KCRMD Board Selects Owner's Representative Firm For Bond Projects

Following a month-long competitive solicitation and interview process, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District (KCRMD) Board of Directors held a special Board meeting on Thursday, Sept. 4 to make the final selection of an Owner's Representative to assist both the KCRMD and the Master Association in

overall management of the improvements that will be funded through tax-exempt bond proceeds of \$7.9 million.

The KCRMD Board of Directors awarded the job of Owner's Representative to the firm of VANIR Construction Management, Inc. Over its 30-year history, 90 percent of VANIR's business has been providing owner's representative/project management services to

public sector clients like KCRMD.

VANIR will be responsible for managing all aspects of the bond improvements that were approved by voters on May 6 for the Ranch House, the Community Center and Dakota Lodge, including planning, design/engineering, governmental approvals, construction, furniture and fixtures, equipment, and coordination for all construction/renovation sites for the projects. VANIR's duties will also include developing master program schedules, budgets, and cost control services throughout the projects. Community leaders met with VANIR earlier this week to kick off the scheduling and planning for community improvements.

KCRMD Completes Sale Of \$7.9 Million In Tax-Exempt Bonds

This past week, the Ken-Caryl Ranch Metropolitan District completed the sale of \$7.9 million in tax-exempt municipal bonds. By selling the bonds at this time, the KCRMD was able to take advantage of historically low interest rates to finance upgrades to the Ranch House, Community Center, Dakota Lodge, new entrance signage, and landscape and irrigation system improvements.

The bonds, which were offered initially for sale to residents of Ken-Caryl Ranch in \$5,000 increments, were authorized by voters in May of 2014 to fund improvements to the infrastructure of the community that is approaching 40 years of age. The bonds have a maturity of 10 years and are exempt from both federal and Colorado state tax to residents of Colorado. George K. Baum & Company served as underwriter for the transaction. The closing on the bonds is scheduled for Sept. 30.

Continental Divide Road has been undergoing repairs the last couple weeks, and it is scheduled to be repaved soon, weather permitting. Fall Family Flu Immunization Clinic

The Colorado Flu Shot Company will be providing the four-strain (Quadrivalent), preservative-free flu vaccine for ages six months to adult at the Community Center this fall. The four-strain (Quadrivalent) has two strains of Influenza A and two strains of Influenza B. This provides better coverage, especially for children. Approximately 25 percent of the total 2014-2015 flu vaccine is available as Quadrivalent. The protection from the influenza vaccine lasts one year.

Parental consent is required for individuals under 18 years old. Vaccinations will be provided by a Pediatric RN. The Colorado Flu Shot Company also provides other vaccinations including those for international travel (yellow fever, typhoid, meningococcal, polio). A travel appointment is necessary. 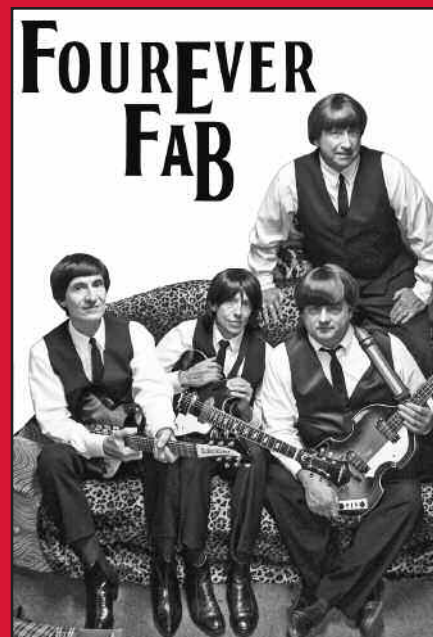

