Dave Banning, Secretary; and Jeff Esbenschade, Assistant Treasurer. Directors Banning and Jensen took new oaths of office. Director Generoli was absent and excused from the meeting and will take his oath of office in early June.
- The Board received a presentation from Alan Matlosz with the firm of George K. Baum and Company regarding considerations for the future possible issuance of bonds following the May 6 election.
- The Board also received a presentation from the District's legal counsel on a proposed amendment to the 1988 Reorganization Agreement between the District and Master Association. The proposed amendment would clarify the use of possible municipal bond proceeds for improving Master Association owned facilities, signage and landscaping. Following discussion, the Board requested several changes to the proposed amendment. The Board took action to approve the proposed amendment as modified for submission to the Master Association Board of Directors for its comments.
- The Board discussed the future role of the Community Planning Committee in assisting the Board with recommendations for project priorities for the possible issuance of debt authorized by the May 6 election. The Board gave direction to the Community Planning Committee to provide assistance in developing plans and strategies for implementation of the recently approved bond financing by the voters. The next meeting of the Community Planning Committee is scheduled for June 2.
- The Board received its monthly update on fundraising efforts for the Veterans Monument.
- The Youth Services Supervisor updated the Board on the upcoming community build playground project at the Community Park scheduled for Saturday, May 31.
- The District Manager reported that all pools on the Ranch opened for the 2014 season on Saturday, May 24.

- The Board took action to approve an amended Community Garden Use Agreement with the Ken-Caryl Ranch Foundation.
- The District Manager updated the Board on the 2013 audit. The 2013 draft audit will be presented to the Board at the June 24 Board meeting. In anticipation of this discussion, the Board took action to open the public hearing on a 2013 proposed supplemental budget that will be discussed and considered by the Board as part of the June 24 Board meeting audit discussion.

- The District's Parks Director updated the Board on recent drainage repairs completed in Greenbelt W.
- The District Manager updated the Board on efforts from staff to review the lighting in the indoor tennis building for energy efficiencies. Staff plans to present a report at the June Board meeting with specific recommendations for further consideration by the Board.
- Staff updated the Board on several recent staffing changes for the District in the Parks and Recreation Departments.

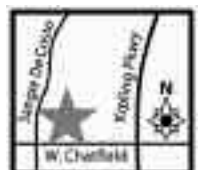

Prairie Dog Task Force Underway

In March, notices were placed in *Life at Ken-Caryl* and the e-News about the creation of a Prairie Dog Task Force (PDTF). The primary purpose of the PDTF is to develop a conservation policy for Ken-Caryl Ranch Open Space and Parks staff use that recognizes the ecological significance of the black-tailed prairie dog within the prairie ecosystem, while addressing the concerns of private landowners and residents, considering other wildlife species and preserving the conservation values for which open space was established.

Five residents were appointed by the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board to serve on the PDTF, and the group has begun

meeting. The residents represent a variety of viewpoints on the subject of prairie dogs. A specialized consultant hired by KCRMA will work with staff to facilitate the development of a recommended policy and provide background and history on de facto prairie dog management on open space and park lands. It is envisioned that regular meetings will be held each month and the task shall be completed in four months with the recommended policy to be presented to the Board for adoption. 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Celebrating 100 Years

The Good Life On Ken-Caryl Ranch In The 1970s

Development planning for Ken-Caryl Ranch began in 1972. By January 1977 about 50 families had moved into new homes in the sub-developments surrounding the Ranch House, with an additional 110 families on the Ranch by August of that year. With the formation of a neighborhood, the first families organized and participated in a variety of social functions during those early years: Easter egg hunts, Christmas parties, a casino night, parades, pool openings, tennis camps, organized hikes and art shows.

One sport that was popular in the 1970s was Frisbee golf. A parcel of land was set aside to the west of the Ranch House for a disc golf course. The community hosted the Ken-Caryl Ranch Qualifying Tournament on April 7-8, 1979. Qualified players went to California to compete for \$50,000 in prize money. John Bird won the Ken-Caryl tournament, and today is a professional in disc golf, designing courses and playing in tournaments. There is even a Professional Disc Golf Asso-

ciation that began in 1976.