Important Reminders From Waste Connections

- Auto Dial Service:** Waste Connections, the trash and recycling services provider for Ken-Caryl Ranch offers an auto dial service to notify customers of any changes in trash pickup days. If you are interested in being notified through this service, you can sign up online by visiting www.wcdenver.com. Once you are at www.wcdenver.com, please click on contact tab. Complete the required information, click on Residential Trash Service, then in the comment section at the bottom of the page explain that you are a Ken-Caryl resident seeking to sign up for the Call Fire service.
- Delayed Trash Days:** Waste Connections observes the following holidays: New Year's Day, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day and Christmas Day, unless they fall on a weekend day. If your normal pick-up day falls on a holiday or after a holiday, your collection schedule will run one day late that week.
- Recycling Notes:** Please remember to have your trash and recycling curbside by 7 a.m. on your collection day. Trash and recycling should be placed four feet apart from each other at the curb. Waste Connections will pick up individual bags or service totes/cans which homeowners have individually purchased. Recycling containers need to be clearly marked as recycling. Waste Connections has provided recycling stickers which can be placed on any purchased container. If you need a sticker please visit the Ranch House or Community Center. Single Stream Recycling means that glass, plastic, tin, and aluminum and paper products may all be placed in the same container.

Architectural Accents

Expanding Your Home

It is entirely possible to create more space in your home. Many additions to homes on Ken-Caryl Ranch have been built over the years. If you have been thinking of building an addition onto your home, bumping an exterior wall out or expanding the exterior in any way, it surely is a reasonable option.

Information regarding such improvements can be found in Section 3.02 of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Home Improvement Rules,

Guidelines and Information, which outlines the requirements that must be submitted for architectural review. Submittals shall include: site and grading plans, location and setbacks, floor plans, exterior elevations showing all materials and colors, an engineered foundation plan, and a small review fee. In addition, it is of course the responsibility of the homeowner to acquire all the necessary permits from Jefferson County and adhere to all of the County regulations.

Ranger Field Notes

Mountain Lions On Ken-Caryl Ranch

Rangers are always asked by trail users and property owners about mountain lions on Ken-Caryl Ranch. Mainly, where are they and are they seen often? Living in lion country can mean different things to different people — some residents live in mountain lion habitat and some people just recreate there. Either way, it's important for people to be aware and know the basics.



As excerpts of the Colorado Parks and Wildlife article below state, be sure to protect yourself and property in lion country. If you happen to see one in the area, consider yourself fortunate. The accompanying lion picture was taken by a trail camera in the Ken-Caryl Ranch open space on Aug. 17.

If You Encounter A Mountain Lion

Remember: Every situation is different with respect to the lion, the terrain, the people and their activity.

- When you walk or hike in mountain lion country, go in groups and make plenty of noise to reduce your chances of surprising a lion. A sturdy walking stick is a good idea; it can be used to ward off a lion. Make sure children are close to you and within your sight at all times. Talk with children about lions and teach them what to do if they meet one.
- Do not approach a lion, especially one

that is feeding or with kittens. Most mountain lions will try to avoid a confrontation. Give them a way to escape.

- STAY CALM** when you come upon a lion. Talk calmly yet firmly to it. Move slowly.
 - STOP OR BACK AWAY SLOWLY**, if you can do it safely. Running may stimulate a lion's instinct to chase and attack. Face the lion and stand upright.
 - DO ALL YOU CAN TO APPEAR LARGER**. Raise your arms. Open your jacket if you're wearing one. If you have small children with you, protect them by picking them up so they won't panic and run. If the lion behaves aggressively, throw stones, branches or whatever you can get your hands on without crouching down or turning your back. Wave your arms slowly and speak firmly. What you want to do is convince the lion you are not prey and that you may in fact be a danger to the lion.
 - FIGHT BACK** if a lion attacks you. Lions have been driven away by prey that fights back. People have fought back with rocks, sticks, caps, jackets, garden tools and their bare hands successfully. Remain standing or try to get back up!
 - Landscape or remove vegetation to eliminate hiding places for lions, especially around children's play areas. Make it difficult for lions to approach unseen.
 - Keep your pet under control. Roaming pets are easy prey and can attract lions. Bring pets in at night. If you leave your pet outside, keep it in a kennel with a secure top. Don't feed pets outside; this can attract raccoons and other animals that are eaten by lions. Store all garbage securely.

Board Meeting Summary

MA Board Meeting

The following is a summary of items from the Sept. 16 business meeting of the Ken-Caryl Ranch Master Association Board:

- The Board received an update from the Veterans Monument Task Force explaining some challenges that have arisen with the site identified for the monument. The Task Force will gather information and develop options to be presented in the future.
- A resident addressed the Board expressing concerns about high school student activity near their home and requesting that the Association remove a "sidewalk to nowhere" in an effort to control this activity. The Board took this request under consideration.
- The Board received an update on the status of the insurance renewal from our broker. The policies need to be renewed on Oct. 1 and a sub group of the Board will review with staff before binding coverages.
- The Prairie Dog Task Force report and a

proposal from Prairie Dog Action were discussed at length before the Board took action to accept the proposal (see associated article below).

- A concept of allowing Jefferson County Open Space to construct and manage a trail running north/south along the eastern flank of the hogback north of Ken Caryl Ave. was discussed. The concept is that in exchange for allowing this trail the County would deed the Community Center to the Metropolitan District. The Board is open to more discussion regarding this request. Staff will continue gathering information to be presented at the October Study Session.
- The Board was updated briefly on the status of the Community Plan Investment and the Community Planning Committee activity.
- Discussion regarding the 2015 budget was held, specifically addressing the level of reserve funding and balancing the requests for additional funding while reducing funding in other areas. Staff will prepare

a draft budget to present at the October business meeting using this discussion as a guide.

- **Manager's Report:** A written report was included in the Board package.

- **Committees:** Board member committee liaisons reported on the activities that their committees have been engaged in for the past month.
- **Action:** See associated article on this page.

Board Enters Into Agreement With Prairie Dog Action

At their Sept. 16 business meeting, the Master Association Board of Directors voted unanimously to enter into an agreement with Prairie Dog Action, a volunteer group that specializes in the relocation of prairie dog colonies. The agreement is only an initial step in a potential long-term plan to remove or reduce an excessively large colony from the site off Manor House Trail. In April of this year, a task force was appointed to draft a policy to address prairie dogs on Ken-Caryl Ranch, in particular the colony west of the Manor House. The draft policy was presented to the Open Space Committee and then the Master Association and Metropolitan District Boards in September.

the future to monitor the new site and to assist with relocation efforts if land becomes available for the relocation of the Manor House colony. The land identified to accept the animals is along the east side of the hogback north of Ken Caryl Ave. and is subject to any conditions we are not aware of which would prohibit use of the North Hogback site.

Some additional review will take place to confirm that this land is acceptable and to define a specific location before the prairie dogs are moved, but it is anticipated that this will happen quickly. Relocation of the Prairie Dogs from undesirable locations to acceptable land is the preferred method to manage these animals. However, finding appropriate land and funding to pay the expenses associated with moving the dogs is a challenging task. The proposal from Prairie Dog Action will provide service to the community in the form of volunteers as well as funding (\$10,000 plus grant opportunities for more) to help move our animals in exchange for allowing them to relocate up to 100 dogs from a site at the intersection of Wadsworth and Coal Mine at no cost to the community.

So after careful consideration and lengthy discussion the Board voted to accept this proposal and allow the relocation in exchange for the funds and promise of help in

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2015 Ken-Caryl Community Garden Fees Reduced

Want to get down and dirty next summer? Here is the perfect opportunity! Not only will you be allowed to dig in the dirt, but you will be rewarded with delicious organic fruits and vegetables. In addition you will become part of a community of individuals who are passionate about gardening. There are several social events that the Ken-Caryl Community Garden hosts each season such as "Pancakes in the Garden," educational lectures and a season finale "Harvest Party."

The plot fees have been reduced for 2015! We have finally set aside an adequate amount of reserve money as required by the Metro District and are now able to charge fees that will cover only our ongoing costs. The KCCG is totally funded by the gardeners, and therefore we need to cover not only annual costs but also cover a reserve for future, anticipated maintenance needs such as fence repair, replacement benches, shed repair, tool replacement, etc.

Mental Health/ Substance Abuse: Jeffco League Of Women Voters Open Meeting

More than 35 percent of inmates in Colorado's prisons have a mental health diagnosis. Ten percent of prisoners are considered severely mentally ill, and 72 percent of total prisoners are severe substance abusers. Yet people with mental illness are no more likely to be violent than the general population.