Ken-Caryl in the 1970s was relatively remote from nearby suburbs. A segment of Kipling St. bounded the east side of the development. To the north Kipling Parkway ended at Jewell Ave., and was only slowly making progress south toward Hampden Ave. in 1980. Centennial Parkway (C-470) was not even started until 1982. Access was via Ken Caryl Ave. to Wadsworth Boulevard.

Despite the limited access, some companies saw opportunity in the area. Near the

intersection of Kipling and Chatfield Ave., the Ken-Caryl Medical Center opened for business in August 1977. Also in 1977 the Market Place at Ken-Caryl, the Gingerbread House Daycare, and the first commercial buildings in the Trade Center south of Chatfield broke ground.

In 1980, Ken-Caryl entered a new phase with the opening of the Valley portion of the Ranch. In March, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Corp. announced plans to sell the Manor House and 1,200 acres of land in the Valley for devel-

opment. The large relief table map that is still in the Ranch House shows the plans from this time. The herd of Black Angus cattle was moved off of the pastureland in the Valley and the barns were slated to become the core of an Equestrian Center. On May 18, a grand opening event kicked off the sale of North Ranch sites for custom homes. To the east, new homes in Quail Ridge, the Settlement, the Spread, the Village, Sunset Ridge and the Territory brought in more families to enjoy the unique pleasures of the Ranch.

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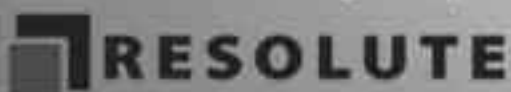

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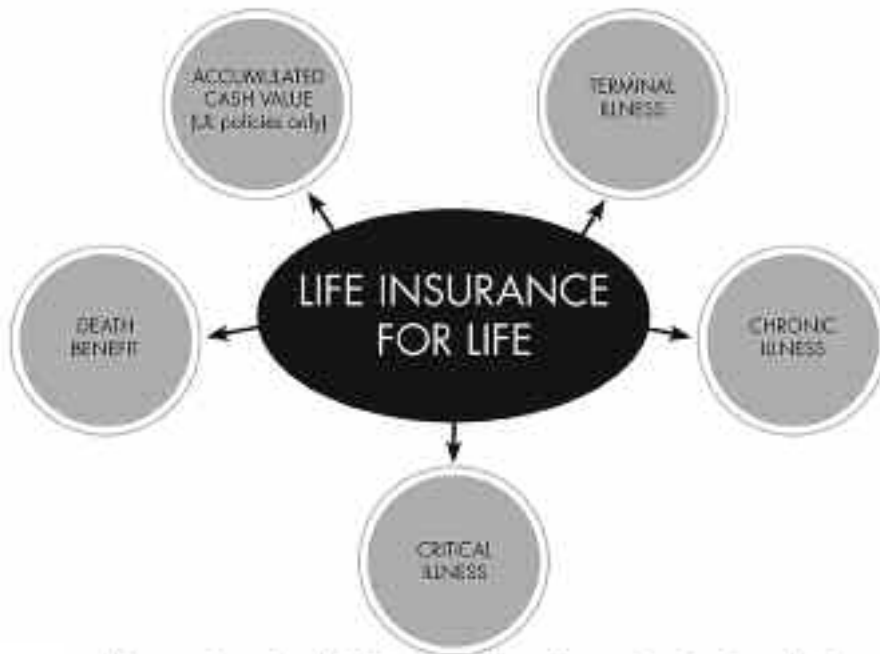