These and many other findings are the result of a year-long study by the Mental Health Task Force of the League of Women Voters of Colorado. The task force included 13 highly qualified experts plus parents of adults with mental illness and numerous volunteers.

On Wednesday, Oct. 8 from 7-9 p.m., the Jeffco LWV will sponsor a panel discussion on behavioral health (mental health and substance abuse) at St. Anthony Hospital, 11600 W. 2nd Place, in Lakewood. This meeting is free and open to the public. No reservations are required. Park on the south side of the hospital and enter the auditorium on the ground floor.

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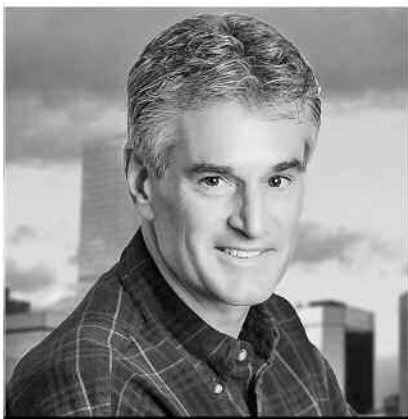

Fall Family Flu Shot Clinic

The Colorado Flu Shot Company will be providing the four-strain (Quadrivalent), preservative-free flu vaccine for ages six months to adult at the Community Center this fall. The four-strain (Quadrivalent) has two strains of Influenza A and two strains of Influenza B. This provides better coverage, especially for children. Approximately 25 percent of the total 2014-2015 flu vaccine is available as Quadrivalent. The protection from the influenza vaccine lasts one year.

Children are most at risk for secondary infections (pneumonia, bronchitis, strep throat, ear infections) and complications. The flu virus results in more childhood hospitalizations than any other vaccine-preventable disease. Other individuals at higher risk include anyone with asthma, heart disease, kidney disease, a compromised immune system, newborns and pregnant women. School-age children are also the most common source of spreading the virus. The virus can live on surfaces such as desks, keyboards, door handles and telephones for three days. Annually, 36,000 deaths occur in the United States from influenza.

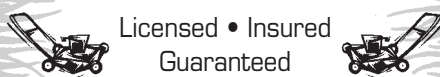

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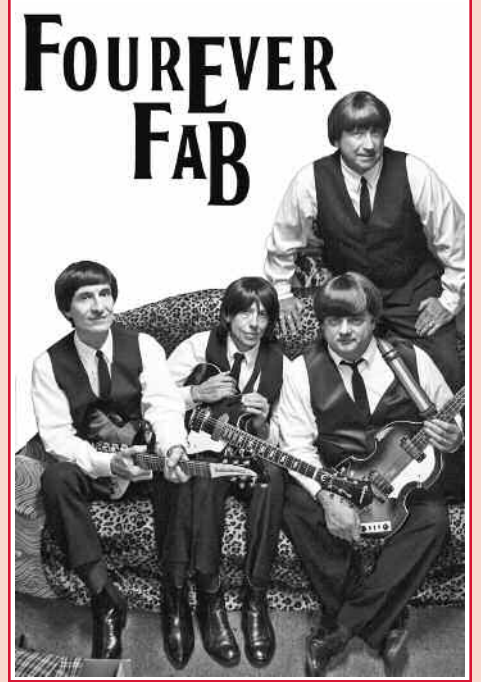

Bearproofing Your Home

Help Keep Bears Wild



Only people can prevent conflicts with bears. Please do your part to protect your home and property, and prevent conflicts with bears.

Keep Bears Out

- Many bears that enter homes do so through an unlocked or open window or door. Close and lock all bear-accessible windows and doors when you leave the house, and at night before you go to bed.
- If you must leave downstairs windows open, install sturdy grates or bars. Screens don't keep out bears.
- Keep garage doors and windows closed and locked at night and when you're not home. Don't leave your garage door standing open when you're not outside. Install extra-sturdy doors if you have a freezer, refrigerator, pet food, bird seed, or other attractants in your garage.
- Keep car doors and windows closed and locked if you park outside. Make sure there's nothing with an odor in your vehicle, including candy, gum, air fresheners, trash, lotions and lip balms.
- Bears are great climbers — remove any tree limbs that might provide access to upper level decks and windows.
- Replace exterior lever-style door handles with good quality round door knobs that bears can't pull or push open.
- Put on talk radio (not music) when you leave home; the human voice startles most bears.

Get Rid of Attractants

- Bears follow their super-sensitive noses to anything that smells like food, and can follow scents from up to five miles away.
- Don't leave trash out overnight unless it's in a bear-proof enclosure or container. Obey all local regulations.
- We recommend feeding birds only when bears are hibernating. If you want to feed birds when bears are active, please review the Attracting Birds, Not Bears fact sheet on our website.

- Don't store food of any kind in an unlocked garage, flimsy shed or on or under your deck.
- Don't leave anything with an odor outside, near open windows or in your vehicle, even if you're home. That includes scented candles, air fresheners, soaps and lotions.

Teach Bears They're Not Welcome

- If a bear comes into your yard or close to your home, do yourself and the bear a big favor, and scare it away. A confident attitude plus loud noises like a firm yell, clapping your hands, banging on pots and pans or blowing an air horn sends most bears running.
- If a bear enters your home, open doors and windows and make sure it can leave the same way it got in. Don't approach the bear or block escape routes.
- Never approach a bear. If a bear won't leave, call your local CPW office. If a bear presents an immediate threat to human safety, call 911.

Believe It Or Not, Awkward Eye Contact Saves Lives

CDOT Reminds Pedestrians And Drivers To Lock Eyes And Keep Heads Up At Crosswalks

Of the 1,433 pedestrian-related crashes and fatalities in Colorado last year, approximately 60 percent of drivers were at fault, leaving pedestrians at fault 40 percent of the time; a statistical reminder that everyone on the road can help prevent pedestrian-related crashes.

The Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) recently announced a pedestrian safety campaign targeted at both drivers and pedestrians. The campaign employs the tagline "Awkward Eye Contact Saves Lives — Heads Up At Crosswalks" and incorporates media placements around the state where awkward eye contact tends to occur, e.g. bathroom stalls.

With the majority of pedestrian-related crashes occurring between October and March, spiking in October and January, the timing of this campaign appropriately lands just before daylight savings blankets the streets during the fall and winter seasons. Even still, Monday through Friday marks the height of occurrences with nearly 80 percent of crashes falling within the work/school week, in line with the recent back-to-school crunch.

"We're seeing far too many preventable pedestrian-related crashes and even fatalities on the road," said Amy Ford, CDOT Communications Director. "The simple act of making eye contact at intersections and crosswalks could reverse this growing problem, in turn saving lives."

Upon analyzing the 2013 pedestrian crash and fatality data, Ford notes that approximately 20 percent of crashes were caused by pedestrians entering the roadway without a crosswalk present, while nearly 38 percent occurred at the site of a crosswalk, further emphasizing the need for both pedestrians and drivers alike to be aware of their surroundings, adhere to traffic signals, and to make eye contact with each other. Denver topped the 2013 findings with 30 percent of all incidents occurring within city limits. 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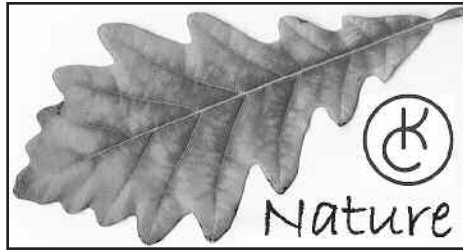

Be Bear Aware

Late summer and early fall means that black bears are very actively in search of food. Approximately 20,000 calories a day are needed for them to survive the winter. Black bears have lived in the foothills and mountains of Colorado long before our de-



scendants made their way out west. Because we as humans are living and playing in these areas more than ever, it is up to us to be "Bear Aware," make responsible choices and try to avoid bear conflicts.

Normally, black bears are shy and run away or climb up a tree to avoid encounters

with humans or other strange things. But according to Colorado Parks and Wildlife, "Bears that find food around homes, campgrounds and communities often lose their natural wariness of people. Even though black bears are not naturally aggressive and seldom attack or injure people, they are still strong, powerful animals. A bear's intent on getting a meal could injure someone who gets in its way. Every year bears that have become too comfortable around people have to be destroyed."