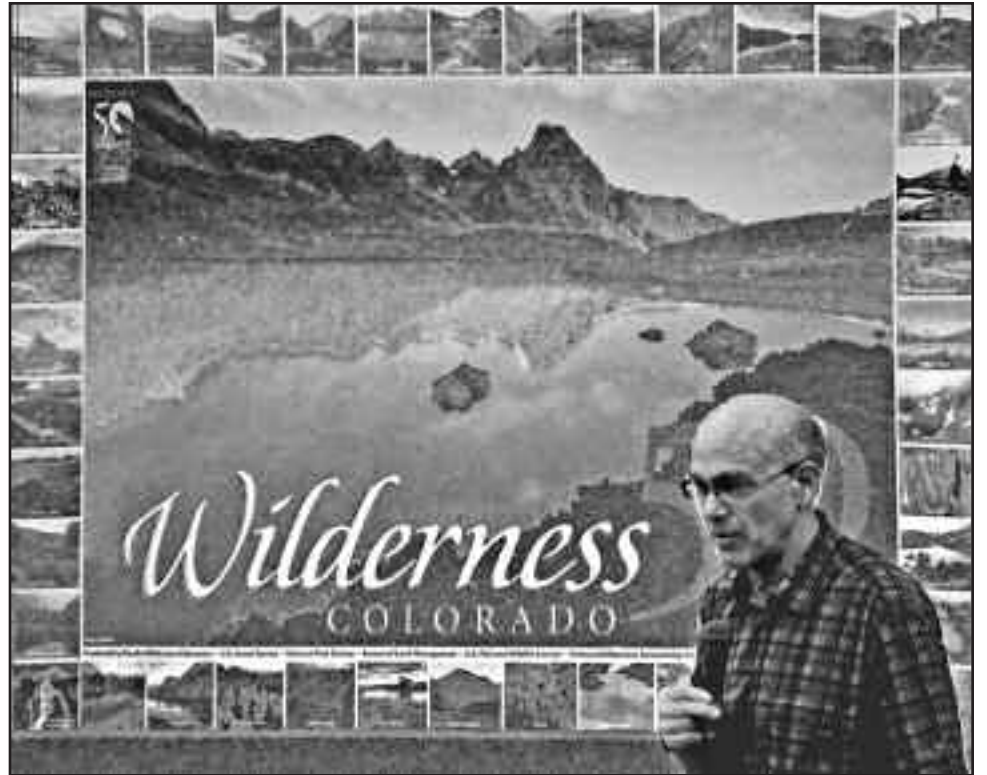
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of his life on the trail.

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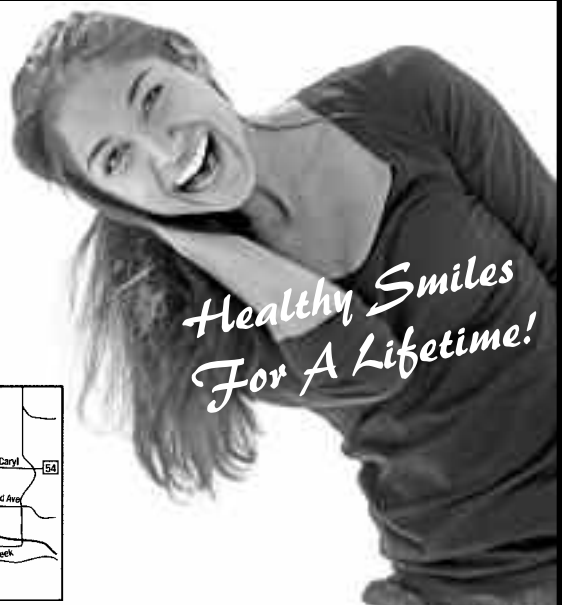
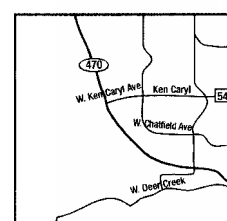

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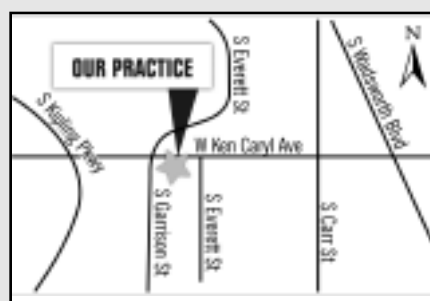

Tent Caterpillar

Have you ever been hiking and noticed a big, web-like blob in a tree or shrub that was full of caterpillars? If so, you found the larvae of the tent caterpillar, not a spider web! Generally, this white silken tent can be found shortly after the plant starts to bud.

In Colorado, tent caterpillars will lay their eggs on shrubs like the chokecherry, moun-

tain mahogany, serviceberry and currant. The tree or shrub they choose to call home is usually called the host. While attached to the host, these hairy little larvae live and feed as a colony, enlarging the tent as they grow. The tent provides a shelter, protection and a place to molt. The larvae mature in 30-42 days, depending on weather conditions, then advance to the pupal stage which lasts 12-18 days. Adults (moths) emerge usually in late July to early August. Moths are reddish brown to yellow, tan or gray.

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Resident Launches Business Serving Adults With Developmental Disabilities

Don't tell Bryn Galisewski that her generation lacks motivation! Bryn, who grew up on Ken-Caryl Ranch, is a 2009 graduate of Chatfield Senior High and a 2013 Colorado State University graduate. She is pursuing her life's

passion by launching a center in Littleton that serves adults with developmental disabilities: Stepping Stone Support Center.

Inspired by her classmates in high school, Bryn pursued a degree from Colorado State University in human development and fam-

ily studies. An emphasis on occupational therapy further qualified her for her future entrepreneurial venture. After graduating in 2013, and after a mission to Africa, she became laser focused on the lack of resources for developmentally disabled adults in her own backyard. In October 2013, with the backing and support of friends and family, she launched Stepping Stone Support Center, located at 9700 Old Coal Mine Ave. next to Fun City and inside the Columbine Hills Church of the Nazarene.

Unlike some day programs that are available for this community, Stepping Stone aggressively pursues the mission of assisting participants in becoming productive and active members of society with pre-vocational training, physical activities and interactive social events.

"There are many resources available for this population through age 21, but upon graduation from high school, you tend to find yourself suddenly stranded: your child is now an adult with few options for employment, social interaction or stimulating activities in the community," said Lynn Fiedorowicz, mother of a young man who recently graduated from the Jefferson County high school system. "Stepping Stone and Bryn have been so good for Jaime in fostering friendships, socialization and work experiences, as well as community involvement right here in our backyard. The program and the participants have provided purpose and a place in his life, and is indeed a stepping stone to the independent, active, community-engaged life that we envision for Jaime."

Stepping Stone is designed to guide participants in finding and fulfilling their potential in life. "We believe that each adult has the right to provide for themselves and to gain autonomy through peer interaction, personal skill development and community involvement. My personal experience with these amazing and loving individuals has inspired me to help them get to the next phase of their lives," said Bryn.

Stepping Stone is not a place to "park" an individual from morning to evening or to just keep busy. A schedule is developed

unique to each participant: their hours and activities are chosen by and for them. Above all, Stepping Stone wants to see its participants become productive members of society. Their path to that goal is uniquely theirs, but Stepping Stone is there to be a guide as they travel that path.

Stepping Stone has acquired a center that includes a home base with space for technology, a variety of hands-on activities and comfortable places to just hang out. Just steps away, there is access to a large kitchen, a gymnasium and a coffee shop. The center's host (Columbine Hills Church of the Nazarene) has a food pantry and community garden where Stepping Stone's participants can get valuable work experience. Participants include those that are funded by government, private pay and grants.

Waiting lists and limited funding are a fact of life for adults with disabilities. A supporting non-profit, Lexi & Carly & Friends, raises funds to help those with a lack of financial resources. As funds permit, this non-profit will provide participation stipends, based on the family's need and the services desired. Stepping Stone also engages volunteers to donate time, transportation and talents to support the paid staff and to make services available to more participants. Volunteers receive the same training and background clearance as paid staff.