Bears can smell five miles away and will try to eat as much as they can the most efficient way. This means that we can do our part by taking away attractants around our home or when we are spending time outdoors.

- Keep trash in a bear-proof container or in the garage and close the door.

- Keep vehicles free of any smells and lock doors.
- Don't use birdfeeders when bears are active.
- Don't plant trees that have fleshy fruits or nuts.

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Now I Lay Me Down To Sleep Remembrance Walk Oct. 4

Now I Lay Me Down To Sleep

In 2007, Ken-Caryl Ranch residents Rob and Gina Harris were full of hope and joy when they learned halfway through their first pregnancy that their baby was going to be a boy. Their hope and joy quickly turned into a shattered dream when they learned their baby would die at birth because he had Potter's Syndrome, which means his kidneys did not form.

Through their journey, as Gina remained pregnant, they learned about Now I Lay Me Down To Sleep (NILMDTS), a nonprofit organization that provides remembrance photography to parents suffering the death of a baby. The photographs are completely complimentary. NILMDTS was founded by Cheryl Haggard and Sandy Puc in 2005. NILMDTS has more than 1,500 volunteer photographers who offer priceless heirloom images of the only moments parents will spend with their babies.

At 34 weeks into the pregnancy, their son David was coming. When David was delivered, his heart was not beating.

"The doctor handed David to me. I was overwhelmed at how beautiful he was. He looked so perfect," said Gina. "How could anything be wrong with him? We held him for six hours. I made sure to remember how he smelled and how soft his skin was. I tried my best to remember every moment with him."

NILMDTS co-founder Sandy Puc photographed David with Rob and Gina. These photographs helped capture the only moments the couple spent with David as well as every feature of David.

"There is no way I could have remembered this much about David without the photographs," said Gina. "When we received the images, they became and still are, our most prized possession. They are proof that David existed and that we are parents."

In 2011, Gina, who had been an executive director of another nonprofit, had the

opportunity to become the executive director at NILMDTS. "To be able to bring my nonprofit experience and my passion to an organization that has impacted me in such a profound way is such an honor," said Gina.

On Oct. 4, NILMDTS will be conducting the Remembrance Walk, "Our Journey Together." More than 1,500 people are expected to attend. The NILMDTS Remembrance Walk is for parents, family and friends to come together to remember a baby who has died due to miscarriage, stillbirth, SIDS, neonatal or any type of pregnancy or infant loss. Each baby's name is read at the walk and a balloon is released.

"This walk is part of the healing process for

parents and others related to the baby. The goal is to bring healing, hope and honor. We hope you will participate and tell others about the walk," said Gina.

The Remembrance Walk will take place at Clement Park on Oct. 4. Registration begins at 8 a.m. and the program and walk begins at 10 a.m. You can register at www.nilmdtsremembrance.org. 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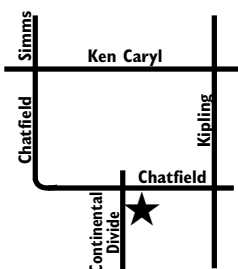

The DEA's National Prescription Take-Back Day provides an opportunity for the public to surrender expired, unwanted or unused pharmaceutical controlled substances and other medications for destruction. These drugs are a potential source of supply for illegal use and an unacceptable risk to public health and safety.

Sheriff's representatives will be set up at two drop-off locations in Jefferson County on Saturday, Sept. 27 from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. The locations are:

Dakota Ridge High School —
13399 W. Coal Mine Ave., Littleton (west parking lot)

Evergreen Fire Rescue —
1802 Bergen Parkway, Evergreen

This one-day effort is intended to bring national focus to the issue of increasing pharmaceutical controlled substance abuse. Many metro area cities and counties are participating in this initiative. Other Colorado locations can be found by going to www.dea.gov.

- Prescription and over-the-counter solid dosage medications, (tablets

- and capsules) are accepted.
- Intravenous solutions, injectables, needles and oxygen containers will not be accepted.
- Illicit substances such as marijuana or methamphetamine are not a part of this initiative.
- The prescriptions should be removed from the original containers and placed in plastic or Ziploc type bags prior to drop off.
